1	The Head of Healthcare should develop an agreed multidisciplinary end of life care pathway and ensure that relevant staff are trained to provide appropriate care including the use of syringe drivers and delivering appropriate pain relief medication promptly	Accepted	<p>A qualified Macmillan nurse now works with the team, and has been tasked with developing a training guide and pathway for all staff. It is anticipated that this will be in place and delivered to staff by the end of February 2017. This work will include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• A review of the End of Life Pathway.</li> <li>• The development, with prison security input, of a risk assessment for the use of a syringe driver in this setting.</li> <li>• Seeking advice from Northamptonshire Healthcare NHS Foundation Trust (NHFT) community team on Trust-approved syringe driver and training.</li> <li>• A Meeting between the Primary Care manager at HMP Whitemoor and the Service Manager at Peterborough City Hospital to develop a Palliative Care Pathway. The Palliative Care 'Pain Ladder' will be formalised into SOP.</li> </ul>	February 2017 Head of Health Care.
2	The Governor and Head of Healthcare should ensure that all staff undertaking risk assessments for prisoners taken to hospital understand the legal position on the use of restraints, and that assessments fully take into account the health of the prisoner and are based on the actual risk the prisoner presents at the time.	Accepted	<p>A review of the local risk assessment policy was completed in October 2016 and the risk assessment now includes a new section outlining the defensible decision making process for the use of restraints. This enables more detail to be included by Healthcare. The local risk assessment document ensures that all staff undertaking risk assessments for prisoners taken to hospital understand the legal position; that assessments must fully take into account the health of a prisoner and be based on the actual risk that the prisoner presents at the time.</p> <p>Security and healthcare staff are aware of the Graham Judgement.</p>	Governor Head of Healthcare Head of Security  Completed

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			<p>Briefings on this issue were conducted during October 2016 occur following daily management visits.</p> <p>All healthcare staff were briefed in October 2016, via lunchtime briefing sessions, on the completion of risk assessment forms and the importance of providing all relevant health information so that appropriate risk assessments on the use of restraints can be made, based on the actual risk that the prisoner presents at the time.</p> <p>Complex clinical cases with longer term implications will now be subject to case management planning by the Senior Management Team. All risk assessments will be subject to internal management checks as well as external audits by ACA.</p> <p>A meeting took place in October 2016 between the Head of Health Care and the Security Governor to discuss the use of restraints throughout a Palliative Care pathway and discussions now take place daily at the Governors morning meeting and the aim is to judge on a case by case basis any individual going into a palliative care pathway rather than using a generic policy approach.</p>
