1	The Governor ensures that a detailed drug supply reduction strategy and action plan is put in place as a matter of urgency.	Accepted	<p>The establishment had created a comprehensive drug supply reduction strategy and Action Plan during October 2015. This strategy records local action to address both the demand and supply of drugs, which includes:</p> <p>Increased Intelligence Gathering: Intelligence submissions from staff have increased by 25%</p> <p>Intelligence Led Searching: Significant improvements have been made to the intelligence led searching of prisoners' cells with the emphasis changing from the quantity of cells searched to the quality of searches conducted.</p> <p>Corruption Management: This reminds staff of the serious consequences of being involved in corrupt activity and bringing drugs into the prison, as well as how to how to manage corruption prevention intelligence and respond to it.</p> <p>Visits Management: Improvements have been in the visits area by raising staff awareness regarding trafficking methods, and a CCTV operator also now monitors visits sessions.</p> <p>The strategy also addresses the need to educate prisoners in the dangers of drug use to reduce the demand. The change in prison regime in May 2016 has addressed the previously reported concerns about accessing prisoners, and staff have increased the number of referrals made to Lifeline, who are contracted to deliver services for prisoners with a history of, and with current substance misuse problems. Lifeline provide both one-to-one and group sessions to deter continued use, and they proactively interact with prisoners to educate them about the risk of using drugs to</p>	<p>Completed</p> <p>Head of Reducing Reoffending and Operations</p>

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			<p>reduce the demand.</p> <p>The strategy also records the requirement for drug testing prisoners: the current commitment is to randomly test 5% of prisoners each month. In addition, staff complete suspicion tests on any prisoner where there is intelligence suggesting they are using or supplying drugs.</p> <p>Operational staff have received briefing about the strategy in various ways including daily briefings, through security liaison officers (residential staff) and Lifeline also led some staff awareness training. In addition, healthcare staff have produced notices to prisoners warning them of the dangers of using drugs.</p>	
2	<p>The Governor and Head of Healthcare should ensure that all staff are aware of PSI 03/2013 and local guidance and understand their responsibilities during medical emergencies, including that:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Staff use the appropriate code to communicate a medical emergency;</li> <li>• Staff called to the scene take the relevant equipment;</li> <li>• The control room calls an ambulance immediately an emergency medical code call is</li> </ul>	Accepted	<p>A Notice To Staff was issued to remind all staff of the appropriate use of the emergency codes, and the actions that must be taken in the event of an emergency code 'red' or 'blue' being called, including the need to ensure relevant equipment is taken to the scene . In addition, the Communications Room staff have received further briefing, verbal and written, addressing the need to automatically call an ambulance when an emergency code is used and await updates from the scene.
