

# Independent Commission for Reconciliation and Information Recovery

Have Your Say Survey 2
Results

#### Introduction

This is the second survey the Commission has delivered and was live in the latter part of 2023. This survey included questions on the proposed design of the Commission as it starts to focus on some of the big decisions the needed to be taken.

The Commission must operate independently, with victims, survivors and their families involved in every step of the way. In this survey we sought to gain insight into the following areas:

- (1) the independence of the Commission;
- (2) conditional immunity (which has since been disapplied from domestic law, subject to appeal); and
- (3) the Commission's approach to carrying out its work.

In this survey we wanted to gain insights into the aspects of our work that matter to the general public.

### Independence of the Commission

The ability of the Commission to act independently and build trust through the way it delivers activities and reports and how it engages with people will be crucial to its future success. We asked respondents how should the Commission secure that independence:

### Conditional Immunity

(which has since been disapplied from domestic law, subject to appeal)

The possibility of conditional immunity from prosecution is contentious. Legal cases have been brought to challenge the validity of such a scheme and it is important that the courts provide clarity.

The Commission's power to offer individuals conditional immunity from prosecution for specific historical offences under certain conditions would be connected to its ability to retrieve information.

Any offer of immunity will be conditional, meaning that it can be revoked if conditions are not met, such as if it becomes clear that an applicant knew they were making a false statement or if the applicant commits a subsequent terrorist offence.

Since this survey was conducted, conditional immunity has now been removed from the operational delivery remit of the Commission.

### The design of the Commission's overall approach

Three phases have been suggested for the way that the case of a victim, survivor or family member who approaches the Commission could be handled:

**Engagement**: The aim of this phase would be to ensure that people who wish to access the services of the Commission have a clear and supportive series of interactions that empower them to make decisions that are right for them about the course of action they want to take.

**Information Recovery**: The aim of this phase is to carry out the examination work that will seek provide information to families and victims of Troubles-related deaths and serious injury.

**Findings:** The aim of this phase is to produce a report that sets out the findings of the information recovery work and, where practicable, addresses any specific questions that were asked as part of the formal request at the end of the engagement phase.

In the survey we asked respondents if they agreed with the above approach (Q6) and how could the Commission improve this proposed process (Q7). Question 7 was accompanied by a blank text box rather than a list of choices, allowing respondents to provide any or no feedback as they wished. Therefore, a breakdown of the responses for Question are not included below.

### Q7 How could the Commission improve this proposed process (referring to the design of the Commission)

A response table for this question (how could the Commission improve this proposed process [referring to the design of the Commission]) is not included. A table of responses has not been included as the responses to this question were sought via a free text/comment box; allowing those completing the survey to record any response they wished. Therefore, the responses could not be categorised (ethnicity, religion, gender, location, and age) in the same way that the other questions have been. The approach used to analysing the responses to other questions in this survey could not be applied to question 7.

### Engagement

The Engagement phase in the Commission's process is proposed as the time between an individual making a first contact with the Commission through to the individual making an official request of the Commission. Once an official request has been made, it will then move forward into 'information recovery'. The survey asked respondents the following question:

### Information Recovery

The Information Recovery phase is one of the key components of the Commission journey.

The Commission wants to provide approaches that serve different kinds of information request. The Commission has been told that victims, survivors and families, their experiences and what they might be seeking information about will all be different, and it will be important to design options that work for everyone.

Three possible options have been proposed:

- (1) **Family answer-focused examination** would aim to address the questions that requesters have raised and put its primary effort into recovering information that answers or addresses them as far as is practicable;
- (2) **Liability-focused examination** would aim to establish all the circumstances of the death and collect evidence to a standard that would support prosecution. A report could only be produced when any decisions about prosecution or subsequent prosecution had concluded. This report would set out the circumstances, as well as aiming to answer any specific questions raised by requesters; and
- (3) **Culpability-focused examination** would aim to establish all the circumstances of the death or other harmful conduct as well as to answer any specific questions raised by the requester. This option would obtain records as well as additional evidence from witnesses and subjects of interest and make findings based on the balance of probabilities that would be published on conclusion of the work.

The survey asked the following questions regarding the Information Recovery phase:
