1	The Head of Healthcare should ensure that all prisoners received at HMP Stafford have a timely and comprehensive medical assessment and are prescribed medication appropriately.	Accepted	<p>The Head of Healthcare has reviewed the reception process to ensure all patients receive the appropriate care when transferring from one establishment to another. This was done in March 2018.</p> <p>The introductions of the new North East London Commissioning Support Unit (NELCSU) reception templates, in November 2017, encompass three opportunities for patient engagement and assessment during the prison relocating/transfer process. The NELCSU templates cover reception screening, secondary reception screening and medication reconciliation.</p> <p>The NELCSU reception templates have been embedded onto practice in HMP Stafford. A weekly audit completed by the healthcare administration team monitors compliance.</p>	<p>Completed</p> <p>Head of Healthcare</p>
2	The Governor should ensure that prisoners with chronic illnesses and mobility difficulties whose needs cannot be satisfactorily met at HMP Stafford are transferred in a timely manner to an appropriate establishment with facilities to meet their needs.	Not Accepted	<p>Healthcare at HMP Stafford have clarified that there was no indication for a need for transfer to a 24/hour healthcare bed as Mr Bellingham's needs were not medical.</p> <p>Following a life changing Stroke Mr Bellingham was discharged from hospital on the 14th December 2017 with 4 times a day social carers. Healthcare staff managed his medications and urinary catheter. He was able to sit down and stand up independently, he was walking with the support of a zimmer frame and 1 person to guide him.</p> <p>Mr Bellingham's peers worked around him in a considerate manner as he wandered around the area close to his cell door. Keeping this social aspect and not isolating Mr Bellingham aimed to help in his recovery from the stroke; his social care needs were being met.</p>
