1	The Governor should ensure that all staff are made aware that if a prisoner is unresponsive, they should check for a pulse and determine whether he is breathing.	Accepted	<p>The actions expected of a 'first on scene' who is not a trained first aider are outlined in the First Aid Needs Assessment, but would essentially be to raise the alarm via radio or emergency telephone.</p> <p>The Governor will now ensure that the First Aid Needs Assessment is reviewed in November 2018 to include, that staff should check for a pulse and determine whether the prisoner is breathing. All staff will be made aware that if a prisoner is unresponsive, that staff should check for a pulse and determine whether the prisoner is breathing. This will be achieved through issuing each member of staff with guidance on national NHS procedures on:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Pulse - How do I check for a pulse? (Finding a pulse and checking for a pulse) • Breathing - How to check if a person is still breathing? <p>These new guidelines will be incorporated with the procedures Emergency Response in Custody (ERIC) 'Code Red/Blue' procedure in November 2018.</p> <p>Currently, the first aid provision at Frankland is in line with PSI 2015-29. There is at least one "First Aid" trained member of staff available at all times. This member of staff is identified and detailed to that duty each day, by the People Hub. All new Prison Officers undertake Emergency First Aid Training during their entry level training, which includes Basic Life Support (CPR). This is a relatively new initiative, introduced in INSERT 01/04/2018 applying to newer officers.</p> <p>All Duty First Aiders have undertaken First Aid at Work Training, which is provided in-house by trained instructors. There are currently 90 trained members of staff and in-date within the prison. 2	The Governor should ensure that emergency contact details for prisoners' next of kin are accurate and kept up to date and, in the event of a death, ensure that the prisoner's family is informed as soon as possible in line with national guidance.	Accepted	<p>The Safer Custody department now conduct a weekly check on the prisoner information system (NOMIS), to identify any prisoners' who do not have a recorded next of kin. The weekly check was introduced in June 2018. This check is built into the weekly actions log to ensure it is undertaken. A request is made to the prisoner to provide next of kin details. This is then updated on NOMIS.</p> <p>HMP Frankland have a dedicated Family Liaison Officer (FLO) rota. The FLO is on call 24 hours each day. HMP Frankland's contingency plans were reviewed in June 2018, and the FLO role is included within the contingency plans actions. They are responsible for contacting the prisoners' family to inform them of the death.
