1	<p>The Governor should ensure that prison staff manage prisoners at risk of suicide or self-harm in line with national guidelines, including:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• assessing the level of risk based on all available information and known risk factors and not on a prisoner's presentation, and recording the reasons for the decision;</li> <li>• completing the relevant paperwork, fully and accurately, at all stages of the ACCT process.</li> </ul>	Accepted	<p>All ACCT Assessors will be reminded via email of the risks and triggers section of PSI64/11 and the need to fully consider and document these during assessments. The email will advise that where the prisoner does not engage, all source documentation should be consulted to ensure all risks and triggers. Safer Custody will conduct regular Quality Assurance checks on ACCT assessments, and where deficiencies are identified these will be raised directly with the assessor concerned.</p> <p>Case Managers will also be emailed regarding the Risks and Triggers section of PSI 64/11 and Defensible Decision Making guidance devised by the Regional Safer Custody Lead to ensure all relevant factors are considered and documented within ACCT reviews.</p> <p>All ACCT assessors and case managers will be briefed regarding the findings of the PPO report into Mr Rowlands death.</p>	Head of Safer Custody July 2017
2	<p>The Governor should ensure that staff understand that all information about bullying, threats and potential violence is recorded, fully considered and acted on through a robust and responsive violence reduction policy which appropriately supports the victim and challenges the perpetrator.</p>	Accepted	<p>Instances of or information related to bullying or suspicions of bullying will be investigated by residential supervisory officers, and acts of violence will be investigated by safer custody staff. The current support system for victims of bullying/violence 'Challenging Anti-Social Behaviour' (CAB) requires victims to agree to being monitored, this will be reviewed and from September 2017, the need for individuals to agree will be removed, to ensure all men are offered appropriate support.</p> <p>Staff will be advised of all support available in order that they can provide each man with a comprehensive array of options including</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• referral to the Residential Support Unit for victims, this unit</li> </ul>	Head of Safer Custody October 2017

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			<p>houses those men who are unable to locate elsewhere, due to bullying/debt, etc.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• referral for Custodial Violence Management Model (CVMM), for perpetrators of repeat violence/ anti-social behaviour, this sets targets for behavioural change.</li> <li>• Referral to the Building Hope Unit for perpetrators. This unit encourages change in individual's behaviour via support and structure, and aims to avoid the use of segregation.</li> </ul>	
3	The Governor and Head of Healthcare should give clear guidance to staff about the circumstances in which resuscitation is inappropriate.	Accepted	<p>Recent national guidance will be republished to all operational staff It will also be delivered on briefings such as the morning meeting, and residential briefings, speed training sessions and on suicide and self- harm training sessions.</p> <p>A review of policy on resuscitation is currently being undertaken by the new healthcare provider, Bridgewater Community Healthcare NHS Trust, which will be completed by September 2017. The recently published guidance jointly produced by NHSE and HMPPS has been shared to help inform this review.
