4 CHAIRMAN: Good morning, Mr. Greaney.

5 MR. GREANEY: Good morning, Sir.

7 ADDRESS BY MR. GREANEY:

8
9 MR. GREANEY: Today, we'll deal with Part 3 of Chapter
10 3 of the Inquiry's oral evidence hearings. Part 3 will
11 be remembered as concerning with the events over the
12 course of 12th to 14th August 1998.

14 Evidence in Part 3 comes from two sources: First,
15 evidence from the AGS; and, second, a presentation
16 prepared by Mr. Safranauskas. If all goes to plan,
17 we'll get through all of that today.

19 We'll start the day with the evidence provided by the
20 AGS. As we explained in our opening remarks on Monday,
21 last year, the AGS prepared a sequence of events
22 statement. That statement answered a number of
23 questions posed by the Inquiry Legal Team about the
24 events of 12th to 15th of August and the subsequent AGS
25 investigation. Accompanying that sequence of events
26 statement was a presentation.

10:01

27
28 Generally, the mechanism by which we'll need to secure
29 evidence from current or former Irish State witnesses

1 will be through a piece of bespoke legislation enacted
2 by the Irish Parliament, namely the International
3 Cooperation (Omagh Bombing Inquiry Act) 2026. However,
4 the Inquiry Legal Team made a request for an exception
5 to the statutory procedure to permit the evidence in 10:02
6 the sequence of events statement to be adduced by
7 questioning from the Inquiry Legal Team. The Irish
8 Justice Minister agreed on an expressly exceptional
9 basis for this to be done. The terms of that agreement
10 were that the Inquiry Legal Team would carry this 10:02
11 questioning out in Dublin, and that it would be
12 recorded.

13
14 That took place at the beginning of this month and the
15 AGS witness was Detective Superintendent Emmet 10:02
16 Casserly. In total, four hours and 30 minutes of
17 evidence was captured from Detective Superintendent
18 Casserly. That evidence breaks down into sections
19 covering our Parts 3, so 12th to 14th of August; 4, so
20 15th August prior to the first warning call; 7, the 10:02
21 police investigation; and 10, the part headed simply,
22 "suspects."

23
24 Today, now, we'll watch the footage relating to Part 3.
25 It lasts for a total of one hour and 10 minutes. Once 10:03
26 it's concluded, Sir, we propose that we should take a
27 break. So all of that said, I'm going to ask that we
28 start to watch the footage please.
29

3 DETECTIVE SUPERINTENDENT EMMET CASSERLY QUESTIONED (ON
4 1ST SEPTEMBER 2026) BY MR. GREANEY AS FOLLOWS:

5
6 1 Q. MR. GREANEY: The Omagh Bombing Inquiry was established
7 on 21st February 2024 by the UK Secretary of State for
8 Northern Ireland. Its purpose is to investigation
9 whether the Omagh bombing on 15th August 1998, in which
10 29 people and two unborn children were killed, could 10:03
11 have been prevented by UK State authorities.

12
13 Today, is Tuesday, 1st September 2026. The work of the
14 Inquiry today will involve gathering evidence from the
15 AGS. For that purpose, members of the Inquiry Legal 10:04
16 Team and the Inquiry secretary are present in Dublin,
17 together with Detective Superintendent Emmet Casserly
18 of the AGS.

19
20 would you please tell us your full name? 10:04

21 A. Good morning, my name is Emmet Casserly. And I'm a
22 Detective Superintendent in An Garda Síochána.

23 2 Q. And for how long you have been an officer of the AGS?

24 A. I joined An Garda Síochána in 1992.

25 3 Q. And would you be able to begin, please, by providing us 10:04
26 with a summary of your career history with the AGS
27 since 1992 until today?

28 A. Of course. I spent the early part of my career
29 policing in Dublin City Centre. I served as a police

1 monitor with the United Nations Mission in Bosnia and
2 Herzegovina working in post-conflict policing and human
3 rights compliance. Subsequent to that, I served with
4 the Garda National Drugs Unit, the Garda National Drugs
5 and Organised Crime Bureau and the National Criminal
6 Intelligence Unit. I'm currently attached to the
7 Special Detective Unit with national responsibility for
8 terrorism-related investigations.

9 4 Q. Detective Superintendent, the first topic, that we need
10 to deal with relate to the circumstances of the 10:05
11 involvement of the AGS with the Inquiry. Was the AGS
12 asked by the Inquiry to prepare a sequence of the
13 events relating to the circumstances of the Omagh
14 bombing?

15 A. It was, yes. 10:05

16 5 Q. Was a team of detectives attached to Dundalk given the
17 task of addressing that request?

18 A. They were.

19 6 Q. And how were those detectives selected for that task?

20 A. Well, they were selected as Dundalk is part of the same 10:05
21 region which dealt with the investigation originally.
22 So those detectives were selected as they would be
23 familiar with the area and the circumstances of the
24 events the at the time, insofar as possible.

25 7 Q. And was the team, therefore, carefully selected? 10:05

26 A. It was.

27 8 Q. As a starting point, did the team identify the entirety
28 of the original investigation material from the AGS
29 repository?

1 A. They did, yes. They retrieved the entire contents of
2 the investigation, which was 107 boxes of material, of
3 all sorts of material; reports, statements, phone
4 records and other investigative material gathered
5 during the course of investigation. 10:06

6 9 Q. And having located that material at the repository, to
7 where did they take it?

8 A. They brought it to Dundalk Garda Station for review.

9 10 Q. Having obtained that material, did the team set about
10 the work of sifting through it? 10:06

11 A. They did, yes.

12 11 Q. And reviewing it and understanding it?

13 A. That's correct.

14 12 Q. And that material, as you have identified already,
15 comprised reports, statements, phone records, maps, 10:06
16 photographs and other original records?

17 A. That's correct, yes.

18 13 Q. As a result of the team's work in reviewing and
19 understanding that material, was there then prepared
20 what the AGS describes as the sequence of events 10:07
21 report?

22 A. There was, yeah.

23 14 Q. Was that report supplemented by a PowerPoint
24 presentation containing the relevant maps, photographs,
25 and other relevant documents? 10:07

26 A. It was, yes.

27 15 Q. Was all of that material then provided to the Inquiry?

28 A. It was.

29 16 Q. And, indeed, during the course of your evidence we will

1 look at much of the material contained within the
2 PowerPoint presentation.

3 A. Yes.

4 17 Q. Now, before we proceed further, are there a number of
5 things that the AGS wish anyone viewing this footage to 10:07
6 keep in mind in considering the evidence you're about
7 to give?

8 A. There are, yes.

9 18 Q. First of all, what has been done by the AGS to prepare
10 the report involves the presentation of the 10:07
11 investigation as conducted at the time?

12 A. That is correct, yes.

13 19 Q. What has not been done is a review by the AGS of its
14 investigation?

15 A. Correct. 10:08

16 20 Q. So that is the first thing to keep in mind?

17 A. Yes. Very much so, why he.

18 21 Q. Secondly, your evidence will refer to work of
19 investigation carried out by the RUC and PSNI?

20 A. That's correct, yes. 10:08

21 22 Q. To the extent that that material was supplied to the
22 AGS as part of cross-border cooperation?

23 A. It was, yes.

24 23 Q. And am I correct that the AGS regard it as important to
25 keep in mind that you will be referring to that 10:08
26 material for the purposes of context?

27 A. That is correct, yes.

28 24 Q. You are not in a position to verify the RUC/PSNI
29 investigations?

1 A. No, I'm not. No.

2 25 Q. And the AGS, in the course of its work for the Inquiry,
3 has not sought to review the investigations of the RUC
4 and PSNI?

5 A. No, it has not, no. 10:08

6 26 Q. The next, topic, Detective Superintendent, relates to
7 the car within which the Omagh bomb was contained and
8 specifically the theft of that vehicle. Now, as a
9 starting point, do you agree that there is no doubt
10 that the car which contained the Omagh bomb was a 10:09
11 Vauxhall Cavalier with the registration mark
12 91-DL-2554?

13 A. It was, that's correct, yes.

14 27 Q. And what I would like your help with, please, in 10:09
15 overview to begin with and then we'll unpack it, is how
16 the attackers sourced that vehicle. So how those who
17 carried out the Omagh bombing located and obtained that
18 vehicle.

19 A. Of course.

20 28 Q. So, would you be able to provide, just in a few 10:09
21 sentences, an overview and then we'll go into some of
22 the detail?

23 A. Yes, so that vehicle was taken from a residential
24 estate called St. Macartan's Villas outside of, or
25 slightly to the south of Carrickmacross on the late
26 night/early morning of 12th/13th August 1998. It had
27 been parked there that evening and when the owner
28 returned to it, the vehicle had been taken some time
29 between 11 and -- sorry, between 11:00 and 3:30 a.m.

1 29 Q. And the owner, as we're going to come on to look at in
2 detail, a man called Paul Ward?
3 A. He was, yes.
4 30 Q. So just to draw some of those strands together, it's
5 clear that the vehicle used in the Omagh bombing was 10:10
6 stolen from within the Republic of Ireland?
7 A. That is correct, yes.
8 31 Q. And, specifically, from the town of Carrickmacross?
9 A. That's right.
10 32 Q. And would you describe for us, please, Carrickmacross 10:10
11 at the time?
12 A. Certainly. At that time, Carrickmacross was known as a
13 busy market town. It's located on the main
14 Dublin/Derry Road, the N2 at the time, it's been
15 bypassed since, but at that time it would be known as a
16 place with a lot of traffic going through at all times
17 of day and night. And then St. Macartan's Villas is an
18 estate pretty much within the boundaries of the town.
19 33 Q. So, Carrickmacross a busy market town?
20 A. That's correct. 10:11
21 34 Q. And the specific part of Carrickmacross from which the
22 vehicle was taken, a residential estate called
23 St. Macartan's Villas?
24 A. That's right, yes.
25 35 Q. And would you describe for us what St. Macartan's 10:11
26 villas was like at that time in 1998?
27 A. So, St. Macartan's Villas is an estate that was built
28 in 1952. It's an estate all along the same street, on
29 one side of the street. There's 56 houses in it and it

1 A. That is correct, yes.

2 42 Q. And we can just see to the right a high hedge?

3 A. Yeah, that's right, yeah.

4 43 Q. Which we're going to see in further detail in the next
5 couple of photographs and which is relevant for reasons
6 that we will get to.
7

8 So, slide 39 next, please. So that's a photograph
9 taken from a different angle showing the side of the
10 end of terrace house? 10:14

11 A. Yes, so the gable on display there, that is the house
12 concerned, yes.

13 44 Q. And we can see a vehicle towards the middle of the
14 photograph parked facing us and next to the hedge that
15 we saw? 10:14

16 A. That's correct.

17 45 Q. And is this a photograph reconstructing where Mr. Ward
18 had left his vehicle at a relevant time?

19 A. I believe it to be so, yes.

20 46 Q. And then photograph at slide 41, please. A photograph 10:14
21 taken from the opposite direction. On the far left can
22 we just see the end of terrace house?

23 A. That's correct, yes.

24 47 Q. We can see that high hedge in further detail. And,
25 again, is this a photograph reconstructing where 10:15
26 Mr. Ward had left his vehicle at a relevant point in
27 time?

28 A. Yes, it is. It is, yes.

29 48 Q. And so, the address that we've looked at in a number of

1 photographs is going to come into a very sharp focus
2 shortly. But was that address at the relevant time in
3 August 1998 the home address of the girlfriend of
4 Paul Ward?

5 A. It was, yes. 10:15

6 49 Q. Now, next we need to understand the ownership of the
7 Vauxhall Cavalier 91-DL-2554. As of 12th August 1998,
8 who was the owner of that vehicle?

9 A. Paul Ward was the owner of the vehicle.

10 50 Q. And when had Paul Ward purchased that vehicle? 10:15

11 A. He had purchased the vehicle the previous September,
12 September 1997.

13 51 Q. And back in August 1998, on providing a witness
14 statement dealing with the theft of the vehicle, did he
15 explain that having purchased the vehicle in September 10:16
16 1997, he had cleaned and polished it and then taken a
17 photograph of it?

18 A. He did. He explained that he had post-purchase he
19 cleaned, polished it, taken a photograph and he later
20 provided that photograph to the Gardaí. 10:16

21 52 Q. And we're in a position to see that photograph, it's at
22 slide 9?

23 A. That's it.

24 53 Q. So, the vehicle we're looking at in that photograph is
25 the vehicle into which a bomb was placed and detonated 10:16
26 in Omagh on 15th August 1998?

27 A. It was, yes.

28 54 Q. Were steps taken to investigate the registration
29 documents relating to that vehicle?

1 A. They were, yes.

2 55 Q. And we can place the registration document on the
3 screen. Slide 11. What did that documentary reveal
4 about the previous ownership of the vehicle?

5 A. So, that showed that the vehicle was owned previously 10:17
6 by a Mr. Donald Ward from a different part of the
7 country.

8 56 Q. And during the course of the vehicle did the AGS obtain
9 a statement of evidence from the previous owner,
10 Mr. Donald Ward? 10:17

11 A. They did, yeah.

12 57 Q. Next we'll turn to the movements of Paul Ward in
13 connection with the Cavalier on the evening of 12th
14 August 1998, which was a Wednesday. That evening, what
15 did Paul Ward do? 10:17

16 A. So, on the evening of 12th August, Paul Ward left his
17 home in an adjoining town, and he travelled to his
18 girlfriend's house in Carrickmacross at St. Macartan's
19 villas.

20 58 Q. Did he leave his own home at about 8.30 p.m.? 10:18

21 A. He did.

22 59 Q. And the distance he travelled from his own home to
23 St. Macartan's Villas was about what?

24 A. About 20 kilometres.

25 60 Q. And he went there to visit his girlfriend who lived at 10:18
26 the address that we've seen?

27 A. He did, yes. But prior to arriving at her house, he
28 put petrol in his vehicle in the Maxol service station
29 in Carrickmacross.

1 61 Q. Having arrived at St. Macartan's Villas, did Paul Ward
2 park the Cavalier more or less outside the house of his
3 girlfriend?
4 A. He did.

5 62 Q. So, not in a position that we've seen in the 10:18
6 photographs, that positioning becomes relevant later
7 on?
8 A. That's correct, yes.

9 63 Q. And did he stay in the house for longer at that stage?
10 A. He stayed in the house up until about 9.30 p.m. when he 10:18
11 left with his girlfriend.

12 64 Q. And where did they go at that stage?
13 A. They went to a place called Hope Castle in
14 Castleblayney, which is again 20 kilometres away.

15 65 Q. And did they, therefore, travel that distance in the 10:19
16 Vauxhall Cavalier?
17 A. This he did. Yeah, they did.

18 66 Q. So, it had been parked outside, the two of them leave
19 the house into the vehicle and then they depart in
20 order to go to Castleblayney? 10:19
21 A. That's correct, yeah.

22 67 Q. Did they stay in Castleblayney all night or return at
23 some point?
24 A. No, they returned to St. Macartan's Villas at about
25 11:00 p.m. 10:19

26 68 Q. And on returning, did Mr. Ward stay at Macartan's
27 villas for a period of time?
28 A. He stayed with his girlfriend in the rear of the house
29 in a sitting room until about 3:30 a.m.

1 69 Q. So, let's unpack some of that. On returning, did
2 Mr. Ward park his car very much in the position that we
3 saw in the photographs earlier?
4 A. I believe that he did, yes.
5 70 Q. So we'll just remind ourselves. Slide 41, please. So 10:19
6 there is the vehicle beside that high green hedge. And
7 so about ten feet, something of that order, from the
8 entrance to the address of his girlfriend?
9 A. Correct, yes.
10 71 Q. And you said, I think, that he his girlfriend stayed 10:20
11 together in the house between 11:00 p.m. and 3:30 a.m.?
12 A. That's right, yes.
13 72 Q. And did they stay within the house towards the rear?
14 A. They did, yeah. They were in a sitting room to the
15 rear of the house. 10:20
16 73 Q. Was Mr. Ward able to explain what steps he had taken in
17 terms of the security of his vehicle when he left?
18 A. He did. He put the steering lock on the vehicle and
19 locked the doors. But there was no alarm on the
20 vehicle. 10:20
21 74 Q. So, we now have a number of fixed data points. We know
22 that he, Mr. Ward, left the vehicle secure at
23 11:00 p.m. in the vicinity of his girlfriend's house?
24 A. That's correct.
25 75 Q. He and his girlfriend were then in the rear of the 10:21
26 house for a period of four and a half hours?
27 A. That's right.
28 76 Q. And at 3.30 a.m. he leaves the property?
29 A. He left at 3:30, yes.

1 77 Q. with the intention of returning to his own home?
2 A. That's correct.
3 78 Q. when he left the address of his girlfriend at
4 3:30 a.m., what did he notice?
5 A. well, when he left the house, he realised his vehicle, 10:21
6 his car, was gone, it had been taken.
7 79 Q. so, his vehicle had been stolen?
8 A. That's correct, yeah.
9 80 Q. And is it your understanding that he immediately ran
10 back into the house and reported the matter to the 10:21
11 local AGS at Carrickmacross?
12 A. He did. He returned to the house contacted the Garda
13 Station at Carrickmacross.
14 81 Q. And so bearing in mind that he had left the vehicle
15 parked unsecure at 11:00 p.m. on 12th August, had 10:21
16 discovered that it had been stolen at 3:30 a.m. on 13th
17 August, did it follow that the vehicle had been stolen
18 at some point between 11:00 p.m. and 3:30 a.m.?
19 A. That's correct. I believe that to be the case, yes.
20 82 Q. From there, we need to move to deal with the 10:22
21 involvement of the AGS in the period afterwards. And
22 do records reveal that at 3:30 a.m. on 13th August the
23 report I've mentioned was received?
24 A. That's right, yes.
25 83 Q. And by whom was it received within the AGS? 10:22
26 A. A Garda Pat McKeown, Patrick McKeown. He was on duty
27 in Carrickmacross Garda Station as the public officer
28 or station orderly on that date, and he received the
29 report.

1 84 Q. Did he record that report anywhere?

2 A. He did. He recorded the report in the station's

3 Occurrence Book, which would have been standard

4 procedure at that time.

5 85 Q. So, sorry, in other words, he did what was expected of 10:23

6 him?

7 A. Of course, yeah.

8 86 Q. And does a copy of the entry that he made in the

9 Occurrence Book still exist?

10 A. It does. 10:23

11 87 Q. And we can see, first of all, slide 13, please. And

12 Detective Superintendent, what are we looking at on the

13 screen there?

14 A. So, it's the entry made by Garda McKeown on receipt of

15 the report of the vehicle being stolen. So... 10:23

16 88 Q. And we can read that in the top left-hand corner, it

17 appears to record the report being made at 3:30 a.m.?

18 A. 3:30 a.m. I think it says "by phone." There's "phone"

19 up above.

20 89 Q. "By phone". It appears to, yes. "Stolen car." And 10:23

21 then "Paul Ward," the address of his girlfriend is

22 given. And are you able to read the balance of that?

23 A. Yeah, of course. So, "Paul Ward, CO," and the address

24 at St. Macartan's Villas. Current address is in

25 Castleblayney. "Reported his car, a wine Vauxhall 10:24

26 Cavalier, 91-DL-2554 stolen from Macartan's Villas

27 between 11:00 p.m. and 3:30 a.m."

28 90 Q. And towards the bottom of that page, the second half of

29 it, what are we looking at there, please?

1 A. So, that seems, is the next entry or an entry further
2 down the page detailing what happened subsequent to
3 receipt of the report. So, on the left of the page, as
4 far as I can make out, it says "UT, Foxtrot 70, Foxtrot
5 71, Castleblayney, Monaghan to control."
6
7 And then on the right side of the page it says:
8
9 "Carried out a search of Donaghmoyne Road area. Not
10 located."
11
12 91 Q. So, is this a subsequent entry in the same Occurrence
13 Book?
14 A. It is, yeah.
15 92 Q. And the "UT" there referred to, do you have an 10:25
16 understanding of what is likely to stand for?
17 A. Yeah, "UT" stands for unauthorised taking. And it's a
18 term used and it's interchangeable with "stolen car."
19 So, it means the same thing.
20 93 Q. And there is then a description of steps being taken to 10:25
21 seek to locate the car by officers?
22 A. Yeah. So that would have been a search carried out by
23 the patrol car based in Carrickmacross on that night
24 and the standard procedure at the time would be that
25 the patrol vehicle would conduct a search of the area 10:25
26 on receipt of the report or shortly thereafter.
27 94 Q. So, seeing if the vehicle still remained in the same
28 area?
29 A. Yes.

1 95 Q. But as you've told us, they were unable to locate it?
2 A. That's correct, yeah.

3 96 Q. And the report in fact - thank you, Mr. Suter - the
4 report in fact deals with the detail of what happened
5 in the period - I'm at page 5 of the report, Detective 10:25
6 Superintendent. And were there two officers who were
7 on mobile patrol in Carrickmacross in the early hours
8 of Thursday, 13th August?

9 A. That's correct. There were, yeah, Gardaí Eugene
10 McKenna and Noel Lavelle were on patrol in the 10:26
11 Carrickmacross patrol car and they went to meet
12 Paul Ward at the address.

13 97 Q. So, they went straight to the address with the purpose
14 of dealing details of the theft?

15 A. That's correct, yeah. 10:26

16 98 Q. And did Garda McKenna speak to Paul Ward?

17 A. He did. He did. And he brought him to Carrickmacross
18 Garda Station to elicit full details of what had
19 happened.

20 99 Q. So, went there, picked him up and brought him to the 10:26
21 station?

22 A. That's correct, yeah.

23 100 Q. And full particulars were obtained?

24 A. They were, yeah.

25 101 Q. And as we've seen within the Occurrence Book, there 10:26
26 were details of where the stolen car were circulated
27 to, namely mobile units with the call signs we've seen,
28 F70 and F71?

29 A. That's correct, yeah.

1 102 Q. Was the matter also reported to the Garda stations not
2 only in Castleblayney but also Monaghan Town?
3 A. It was, yeah.
4 103 Q. There's also a reference, we'll maybe see this in a
5 moment, perhaps we can put slide 15 on the screen, 10:27
6 please. Thank you very much. And we can see from the
7 -- that's perfect, thank you. Was perfect. We could
8 see from the top right-hand corner that this is a Form
9 A100?
10 A. That's correct. 10:27
11 104 Q. And was this a particular form that was in use at the
12 time?
13 A. It was, yeah. It was a standardised form used to
14 report stolen or unauthorised taken vehicles for
15 inclusion in the computer system which was in use at 10:27
16 the time.
17 105 Q. And the computer system, was that a national system?
18 A. It was, yeah. It was.
19 106 Q. And so we can see it contains details of the
20 registration mark of the car, its make, its owner, its 10:28
21 colour, which is described as wine or maroon, and the
22 date and time upon which it had been taken and various
23 other pieces of information?
24 A. Yeah..
25 107 Q. And the engine number and chassis number are also 10:28
26 contained on this form?
27 A. They are.
28 108 Q. Upon completion of the form, was it not only put on the
29 national computer system, but also faxed to the

1 sergeant in charge at the Communications Centre,
2 Harcourt Square, in Dublin?

3 A. It was, yeah. That was standard process, yeah.

4 109 Q. And what was the Communications Centre and its purpose
5 at that time? 10:28

6 A. So, the Communications Centre is also known as Control
7 Or Command and Control, it's the same place. So their
8 function is control of communications across the
9 organisation on a 24-hour basis, essentially.

10 110 Q. And what would you expect the Communications Centre to 10:28
11 have done with that information at that point in time?

12 A. So, Command and Control would then forward that
13 information on to the relevant stations across the
14 country and share it then internationally, obviously,
15 with the PSNI or the RUC at the time. 10:29

16 111 Q. We'll come on to that.

17 A. Yeah.

18 112 Q. And is the purpose of all of this to ensure that the
19 identity of that stolen vehicle is known to the widest
20 number of -- 10:29

21 A. Of course.

22 113 Q. -- the AGS?

23 A. Absolutely, yeah.

24 114 Q. So that if it has gone to a different part of the
25 country, it might be identified? 10:29

26 A. Of course.

27 115 Q. Now, when the information regarding the stolen vehicle
28 was forwarded to the Garda Station in Monaghan, was
29 another form filled out?

1 A. It was, yes.

2 116 Q. And we can put that on the screen. It's slide 17. And
3 this is a form described as RC1. And do you have an
4 understanding, Superintendent, of the purpose of this
5 form?

6 A. So, that form is -- the RC1 was a form that was used in
7 radio control rooms locally in stations where there
8 would be a radio control room. And that's the form
9 filled out in Monaghan, I understand, on receipt of the
10 message from Carrickmacross that the vehicle had been
11 taken.

12 117 Q. And would that information then have been used to be
13 circulated to the local Monaghan Town patrol units?

14 A. Yes. Absolutely, yeah.

15 118 Q. So, this m is part of the same approach that you've -- 10:30

16 A. Of course.

17 119 Q. -- already of making as many aware as possible of the
18 theft of the vehicle?

19 A. Of course, yeah.

20 120 Q. Was a facsimile message also circulated throughout the 10:31
21 Cavan/Monaghan Division and to the Parade Room for unit
22 briefing?

23 A. It was, yeah.

24 121 Q. And could you explain the Parade Room to us, please?

25 A. So, each station has a Parade Room where units starting 10:31
26 duty prior to duty are briefed coming on tour. And
27 part of those briefings would be vehicles subject to
28 theft or unauthorised taking, each member coming on
29 duty would be informed of the current list.

1 122 Q. And the message I've just referred to, we can see as
2 slide 19, please. So, is that the message that you
3 have just described for us?
4 A. That would be, yes. It forms one of a series of
5 messages really. But that's one of them, yes. 10:31
6 123 Q. And as we're told by the report, details of the stolen
7 vehicle were circulated to all mobile units in the
8 Carrickmacross, Castleblayney and Monaghan Garda
9 Stations, with that happening at 3:40 a.m. on 13th
10 August? 10:32
11 A. That's correct, yes.
12 124 Q. So the response that we have just seen across these
13 documents of the report being made by the vehicle
14 owner, attendance at their address, taken to the
15 station, obtaining details and information being passed
16 to a number of other stations and officers in a number
17 of ways, is all of that what you would have expected to
18 have occurred at that point in time?
19 A. Absolutely, yeah.
20 125 Q. Thank you very much, Detective Superintendent. 10:32
21
22 So, next we're going to deal with the examination of
23 the scene at Macartan's Villas, so the scene of the
24 theft. And I'm now at the bottom of page 6 of the
25 report.
26
27 was a decision made to conduct a search of the scene at
28 Macartan's Villas?
29 A. It was, yes. And that task was assigned to a detective

1 called Dominic Hunt on the following day. It was
2 recorded in the investigation jobs book that the search
3 had been conducted and with negative results.

4 126 Q. So, on what date was it that the task of conducting
5 that search -- 10:33

6 A. That's 17th August.

7 127 Q. So, obviously that is two days after the Omagh bombing?

8 A. It is, yes.

9 128 Q. And should we understand that by that stage, there was
10 knowledge that this particular vehicle had been used in 10:33
11 the bombing?

12 A. Yes.

13 129 Q. And that the trigger for the task of conducting the
14 search being raised, the trigger for that as the Omagh
15 bombing? 10:33

16 A. Of course, yeah.

17 130 Q. It was allocated to an officer and then on 18th August
18 it was recorded in the jobs book that the search of the
19 scene had yielded a negative result?

20 A. That's correct. 10:34

21 131 Q. So, in other words, nothing had been found that was of
22 assistance to the investigation?

23 A. Absolutely, yeah.

24 132 Q. I just mention the Jobs Book; what is or was the Jobs
25 Book? 10:34

26 A. So, the Jobs Book in this case, or in any large
27 investigation at that time, was essentially a record of
28 each investigative task that had been assigned. So, in
29 this case, that particular task of searching the area

1 outside St. Macartan's Villas, that is one job within
2 the -- one task within the Jobs Book. It's assigned
3 and a result then has to come back. So the person who
4 assigned must carry out the task and report back on it.

5 133 Q. The, Jobs Book is a document that would be created for 10:34
6 any significant investigation?

7 A. Absolutely, yeah.

8 134 Q. And in order that there is a record of what has been
9 done --

10 A. Of course, yeah. 10:35

11 135 Q. -- and what the result is, each job is identified?

12 A. Absolutely, yeah.

13 136 Q. It is allocated to a particular officer?

14 A. Officer or team in some cases, depending on what the
15 job is. 10:35

16 137 Q. And the officer or team have an obligation to report
17 what the outcome of that task is?

18 A. Absolutely, yes.

19 138 Q. And that report is made in the Jobs Book so that there
20 is a complete record? 10:35

21 A. Yeah, that's correct.

22 139 Q. And here, as you've told us already, the search yielded
23 a negative result?

24 A. That's right.

25 140 Q. We've dealt already with the notification of the fact 10:35
26 of the theft to officers within the Republic of Ireland
27 and you mentioned a little earlier notification also to
28 the RUC, and that's the next topic that I would like to
29 deal with.

1 A. Yes.

2 141 Q. So, as a starting point, did the AGS notify the RUC of
3 the fact of the theft of the Cavalier?

4 A. They did, yes.

5 142 Q. On what day, first of all, did the AGS notify the RUC 10:36
6 of that?

7 A. On 13th August, which was later on the day that the
8 vehicle was taken, the vehicle was stolen.

9 143 Q. Does the material available to you identify the time at
10 which that report was made on 13th August? 10:36

11 A. It does; 1:00 p.m. on 13th August.

12 144 Q. And was that notification given as a single piece of
13 information or as part of a larger body of information?

14 A. No, it was a larger body. It was a list of all the
15 vehicles taken up to a certain point across the 10:36
16 country.

17 145 Q. And what the report tells us is that it was a list of
18 stolen and located vehicles within the Republic of
19 Ireland up until 1:00 p.m. on 13th August?

20 A. That's correct. 10:36

21 146 Q. And by whom, first of all, was that list sent?

22 A. That list was sent from the Communications Centre or
23 Control as we've called it already, that's sent from
24 there.

25 147 Q. And that's the location we've discussed -- 10:37
26 A. It is.

27 148 Q. -- already?

28 A. It is.

29 149 Q. And we can look at that slide, or look at that list.

1 That's at page 21 please, Mr. Suter. And so very much
2 towards the -- well, at the very top of that list we
3 can see:

4
5 "91-DL-2554, red Vauxhall Cavalier
6 Station: Carrickmacross."

7
8 A. That's right.

9 150 Q. And the sender is identified there by number, is that
10 correct?

10:37

11 A. Yeah. Bravo 196. B196, that's his district number.

12 151 Q. So, we've now seen the list and we know by whom it was
13 sent?

14 A. Yes.

15 152 Q. And to whom was it sent?

10:38

16 A. So, it was sent, this particular one was sent to three
17 different places, CVI Belfast, Galway, Ennis and Dublin
18 Airport Police.

19 153 Q. Was what was happening at 1:00 p.m. on 13th August, was
20 this something exceptional or was this ordinary
21 recourse of business between the AGS and RUC?

10:38

22 A. Yeah, no, I believe it to be a report, from my own
23 experience, is a standardised report that was sent
24 every day showing a list of all vehicles taken across
25 the previous 24 hours, and the purpose being that that
26 telex would make its way to every station and every
27 relevant place across the country and appeared then in
28 parade rooms. I can't speak about that particular
29 document, but documents of that nature generally made

1 their way to the clipboards and files in parade rooms
2 nationwide.

3 154 Q. So, your expectation would be that where a vehicle has
4 been stolen in the Republic of Ireland, not only would
5 officers within the Republic of Ireland know about
6 that, but also officers within Northern Ireland would
7 know about that theft?

8 A. Well, I can certainly speak to the ones within Ireland,
9 within An Garda Síochána, that that type of form made
10 its way to every Parade Room. I can't say about the
11 RUC, but I would assume that to be the case.

12 155 Q. Well, that's no doubt very fair, Detective
13 Superintendent. Thank you very much indeed.

14

15 Detective Superintendent, the next topic that we will
16 deal with is eyewitnesses on 12th and 13th August 1998.
17 So, in other words, potential eyewitnesses to the theft
18 of the Cavalier?

19 A. Yeah.

20 156 Q. We'll just deal with these witnesses one after the 10:39
21 other. So who was the first potential witness?

22 A. So, the first potential witness to the theft of the
23 Vauxhall Cavalier was a Ms. Rose Finnegan, also a
24 resident of Carrickmacross.

25 157 Q. And did she reside on the same stretch of roadway as 10:40
26 St. Macartan's Villas?

27 A. She did, yeah.

28 158 Q. And we're not going to give her exact address. But did
29 she live not very far away from the address at which

1 Mr. Ward's girlfriend lived?

2 A. She did.

3 159 Q. On Wednesday, 12th August, where did Rose Finnegan
4 spend her day?

5 A. She had been at home in her own house for the entire 10:40
6 day.

7 160 Q. And did there come a day when she was visited at home?

8 A. She did. She had a caller at the house at 11:30 p.m.
9 on that date and that caller remained with for about
10 45 minutes, leaving at 12:15, quarter past twelve, on 10:40
11 the 13th.

12 161 Q. Did she remain in the house as her caller left or did
13 she leave with that person?

14 A. She left the house with the person.

15 162 Q. And as they left the house at about 12:15 a.m. on 13th 10:40
16 August, did she observe anything in particular?

17 A. Yeah, she noticed a vehicle parked there with a
18 registration number 91-DL.

19 163 Q. And did she observe that it was a maroon-coloured
20 Donegal-registered vehicle? 10:41

21 A. She did. She did. And she had seen the vehicle there
22 previously, so she was familiar with the vehicle, but
23 not the owner of it.

24 164 Q. So, there were a number of features which potentially
25 mapped onto the Cavalier: where it was located, its 10:41
26 colour, the 91-DL and that she had seen the vehicle
27 there previously?

28 A. That's correct.

29 165 Q. And so, she was seeing it still there at quarter past

1 midnight?

2 A. That's right.

3 166 Q. Now, eyewitness 2, would you tell us the name of that
4 person please?

5 A. So, the second eyewitness was called Mr. Patrick 10:42
6 Conlon, also a resident of Carrickmacross, and again in
7 close proximity to St. Macartan's villas.

8 167 Q. And we can put slide 44 on the screen and see the
9 location of Patrick Conlon's home in relation to the
10 address of Mr. Ward's girlfriend. So, on a parallel 10:42
11 road?

12 A. That's correct, yes.

13 168 Q. Not really very far away at all from address --

14 A. No.

15 169 Q. -- the relevant on Macartan's villas? 10:42

16 A. No, not far.

17 170 Q. And did Mr. Conlon recall anything that was happening
18 that evening that was of particular relevance to him?

19 A. Yeah, so he recalled the evening because that evening
20 Manchester United were playing in the Champions League 10:42
21 and he was able to date it to that.

22 171 Q. Later that night, after the match had finished, did
23 Mr. Conlon notice anything?

24 A. He did. At about 1:00 a.m. on the 13th he noticed car
25 lights reflecting off his front sitting room window and
26 he went to the window to investigate further.

27 172 Q. And when he went to the window to investigate further,
28 what, if anything, did he see?

29 A. He saw a vehicle driving slowly and he said it was

1 coming from the Dundalk direction. He was of the view
2 or he was of the opinion that it was a red Peugeot 405
3 and he felt the manner in which it was travelling made
4 it suspicious.

5 173 Q. And was a particular phrase that he used to describe
6 the vehicle that it was cruising very slowly?

7 A. That's correct.

8 174 Q. But at all events, he had considered the movement of
9 that vehicle as suspicious?

10 A. He did.

11 175 Q. Was he able to tell the police anything about the
12 registration mark of the vehicle?

13 A. Yes. He believed the registration contained the
14 letters JI, or Juliet India, or possibly RJI.

15 176 Q. Was he able to say anything about the occupants of the
16 vehicle?

17 A. Yes, he believed that there was three people in the
18 vehicle at the time.

19 177 Q. Did he see where the vehicle went?

20 A. He said it left -- it didn't stop in his time of
21 observation and it travelled up Farney Street towards
22 Carrickmacross Town Centre.

23 178 Q. And if we can put slide 44 back on the screen, please.
24 And the street that you've just described, Farney
25 Street, if we go from our right to our left up
26 Macartan's Villas and then a little bit further,
27 Mr. Suter, and then it's perhaps off the screen, is
28 Macartan -- is Farney Street a road that connects the
29 avenue upon which Mr. Conlon lived and Macartan's

1 villas?

2 A. Yes, I believe it to be so, yes.

3 179 Q. And Mr. Conlon had seen the vehicle travel up Farney
4 Street towards Carrickmacross Town Centre?

5 A. That's right.

6 180 Q. And was that the last that he saw of the vehicle?

7 A. That was the last sighting of it by him, yes.

8 181 Q. So, those were the two potential eyewitnesses with
9 evidence of relevance to the theft of the Cavalier?

10 A. That's correct.

11 182 Q. Now, next topic, other potential thefts.

12 A. Yeah.

13 183 Q. And by that, I'm talking about attempts to steal other
14 vehicles on 12th and 13th August 1998, the night of
15 those two dates. And, again, Detective Superintendent,
16 what we'll do it just to take these vehicles in turn.

17 A. Okay.

18 184 Q. So, vehicle 1, would you explain to us, first of all,
19 what type of vehicle vehicle 1 was?

20 A. So, vehicle 1 is described in the report as a blue
21 vauxhall Cavalier, same make and type as the vehicle
22 used in the bombing. The registration of this one was
23 90-DL-3782.

24 185 Q. And you've observed that the type of vehicle was the
25 same as the vehicle that was actually stolen from
26 Mr. Ward --

27 A. Yes.

28 186 Q. -- and used in the bombing. And as we go through these
29 vehicles, we'll see that that is a feature, will we

1 not?

2 A. Yeah.

3 187 Q. So, on the evening of 12th August, was an attempt made
4 to steal that blue Vauxhall Cavalier?

5 A. Yeah, there was an attempt made to take it, yes.

6 188 Q. And from where was that attempt made?

7 A. From the Main Street in Carrickmacross.

8 189 Q. And would the Main Street in Carrickmacross be just a
9 short distance from St. Macartan's Villas?

10 A. Yeah, it's not far.

11 190 Q. Who was the owner of that vehicle?

12 A. So, the owner of this particular vehicle was a man
13 called Mr. Hugh McFadden, who is from a different part
14 of the country, and was travelling through
15 Carrickmacross on the evening in question.

16 191 Q. And did he have occasion to stop on his journey in
17 Carrickmacross?

18 A. He did. He stopped for a restroom break to use the
19 public toilets in Carrickmacross, and to have a coffee
20 before he was going to continue on his journey.

21 192 Q. And to that end, did he park his vehicle up and go
22 across the road to the public lavatories?

23 A. He did.

24 193 Q. And when he did so, what, if anything, did he notice?

25 A. So, when he parked his vehicle, he noticed what he
26 described as a white Peugeot 405 car with two males
27 inside it. He went -- he left the area then,
28 obviously, to use the facilities and get a coffee and
29 then returned to his vehicle.

1 194 Q. And what the report tells us is that having gone into
2 the nearby coffee shop, it was a bit crowded for him
3 and so he decided not to queue but to return to his
4 vehicle?
5 A. That's correct, yeah.

6 195 Q. When he returned to the vehicle, what did he see?
7 A. He saw who he understood to be the two occupants from
8 the Peugeot 405, that they had got out of their vehicle
9 and were standing adjacent to his vehicle. And he got
10 the impression at that point that they were trying to
11 take his vehicle or their intention was to take his
12 vehicle.

13 196 Q. Was his perception that they had seen him approaching?
14 A. Yes.

15 197 Q. And what, in response, had they done?
16 A. They left the area on seeing him return. They got back
17 into the Peugeot and left the area in the car that he
18 had seen them in earlier on, sorry.

19 198 Q. Was that experience of Hugh McFadden something that was
20 later reported to the AGS?
21 A. It was, yeah.

22 199 Q. And as a result, was a statement of evidence taken from
23 him?
24 A. That's correct, it was, yeah.

25 200 Q. Was anything done in relation to the vehicle itself?
26 A. Yeah, the vehicle was subject to a technical
27 examination in an effort to identify the people who had
28 attempted to take it.

29 201 Q. And we'll get to the details of that technical

1 examination under a separate topic heading in due
2 course.

3 A. Of course.

4 202 Q. On 7th September 1998, so a number of weeks after the
5 Omagh bombing, was some further action taken in
6 relation to Mr. McFadden?

7 A. Yes, there was. Detective Sergeant Hunt and Detective
8 Garda Fahy travelled to Letterkenny Garda Station in
9 Donegal with an album of persons who had been known to
10 be involved in the theft of motor vehicles, and those
11 were shown to -- a photographic album, and those were
12 shown to Mr. McFadden.

13 203 Q. And that trap made by Sergeant Hunt and Detective Garda
14 Fahy, did that take place on 7th September 1998?

15 A. It did.

16 204 Q. So this was an attempt to see whether he could identify
17 those that he had seen coming from the 405 that night?

18 A. That's correct.

19 205 Q. And what happened whilst Sergeant Hunt and Garda Fahy
20 were with Mr. McFadden?

21 A. So, subsequent to that, they organised a computer
22 sketch picture of -- computer-generated picture of the
23 two people that Mr. McFadden could attempt to identify
24 as the people who had attempted to take his car.

25 206 Q. And we're in a position to look at the compu sketches
26 that were prepared. The first one is slide 46, please.
27 And is that the first, as it's described, CD fit --

28 A. It is.

29 207 Q. -- prepared with the assistance of Mr. McFadden?

1 A. It is, yes.

2 208 Q. And the second is 48.

3 A. That's correct, yeah.

4 209 Q. And I'm not sure that we identified it earlier, but we
5 can see it on that document, date and time of offence,
6 12th August 1998, between 9:00 p.m. and 9:30 p.m.?

7 A. That's correct.

8 210 Q. So, what Mr. McFadden had been describing was an
9 attempt to steal his vehicle by men resembling those
10 two individuals during the late evening of 12th August?

11 A. That's correct.

12 211 Q. Thank you. So, that's vehicle number 1. And we'll
13 turn next to vehicle number 2. Who was the owner of
14 vehicle number 2?

15 A. The owner of the second vehicle then was Mr. John
16 Brady, also a resident of Carrickmacross.

17 212 Q. And even more specific than Carrickmacross, was he a
18 residence of an address on St. Macartan's Villas?

19 A. He was.

20 213 Q. What type of vehicle was he the owner of?

21 A. He was the owner of an Opel Vectra, registration number
22 90-D-34629.

23 214 Q. And an Opel Vectra is essentially identical to a
24 Vauxhall Cavalier?

25 A. It is. It is, yes.

26 215 Q. They're one and the same in terms of body shape. Was
27 Mr. Brady able to explain where he had parked his
28 vehicle on 12th August 1998?

29 A. Yes, he explained that he parked his vehicle outside of

1 his home and that he applied the steering lock and
2 locked all four doors of the vehicle before going into
3 his house.

4 216 Q. And we can see some photographs of that vehicle. First
5 of all, slide 50, please. In some of the photographs
6 we're going to see damage and we'll get, in due course,
7 to how that damage was caused. But there we're seeing
8 the vehicle of Mr. Brady, is that correct?

9 A. That's correct, yes.

10 217 Q. Then 52 next, please. From a different view.

11 A. Yeah.

12 218 Q. 54. So, the rear of the vehicle.

13 A. Yeah, that's correct.

14 219 Q. And then finally, 56, please.

15 A. That's correct, yes.

16 220 Q. So we're there, in that image, seeing some damage just
17 below where the key would be inserted?

18 A. That's correct, yeah, the metal section beneath the
19 plastic insert below the keyhole.

20 221 Q. Thank you, Mr. Suter. Now, was Mr. Brady able to
21 explain to you at what time he'd gone to bed on 12th or
22 13th August?

23 A. So, I understand that he retired to bed at about
24 1:00 a.m. on that date.

25 222 Q. So, he'd left the vehicle locked up at 10:30 p.m.
26 outside his home on St. Macartan's Villas, he went to
27 bed at about 1:00 a.m. on 13th August?

28 A. Yeah.

29 223 Q. And was he able to tell the police about something

1 which happened about 45 minutes after he had gone to
2 bed, so quarter to two in the morning?

3 A. So, he outlined that at about 1:45 a.m. he heard voices
4 outside of his home on the street, but he didn't look
5 out of the house to see them and he couldn't discern
6 what those accents were or where the accents came from,
7 but he did hear voices outside his home.

8 224 Q. The next morning, what happened?

9 A. So, the following morning, at 9:00 a.m. he left his
10 house, went to his vehicle and when he went to unlock
11 the car he noticed then that the driver's door had been
12 damaged and he felt it had been tampered with. And the
13 plastic mould as depicted on the PowerPoint
14 presentation just previously had been pushed -- pulled
15 out of its position and he could see damage then around
16 it.

17 225 Q. So we can just see that again please, Mr. Suter, at 56.
18 Slide 56. So, essentially, he was describing damage
19 that had not been there when he'd left his vehicle at
20 10:30 p.m. on the 12th but was there when he returned
21 to his vehicle at 9:00 a.m. on 13th August?

22 A. That's correct, yeah. Yeah.

23 226 Q. And did Mr. Brady believe that some type of instrument
24 had been used to cause that damage, because there was a
25 deep, round score on the metal surrounding the mould?

26 A. Yes, he did, yes.

27 227 Q. And did Mr. Brady push the mould back into place, get
28 in into his car via the passenger door and then drive
29 to his workplace?

1 A. That's exactly correct, yes.

2 228 Q. Did Mr. Brady, at some stage, draw to the attention of
3 the AGS what had happened?

4 A. He did, yes. Later that evening, he reported the
5 interference with his vehicle to the guards at
6 Carrickmacross Garda Station.

7 229 Q. So that was later on the evening of 13th August?

8 A. Yeah. So he reported to a Garda John Mulholland who
9 assessed the time at about 10:30 p.m. on that evening.

10 230 Q. So that was the time at which Mr. Brady arrived at the
11 garda station?

12 A. That's correct.

13 231 Q. And was he informed by Mr. Brady that someone had
14 interfered with the lock on the driver's door of
15 Mr. Brady's vehicle?

16 A. He was, yes.

17 232 Q. Subsequently, what action did the police take?

18 A. So, on 23rd Gardaí John Mulholland and Michael
19 Fitzpatrick went to Mr. Brady in Carrickmacross with
20 the intention of seizing that vehicle for technical
21 examination. It wasn't present at the address, so they
22 found John Brady at his place of work in Farney Street,
23 Carrickmacross, and informed him they were going to
24 seize the vehicle. I think by agreement then Mr. Brady
25 drove his vehicle to Carrickmacross Garda Station and
26 it was placed in secure storage at that point, pending
27 examination.

28 233 Q. And the type of examination, the technical
29 examination --

1 A. Technical examination.
2 234 Q. -- of the sort that we'll come on to.
3 A. Yeah.
4 235 Q. And that all occurred on 23rd August 1998?
5 A. That's correct.
6 236 Q. And so, again, was the product of what had happened in
7 Omagh on the 15th?
8 A. Yeah, I believe it to be so, yes.
9 237 Q. So, by this stage we have two Cavaliers, or Cavalier
10 identical --
11 A. Similar vehicle, yeah.
12 238 Q. -- that had been the subject of attempted thefts, it
13 would appear, on the night of the 12th and 13th?
14 A. That's correct, yes.
15 239 Q. And it doesn't end there, because we then have vehicle
16 3.
17 A. Yes.
18 240 Q. And by whom was vehicle 3 owned?
19 A. Again, vehicle 3 was owned by a person called
20 Teresa Drumgoole, also a resident of Carrickmacross,
21 and she was the owner of a Vauxhall Cavalier
22 registration number 90-MN-2231.
23 241 Q. And she also lived very much in the same kind of
24 area --
25 A. She did.
26 242 Q. -- that we've been speaking of?
27 A. She did, yes.
28 243 Q. Was Mrs. Drumgoole able to explain when she had left
29 her car on 12th August?

1 A. Yes, so on the night of 12th August she said she left
2 her vehicle outside of her address, but the vehicle was
3 left unlocked and the steering lock had not been
4 applied.

5 244 Q. Did she describe to the police anything particular
6 about the mechanical features of her vehicle?

7 A. Yeah, there was a mechanical issue with her car at the
8 time which made it difficult to start and there was
9 some kind of a heating plugs issue.

10 245 Q. Was she, furthermore, able to explain to the officers
11 that at about quarter past midnight on 13th August she
12 and her husband had gone to bed?

13 A. That's correct, yeah. 12:15 on the 13th is what she
14 stated.

15 246 Q. And was the bedroom situated at the front of their
16 house?

17 A. It was. And the bedroom window was open.

18 247 Q. So she was saying the bedroom window was open?

19 A. Yeah.

20 248 Q. Did there come a time at which Mrs. Drumgoole became
21 aware of something in particular?

22 A. Yeah, so at that time, 12:45, she heard the sound of
23 the engine of her car turn over once.

24 249 Q. And the fact it turned over just once, was she able to
25 describe that as being a particular feature of her
26 vehicle?

27 A. She was, because that was consistent with the issue
28 around the heating plugs and the starting of the
29 vehicle. So it was difficult to start and that's the

1 way she described it.

2 250 Q. So she felt that she was hearing an attempt by her
3 vehicle to turn over?

4 A. Yes.

5 251 Q. As a result, what did she do?

6 A. Well, she got out of bed, went to the window and looked
7 out on to the street. She couldn't see any people
8 outside and she couldn't actually see the spot in which
9 is her vehicle was parked. And subsequent to that, she
10 returned to bed and went to sleep.

11 252 Q. Now, when was the next time that Mrs. Drumgoole had
12 anything to do with her vehicle.

13 A. So the following -- well it was actually the same day,
14 the 13th at 12:15 p.m. she went out of her home to her
15 car and she noticed at that point that the driver's
16 door as only partially closed and not fully secure.

17 253 Q. And she looked, but was unable to see any damage to the
18 ignition switch or any of the wiring?

19 A. No, there was no damage to anything.

20 254 Q. So she had thought that night that she'd heard the
21 engine of her car turning over and the next afternoon
22 when she went to the vehicle, she noticed that the
23 driver's door was now only partially closed?

24 A. That's correct.

25 255 Q. And so, on the face of it, this was the third
26 attempt --

27 A. It seems to be, yes.

28 256 Q. -- that night in the same area to take away unlawfully
29 a Cavalier or Cavalier identical?

1 A. That's correct.

2 257 Q. And, of course, that was the same type of vehicle as
3 Mr. Ward's vehicle which we know was stolen that night?

4 A. That's correct, yeah.

5 258 Q. So, four of a type.

6

7 So, the next topic, Detective Superintendent, please,
8 potential sightings of the stolen Cavalier, so that is
9 to say the vehicle stolen from Mr. Ward.

10

11 A. Yes.

12 259 Q. And was an appeal made to members of the public to come
13 forward with information in relation to the movements
14 of Mr. Ward's Cavalier?

15 A. There was, yes.

16 260 Q. And was that an appeal that was provoked by the bombing
17 in Omagh on 15th August?

18 A. I believe that to be the case, yes.

19 261 Q. And did anyone come forward as a result of that appeal
20 to the public?

21 A. Yes, so a number of people came forward with
22 information that they believed might be relevant to the
23 investigation. I suppose as with all investigations,
24 some of the information proved relevant and some not
25 relevant.

26 262 Q. And as a result of the mixed information that was
27 received, did the Garda Investigation Team, so the team
28 involved in investigating Omagh, take any action in
29 particular?

1 A. So, I suppose coming from all of the information we
2 received, the Investigation Team was unable to
3 conclusively state what happened with the vehicle
4 subsequent to its theft.

5 263 Q. But that's not to say there wasn't some information
6 that came in?

7 A. Oh no, no, there was information came in in terms of
8 identification of witnesses who potentially saw the
9 vehicle.

10 264 Q. And, again, what we'll do is just work through those --

11 A. Of course, yeah.

12 265 Q. -- witnesses, three of them who potentially saw the
13 vehicle of Mr. Ward.

14 A. Yes.

15 266 Q. And first of all, the name of the first witness,
16 please?

17 A. So the first witness is a Garda Eugene McKenna, who is
18 also based out of Carrickmacross Garda Station.

19 267 Q. And what was he able to say to the Omagh Investigation?

20 A. So, what he said was that while he was on patrol in the
21 Garda patrol car in Carrickmacross Town Centre alone,
22 he was on his own, at about 1:00 a.m. or 1:05 a.m. on
23 13th August he saw what he believed to be a dark red or
24 maroon-coloured Vauxhall Cavalier - well, he said Opel
25 or Vauxhall Cavalier, which is interchangeable, same
26 type of car - drive down Main Street towards the
27 courthouse, Main Street, Carrickmacross towards the
28 courthouse and he said the vehicle was travelling fast.

29 268 Q. So, we'll just take this in stages.

1 A. Sure.

2 269 Q. He was on duty that night in Carrickmacross?

3 A. Yes.

4 270 Q. At the relevant time he was on his own?

5 A. He was.

6 271 Q. Because his colleague was taking a meal break?

7 A. That's correct.

8 272 Q. And he was seated in his patrol car?

9 A. He was.

10 273 Q. And the patrol car was being driven by him. And as he

11 was approaching the Main Street in the town from

12 Parnell Street, he stopped the Garda vehicle he was

13 driving?

14 A. Yes, that's correct.

15 274 Q. And it was at that stage that he observed what he

16 described as a dark red or maroon-coloured car which he

17 described as an Opel or Vauxhall Cavalier car, drive

18 down Main Street towards the courthouse?

19 A. That's correct.

20 275 Q. And his assessment was that the vehicle was travelling

21 "fast"?

22 A. That's what he said, yes.

23 276 Q. Was he able to say anything about the registration mark

24 of that vehicle?

25 A. So, he recalled the registration of the vehicle as

26 being 91-DL-5, and he couldn't recall the other numbers

27 on the -- of the registration.

28 277 Q. So, as we know, Mr. Ward's vehicle had a registration

29 mark that was indeed 91-DL.

1 A. It was.

2 278 Q. And there was a 5 thereafter in the four digits, but
3 those digits were 2554?

4 A. That's correct.

5 279 Q. So, Garda McKenna was describing a registration mark
6 which in part mapped onto the registration mark of
7 Mr. Ward's vehicle?

8 A. That's correct.

9 280 Q. And he was describing a vehicle of the same type as
10 Mr. Ward's vehicle?

11 A. He was.

12 281 Q. And in broad terms, the same colour?

13 A. Yes.

14 282 Q. Was Garda McKenna able to say anything about the
15 occupants of that vehicle?

16 A. Well, he described that there were two occupants in the
17 vehicle and he described the driver -- he was unable to
18 provide a description of the passenger, but was able to
19 describe the driver.

20 283 Q. And what did he say of the driver, please?

21 A. So, he described the driver as follows, I'll read it:
22 "A young male, late teens or early 20s, good or broad
23 build, sharp features, slightly pointed nose, short
24 hair, appeared fair or mousey, fairly distinctive
25 appearance. Possibly wearing a dark coloured jacket.
26 He appeared square shouldered."

27 284 Q. So that was the first potential witness?

28 A. Yes.

29 285 Q. A sighting at or shortly after 1:00 a.m. on the morning

1 of the 13th?

2 A. That's right, yeah.

3 286 Q. The name of the second witness, please?

4 A. The second witness was a Bernadette Byrne.

5 287 Q. And what was Bernadette Byrne able to say to the police

6 in response to the public appeal?

7 A. So, Bernadette Byrne believed that she saw this vehicle

8 at 10:45 a.m. while parked in her own motor vehicle in

9 the square of Crossmaglen in County Armagh. She was

10 able to say that she saw that vehicle, or what she

11 believed to be that vehicle, pass her towards the

12 Dundalk road out of Crossmaglen and she described the

13 vehicle as having a 91-DL registration plate with four

14 digits in the number, the two numbers in the middle

15 being the same, and said it was a middle range sized

16 car, maroon colour.

17 288 Q. So, she was describing a vehicle which, again, shared

18 some features with Mr. Ward's vehicle?

19 A. Yes.

20 289 Q. Registration 91-DL, with four digits and as we know,

21 the two digits in the middle of Mr. Ward's --

22 A. That's correct.

23 290 Q. -- registration were the same. And again, a common

24 feature, the maroon in colour?

25 A. Yes.

26 291 Q. Was the witness, Bernadette Byrne, able to explain

27 whether there was any reason why the registration of

28 the vehicle drew her attention?

29 A. Yes, it appears that it stood out to her because her

1 friend also owned a Donegal-registered vehicle and she
2 said that that registration, or that type of
3 registration would be an unusual thing to see in
4 Crossmaglen at that time.

5 292 Q. What did she say, if anything, of the manner of driving
6 of the vehicle?

7 A. What she said was that the vehicle was driving at a
8 normal speed and manner for the road and weather
9 conditions at the time that she viewed it.

10 293 Q. Did she also say to the police that she was quite
11 definite of the vehicle she saw and that she was happy
12 it was the vehicle that she had heard being described,
13 as she put it, on the road?

14 A. She did, yes.

15 294 Q. Now, were there numerous other reported sightings of a
16 Vauxhall Cavalier, Donegal-registered, maroon-coloured
17 vehicle?

18 A. There were. There were newer numerous other reports,
19 but due to lack of accurate detailed descriptions and a
20 lack of CCTV, the investigation was hindered in that
21 regard in terms of tracking that vehicle after it was
22 taken from St. Macartan's Villas.

23 295 Q. So, there were some features of the evidence that
24 you've identified as we've gone through it, from which
25 inferences might be drawn, but the AGS were not able,
26 definitively, to progress the movements that vehicle --

27 A. No.

28 296 Q. -- in the period after it was stolen?

29 A. No, they were not, no.

1 297 Q. There was a third witness, as I indicated. And what
2 was that witness's name, please?
3 A. The third witness was a Bernadette McCroary, and I
4 believe she viewed the vehicle on 13th August at
5 11:45 a.m. about.

6 298 Q. At 11:45 on 13th August, where was Mrs. Bernadette
7 McCroary?
8 A. So she was travelling with her husband in other own
9 vehicle, travelling north bound on the N1, on the
10 Drogheda side of Kilsaran, so Kilsaran is a village
11 close to Castlebellingham on the old N1.

12 299 Q. And that village also being about 16 kilometres south
13 of Dundalk?
14 A. That's correct, yeah.

15 300 Q. And what did Mrs. McCroary say that she had seen at
16 that time?
17 A. So, what she said was that she said a maroon-coloured
18 car passed her car, overtook her car at speed and that
19 the car then drove on for a distance and turned into a
20 housing estate on the left-hand side of that road, the
21 N1. She outlined that she believed that the year of
22 the vehicle, the year of registration of the vehicle
23 was in the 90s, but she couldn't say which year. And
24 she stated that the number of the car following the
25 year was DL-2554, she said.

26 301 Q. So, again some features in common with Mr. Ward's
27 vehicle: The colour, a number plate in the 90s as we
28 know in fact 91, but she was able to state that the
29 balance of the registration mark was as was Mr. Ward's

1 vehicle, DL-2554?

2 A. That's correct.

3 302 Q. And was Mrs. McCroary able to give any explanation for
4 why she recalled that particular number?

5 A. What she outlined at the time was that it was a very
6 similar number to a number that she used in her
7 everyday life, hence she remembered it.

8 303 Q. Was Mrs. McCroary able to give any evidence as to who
9 was occupying that vehicle?

10 A. So, what she said in a follow-up statement was that the
11 sole -- there was one occupant, a sole occupant of the
12 vehicle and he was male aged 30 years and had dark
13 hair.

14 304 Q. As a result of that information given by Mrs. McCroary,
15 was any particular task raised?

16 A. A series of house-to-house enquiries took place
17 following that report and the areas that were subject
18 to that were Churchview in Dromiskin, County Louth;
19 St. Mary's Villas in Kilsaran; and St. Oliver's Park in
20 Kilsaran, both County Louth.

21 305 Q. And did the Garda members attached to the Incident Room
22 examine information gleaned from those questionnaires
23 and generate new lines of enquiry or jobs where
24 necessary?

25 A. They did, yeah, that's correct.

26

27 [Video interview concluded].

28

29 MR. GREANEY: Sir, that represents the evidence of

1 Detective Superintendent Casserly in relation to our
2 Part 3.

3
4 Can I, before we take our break, just provide some
5 context for that evidence and for the evidence of
6 Detective Superintendent Casserly generally.

11:14

7
8 The position of the Government of Ireland was that the
9 questioning of Detective Superintendent Casserly should
10 be restricted to matters contained within the sequence
11 of events statement that had been prepared.

11:14

12 Notwithstanding that position, the Inquiry Legal Team
13 indicated a wish to ask additional questions and indeed
14 we provided a list of those questions.

11:14

15
16 With a small number of exceptions, the Government of
17 Ireland declined too permit that additional questioning
18 to happen. It's important to say, however, that it
19 wasn't simply a 'no', because what was indicated was
20 that supplementary questions should be posed through
21 the statutory procedure. We recognise that even from
22 what we have just watched over the course of the last
23 hour and 10 minutes, it is clear that there are other
24 questions that need to be asked and answered about the
25 circumstances of the theft of Paul Ward's Cavalier.

11:14

11:15

26
27 To take some stark examples, topics that we need to
28 know more about are; Anthony Donegan, the thief of the
29 car; Seamus Daly, the terrorist as we described him on

1 Monday; and Paul 'Jaws' Kelly, the man who, on the
2 evidence as we provisionally assess it to be, was the
3 intermediary between Donegan and Daly. And to take
4 another example, it's plain that efforts were being
5 made to steal a Cavalier specifically on the night of 11:15
6 12th to 13th of August.

7
8 We do have, from the sequence of events statement, some
9 timings that help us to work out, at least potentially,
10 when the attempts were made to steal John Brady's 11:15
11 Vectra, that was Vehicle 2 and Theresa Drumgoole's
12 Cavalier, that was Vehicle 3. And furthermore, we have
13 some timings to help us work out when it was that
14 Paul Ward's vehicle must have been actually taken.

15
16 Hugh McFadden also described men acting suspiciously in
17 relation to his Vauxhall Cavalier, Vehicle 1, on night
18 of 12th and 13th August but the sequence of events
19 statement does not reveal is the at which that happened
20 and that time would make a contribution to our 11:16
21 understanding and so we will need to know.

22
23 Sir, overall we hope that once everyone has seen all
24 four hours and 30 minutes of the evidence of Detective
25 Superintendent Casserly, they will conclude that what 11:16
26 we undertook on 1st September was a meaningful
27 exercise. Nonetheless, it had the limitations that we
28 have described and it was not the full dynamic process
29 of questioning and pressing of witnesses, that will

1 happen, we are sure here. But what is important that
2 everyone should know is that we do fully intend to
3 utilise the procedure to seek answers from the Republic
4 of Ireland to the outstanding questions which
5 undoubtedly do exist.

11:17

6
7 So, Sir, having said that, could we, as we said we
8 would, suggest that we have a break at this stage.
9 We'll need a slightly longer break than we often have.
10 So could I suggest that we return at probably 20 to 12
11 please. So, 11:40.

12 CHAIRMAN: All right, thank you Mr. Greaney.

13
14 THE INQUIRY ADJOURNED BRIEFLY AND RESUMED AS FOLLOWS:

11:45

16 CHAIRMAN: Yes, Mr. de la Poer.

17 MR. DE LA POER: Sir, good morning.

18
19 ADDRESS BY MR. DE LA POER:

11:45

20
21 MR. DE LA POER: Mr. Safranauskas, has returned to the
22 witness box to help us with the presentation that he
23 has prepared in relation to Part 3 and there are three
24 elements as to what is going to happen for the balance
25 of the session before lunch and into the afternoon.
26 The first aspect of this will be the electronic
27 presentation, which will be shown on screen and to
28 which Mr. Safranauskas will speak.
29

11:45

1 The second element is the timeline. The timeline is a
2 document prepared by the Inquiry Legal Team, hard
3 copies are available in the hearing room, please do not
4 mark these as they will be taken up at the end of the
5 day for use on later days. It will be published, in 11:46
6 full, on the website once it has been completed. For
7 Core Participants, Excel version of the timeline can be
8 found at INQ 049132, and a Word version at INQ 049563.
9 So, people are able to follow it electronically as well
10 and it's a document that was disclosed a couple of 11:47
11 weeks ago by the Inquiry Legal Team.

12
13 So, that is the timeline and we will be following that
14 as we go through the Electronic Presentation of
15 Evidence. 11:47

16
17 The third aspect, Sir, is the Inquiry Legal Team,
18 Part 3 factual evidence summary. We will be
19 interposing that, as we go through, so that we can hear
20 greater detail that underlies the presentation. 11:47
21 Mr. Rafferty will be dealing with that part, so we will
22 jointly be examining Mr. Safranauskas. But we will
23 follow that as we go through.

24
25 Can I just say this about the summary, it was said by 11:47
26 Mr. Greaney on Monday: It has been the subject of
27 consultation with Core Participants. It will be
28 published in full at the conclusion of Part 3. May I
29 repeat what Mr. Greaney said on Monday, that the

1 Inquiry Legal Team is grateful to all Core Participants
2 for the contributions they made in relation to
3 developing the summaries, this is about the first, and
4 the effect of those summaries is to reduce a huge body
5 of evidence comprising statements, exhibits and reports 11:48
6 into an accessible digest of the relevant evidence.

7
8 Sir, with those introductory remarks out of the way, I
9 wonder if I may return to the examination of
10 Mr. Safranauskas. 11:48

11 CHAIRMAN: Good morning, Mr. Safranauskas.

12 THE WITNESS: Good morning.

13
14 MR. MARK SAFRANAUSKAS CONTINUED TO BE QUESTIONED BY

15 MR. DE LA POER AS FOLLOWS: 11:48

16
17 306 Q. MR. DE LA POER: Mr. Safranauskas, we're just going to
18 introduce two elements of the presentation before we
19 get going.

20 A. Okay. 11:48

21 307 Q. We'll remind everybody, once we get there, but the
22 first is a word about "beacons," and by "beacons" we
23 mean a flashing marker on the screen?

24 A. Yes.

25 308 Q. Is it right that there are two types of beacon that 11:49
26 you've used?

27 A. Yes.

28 309 Q. The first type of beacon is coloured red; does that
29 denote a physical location?

1 A. It does, yes.

2 310 Q. And can you, perhaps, give us an example of where you
3 might have used that?

4 A. So, a physical location would be such as example as the
5 Emerald Bar, or a business such as Town Glass Limited. 11:49

6 311 Q. Will we also include the location of landlines?

7 A. We will, yes.

8 312 Q. The second colour that you've used is a blue beacon?

9 A. Yes.

10 313 Q. And what does a blue beacon denote? 11:49

11 A. A blue beacon will denote a cell site location.

12 314 Q. They flash so as to draw the attention of the eye on
13 the screen to where we might be looking.

14 A. Yes.

15 315 Q. Can you confirm that the radius of the circle which 11:49
16 flashes is not intended by you to indicate the range or
17 direction of any cell site.

18 A. Correct.

19 316 Q. It is simply for visual purposes so that people can see
20 where they need to be looking. 11:50

21 A. Exactly that, yes.

22 317 Q. And we are going to hear from Dr. Tart next week who
23 will speak in front of this presentation, which he has
24 reviewed and has approved, so that he can tell us what,
25 in fact, we can determine from those physical locations 11:50
26 that you have marked.

27 A. Okay.

28 318 Q. The second introductory matter relates to two phrases
29 you've used about cell site. Now, is it right that

1 you've used the phrase "no cell site included"?

2 A. Yes.

3 319 Q. And is the reason for that that the Inquiry Legal Team
4 has not regarded it as necessary to include the cell
5 site data for that call on the basis that the physical 11:51
6 location of the handset, at that time, is not thought
7 to have forensic value?

8 A. I believe so, yes.

9 320 Q. And is it also your understanding that because it
10 hasn't been a site that has been investigated, it may 11:51
11 be the case that there is data for it but it may,
12 equally, be the case that we don't have the data for
13 it?

14 A. Exactly that, yes.

15 321 Q. But we have not sought to investigate that. But by 11:51
16 contrast, where the physical location of a particular
17 handset may be thought to have forensic value, and
18 where, having looked at the data, we cannot see a cell
19 site ascribed to that call and that has been confirmed
20 by Dr. Tart, have you used the phrase "no cell site 11:51
21 available"?

22 A. I have.

23 322 Q. We'll see that as we go through. So, having made those
24 introductory remarks, I wonder if everybody who has a
25 timeline - whether physically or electronically - can 11:52
26 turn it on the page which starts Part 3, and we're
27 going to start at row 1 on our timeline where we have
28 some data and let's bring up your presentation, please,
29 Mr. Safranauskas. So, we start on 12th August 1998, is

1 that right?

2 A. We do, yes.

3 323 Q. [Presentation played]. Just pause it there. We will
4 become very familiar with this layout but it's the
5 first such time. The tile in the top left-hand corner, 11:52
6 does that indicate the phone making the call?

7 A. Yes, correct.

8 324 Q. And the tile to the right as we look at it, is that the
9 phone receiving the call?

10 A. Yes. 11:52

11 325 Q. If we just have a look at some further data starting in
12 the top left-hand corner, do we see that that is a call
13 made from the 574 landline?

14 A. Yes.

15 326 Q. And has that landline been provisionally attributed to 11:53
16 Paul Kelly?

17 A. Yes.

18 327 Q. On the basis that we went through yesterday?

19 A. Correct.

20 328 Q. We can see that it is an outgoing call to Seamus Daly 11:53
21 as is recorded there, 076, duration five seconds?

22 A. Yes.

23 329 Q. And we can see further data towards the bottom of the
24 tile, 3:18:02 on 12th August?

25 A. Correct. 11:53

26 330 Q. Again, moving to the right just to familiarise everyone
27 with the interpretation of what we're seeing, do we see
28 the same information mirrored for the incoming handset?

29 A. Yes, that's right.

1 331 Q. And we are, of course, here dealing with the 076 phone,
2 which not only has been attributed to Seamus Daly but
3 has been given the colour green?
4 A. Yes.
5 332 Q. So, that deals with the top left-hand corner. If we 11:53
6 move down to the bottom left-hand corner, you have
7 included a clock which provides an "at a glance"
8 reference point for when in time the event that is on
9 screen is being recorded?
10 A. I have, yes. 11:54
11 333 Q. If we move round in an anticlockwise fashion, we come
12 to the bottom right-hand corner; have you given a short
13 description of the type of even that we're dealing
14 with?
15 A. Yes. 11:54
16 334 Q. In this case, a telephone call?
17 A. Which will be the most common in this presentation,
18 yes.
19 335 Q. Then moving up the right-hand side, just above
20 "telephone call," do we see a small box which reads 11:54
21 "076 no cell site included"?
22 A. Yes.
23 336 Q. Just to remind everybody, this is an occasion where the
24 location of Seamus Daly's handset at this time, bearing
25 in mind that he is not suspected of direct involvement 11:54
26 in the theft, has not been included?
27 A. Correct.
28 337 Q. So, that location has not been included but we go to
29 the very centre and we see that there is a flashing red

1 beacon?

2 A. Yes.

3 338 Q. what does that denote, please?

4 A. That denotes the location Paul Kelly's home address.

5 339 Q. And have you put the last three digits of that 11:55

6 telephone next to it to indicate that physical location

7 is the landline location of 574?

8 A. Yes, I have.

9 340 Q. Although we're spending some time on this first one

10 it's simply to help everybody navigate, and for those 11:55

11 who wish to look at it on the timeline they will see

12 the exact same information has been included at row 1.

13

14 So, having introduced all of this, let's just consider,

15 briefly, where we are in the chronology 11:55

16 Mr. Safranauskas. We are in the early hours of 12th

17 August, is that right?

18 A. We are, yes.

19 341 Q. We have a call lasting just five seconds?

20 A. Yes. 11:56

21 342 Q. And so, a call that may have connected or may have been

22 diverted to answer phone?

23 A. Yes.

24 343 Q. And in relation to that call, we can see that the

25 caller on the provisional attribution is Paul Kelly and 11:56

26 the recipient, Seamus Daly?

27 A. Yes.

28 344 Q. Now, we're going to come to a number of calls as we

29 work through this but is this way round, in other words

1 Mr. Kelly calling Seamus Daly something that we are
2 going to see which later forms part of a pattern?
3 A. Yes, around, just shy of 24 hours later.
4 345 Q. So, we've started here, we can then move forward,
5 please, in our presentation? 11:56
6 CHAIRMAN: Mr. de la Poer, do you mind just before we
7 leave that first entry in the timeline booklet.
8 MR. DE LA POER: Yes.
9 CHAIRMAN: Can I just understand one thing? There's an
10 asterisk associated with some numbers but not all, can 11:57
11 you help us to know what that means?
12 MR. DE LA POER: It should be all, the asterisk is to
13 indicate a contractual -- in other words, it's the last
14 three digits of the phone and there are numbers which
15 precede it, as everybody would expect, for a full 11:57
16 telephone number. The absence of an asterisk is not
17 intended to be significant. Of course, when somebody
18 phones 121, that is the totality of the digits that
19 they dial. So where there is no asterisk and they're
20 call an answer phone that's because those are the only 11:57
21 numbers that they dialled.
22 CHAIRMAN: But if we look, for example, at row 8.
23 MR. DE LA POER: Yes, there should be an asterisk
24 there.
25 CHAIRMAN: So, we should not read anything into that? 11:57
26 MR. DE LA POER: No, no, don't ascribe anything into
27 that, Sir, that is an error.
28 CHAIRMAN: Thank you.
29 346 Q. MR. DE LE POER: Mr. Safranauskas, we will move

1 forward, please, to your next entry on your
2 presentation. [Presentation played]. And we're now at
3 708, is that right?

4 A. Yes.

5 347 Q. And at 708 do we see that Seamus Daly called his answer 11:58
6 phone?

7 A. Yes.

8 348 Q. And the duration of that, please?

9 A. 14 seconds.

10 349 Q. And no cell site included for this call? 11:58

11 A. No.

12 350 Q. If we move forward, please, to what will be entry 3 in
13 the timeline. [Presentation played]. We're just
14 before midday, at this point, Mr. Safranauskas?

15 A. We are, yes. 11:58

16 351 Q. Do you want to just work us through the elements that
17 we can see here?

18 A. Yes. So, starting from the top left we see the green
19 076 phone provisionally attributed to Seamus Daly
20 making an outgoing telephone call to the landline of 11:59
21 the Emerald Bar. It is for a duration of four seconds.
22 The Emerald Bar in the centre of the screen depicted in
23 the location.

24 352 Q. And, again, this is picking up from where we were
25 yesterday; we know that Seamus Daly had a connection to 11:59
26 Colm Murphy?

27 A. Yes.

28 353 Q. We know, also, that Seamus Daly's partner at the time,
29 Sile Grew, worked at the Emerald Bar?

1 A. We do, yes.

2 354 Q. And, of course, we know that the Emerald Bar was owned
3 by Colm Murphy?

4 A. Correct.

5 355 Q. So, if we move forward, please, to the next item. 11:59
6 [Presentation played]. We can see just under a minute
7 later another very short call to the Emerald Bar?

8 A. We do, yes.

9 356 Q. And the participant being the same, the 076 green
10 phone? 12:00

11 A. Yes, that's right.

12 357 Q. Now, if we move forward, please, we have our first cell
13 site entry?

14 A. Yes.

15 358 Q. This call has been included because it has relevant 12:00
16 information about the location of Anthony Donegan's
17 phone, is that right?

18 A. Yes, it does.

19 359 Q. It is not suggested there is any significance, at the
20 moment, attributed to the 529, which is a currently 12:00
21 unattributed number?

22 A. Correct.

23 360 Q. So not one of those that we looked at yesterday?

24 A. No.

25 361 Q. But what this call does tell us is that 12:00
26 Anthony Donegan's mobile telephone ending 498, at 12:37
27 on the 12th was using a cell site in the Dundalk area?

28 A. It was, yes.

29 362 Q. So, if we move forward, please. [Presentation played].

1 If we just pause it there. We can see here we're about
2 just under two hours on from the last call made from
3 the 498 handset?

4 A. Yes.

5 363 Q. This is to the same unattributed person number -- 12:01

6 A. Yes.

7 364 Q. -- 529, but the significance for us, if there is any,
8 is the handset that is attributed to Anthony Donegan is
9 using a cell site at Clermont Carn?

10 A. Correct. 12:01

11 365 Q. Or sometimes pronounce had Clermont Cairn?

12 A. Yes, that's right.

13 366 Q. And that is up to the north and east of Dundalk?

14 A. That's right.

15 367 Q. We move forward, please, to our next entry. 12:02
16 [Presentation played]. Here we have an outgoing call,
17 is that right, from the Emerald Bar?

18 A. We do, yes.

19 368 Q. Which is in Dundalk?

20 A. Yes. 12:02

21 369 Q. And that is four-second call to the 989 telephone
22 number?

23 A. Yes.

24 370 Q. Provisionally attributed to Joe Fee?

25 A. Yes, that's right. 12:02

26 371 Q. Now, we're going to see something that appears in the
27 data more than once. If everybody looks at their
28 timeline at the entry that had previously been on
29 screen, bearing in mind what is on screen right now, we

1 see that at 14:50:16 there was a call of four seconds
2 from the Emerald Bar to Joseph Fee, and we can see the
3 next row, Mr. Safranauskas, that there was a
4 three-second call from Joseph Fee's mobile to his
5 answer phone? 12:03

6 A. Yes, that's right.

7 372 Q. Sir, it may be the lack of asterisk there is to
8 represent the fact that that's just a call to his
9 answer phone. But, at all events, we probably need to
10 unpick a little bit about the timings. 12:03

11

12 Now, the eagle-eyed may have noticed that row 7 in our
13 timeline, Mr. Safranauskas, the previous entry, was
14 timed at 14:50:16?

15 A. Yes. 12:03

16 373 Q. And that this entry is timed apparently 16 seconds
17 earlier because it's given the designation 14:50:00?

18 A. Yes.

19 374 Q. Is this the explanation for that apparent anomaly, that
20 the phone data we have doesn't provide in seconds when 12:03
21 the answer phone call was made?

22 A. Correct.

23 375 Q. And, therefore, we don't know, within 14:50, when that
24 answer phone call occurred whether it was before or
25 after the preceding call? 12:04

26 A. No, just that it happened within that minute.

27 376 Q. But that what we do see frequently within the data, and
28 not all of it included, that there is commonly the case
29 of a very short call to Joseph Fee and that in that

1 same minute there is also a call by Joe Fee to the
2 answer phone of a similar length?

3 A. Yes, that's right.

4 377 Q. So, we can see that the preceding call is just four
5 seconds, which may be consistent with a very short 12:04
6 message being left, and then there is a very short call
7 to the answer phone?

8 A. Yes.

9 378 Q. And so, what the Inquiry Legal Team has done is to pair
10 those two calls, to relate them to each other because 12:04
11 of the pattern within the data?

12 A. Correct.

13 379 Q. And to draw the inference that the answer phone call is
14 it likely to have occurred after the incoming call?

15 A. Yes. 12:05

16 380 Q. So, if we move forward, please, to see what is
17 happening at 3:30 that afternoon. [Presentation
18 played]. So, we're back to where we started,
19 Mr. Safranauskas?

20 A. We are, yes. 12:05

21 381 Q. At 3:30, an outgoing call from the Paul Kelly landline
22 to the green phone?

23 A. Yes.

24 382 Q. This a more substantial call, how long was it please?

25 A. 44 seconds. 12:05

26 383 Q. And, again, we've not included the cell site data for
27 the location of the 076 phone?

28 A. No.

29 384 Q. So, we're going to move now to Anthony Donegan, please,

1 and where his phone was at about the same time, so just
2 a few minutes later?

3 A. Yes.

4 385 Q. 15:43, a different unattributed number, 449?

5 A. Yes, that's right. 12:06

6 386 Q. For the purpose of this to illustrate where the
7 Anthony Donegan 498 handset was?

8 A. Yes.

9 387 Q. And it was in the area served by the 498 cell site?

10 A. The 0270 cell site. 12:06

11 388 Q. Yes, forgive me. And that cell site is a cell site
12 which was physically based in Dundalk?

13 A. Correct.

14 389 Q. Next, another call from the Donegan handset just a few
15 minutes later and still using the same cell with the 12:06
16 designation 0270.

17 A. Yes, that's right.

18 390 Q. If we go over the page, please. [Presentation played].
19 As we go through the afternoon, we have a sequence of
20 more calls involving the Anthony Donegan 498? 12:07

21 A. We do.

22 391 Q. 4:15 using the 0270 cell Dundalk?

23 A. Correct.

24 392 Q. If we move forward please. [Presentation played].
25 16:33, the same cell is being used? 12:07

26 A. It's 0375 now, not the 0270 but it's still in the
27 Dundalk area.

28 393 Q. Thank you. If we move forward to what is our row 14.
29 [Presentation played]. So here we have a number of

1 data points which may be of significance?

2 A. Yes.

3 394 Q. We're at just after 4:40 in the afternoon of the 12th?

4 A. Correct.

5 395 Q. We know, as a matter of fact, that in some few hours 12:08
6 Paul Ward's Vauxhall Cavalier will be stolen?

7 A. We do.

8 396 Q. We can see here a 40 a call of 48 seconds between the
9 Anthony Donegan 498 and the Paul Kelly 574 phones?

10 A. Yes. 12:08

11 397 Q. And at the time of the call, the cell site being used
12 by the Donegan handset is 0375, a cell site situated in
13 Dundalk?

14 A. Correct.

15 398 Q. We can also see that the user of the Paul Kelly 12:08
16 landline, who the Inquiry Legal Team provisionally
17 attribute as being Paul Kelly, also physically in
18 Dundalk at that time?

19 A. Yes, correct.

20 399 Q. Now, we're going to move to our row 15. [Presentation 12:09
21 played]. Just pause this, we need to say a little bit
22 more about this.

23 A. Yes.

24 400 Q. Now, we looked yesterday Damien Lawless and his wife?

25 A. We did. 12:09

26 401 Q. And the landline at the matrimonial home, the contract
27 for that was in the name of Damien Lawless's wife, is
28 that right?

29 A. It was, yes.

1 402 Q. But on the Inquiry Legal Team's provisional
2 attribution, we are exploring the hypothesis of whether
3 that was Damien Lawless who may have been using it?
4 A. Yes.

5 403 Q. A man with strong connections with the Real IRA and 12:09
6 convictions for terrorism?
7 A. Yes.

8 404 Q. Joseph Fee, also a man with terrorist-related
9 convictions?
10 A. That's correct, yes. 12:10

11 405 Q. And here, a contact of 28 seconds?
12 A. Yes.

13 406 Q. And the time is four minutes past five?
14 A. Correct, yes.

15 407 Q. We'll move forward, please, to a short time later. 12:10
16 [Presentation played]. This is just two minutes later.
17 Again, just remind us Mr. Safranauskas, we looked at
18 Alan Clarke yesterday?
19 A. We did, yes.

20 408 Q. What is his relationship that we looked at with 12:10
21 Joseph Fee?
22 A. He worked with him/employed him as an electrician.

23 409 Q. And did Alan Clarke also employ Sean Hoey in the same
24 capacity?
25 A. He did, yes. 12:10

26 410 Q. So, this is an outgoing call of one minute and one
27 second between two mobile telephones?
28 A. Yes.

29 411 Q. We then move forward please to 5:09 that afternoon?

1 A. Yes.

2 412 Q. And this is two brothers --

3 A. Yes.

4 413 Q. -- on the provisional attribution, 132 and 989,
5 speaking for a period of 42 seconds? 12:11

6 A. That's right, yes.

7 414 Q. [Presentation played]. The next entry we are going to
8 use just pause over for a moment, because this is one
9 of those entries, Mr. Safranauskas, that has been taken
10 into account in relation to the provisional attribution 12:11
11 of 430, is that right?

12 A. Yes.

13 415 Q. So, we heard yesterday that there was reason to believe
14 that Liam Campbell was the user of 615?

15 A. Yes. 12:11

16 416 Q. If Liam Campbell was using 615 at 17:24, then ordinary
17 human experience, Mr. Safranauskas, would suggest that
18 he wasn't phoning himself?

19 A. Correct.

20 417 Q. So, 430, which has been, as we heard, a phone that 12:12
21 Oliver Treanor was responsible for in terms of the
22 contract?

23 A. Yes.

24 418 Q. And as he accepted, that he paid the bill?

25 A. Yes. 12:12

26 419 Q. For the purpose of the working hypothesis, the
27 attributions which we discussed yesterday have taken
28 into account this call and some others that we're going
29 to look at?

1 A. Yes, they have.

2 420 Q. To draw the inference that it is Oliver Treanor using
3 430 at this time rather than Liam Campbell?

4 A. Exactly.

5 421 Q. But as we acknowledge, in the event that Liam Campbell 12:12
6 wasn't using 615, then that would mean that that
7 provisional attribution would be substantially weaker?

8 A. Yes.

9 422 Q. Next please. [Presentation played]. 17:26, now,
10 John Fee, is here making a telephone call to Derek 12:13
11 'Shanty' Brady?

12 A. Yes.

13 423 Q. In your experience, Mr. Safranauskas, is one of the
14 approaches used by police investigation to conduct what
15 is called call pattern analysis? 12:13

16 A. Yes.

17 424 Q. And that is to see whether or not there are patterns
18 within the calls from which it may be possible to draw
19 inferences about connections?

20 A. Yes. 12:13

21 425 Q. So, let's just have a look at this possibility. We can
22 see that at row 17, 17:09 John Fee called Joseph Fee
23 and that that call was for 45 seconds?

24 A. Yes.

25 426 Q. And then we can see that some 15 minutes or so later, 12:14
26 John Fee called Derek 'Shanty' Brady for a similar
27 period of time, namely 39 seconds?

28 A. Yes.

29 427 Q. Of course, I'm sure you'll be the first to accept,

1 Mr. Safranauskas, just on the basis of that information
2 one could not draw any certain conclusion that the two
3 calls are related?

4 A. No, they couldn't.

5 428 Q. But that exists as a possibility that we will want to 12:14
6 bear in mind as we go through?

7 A. It certainly would, yes.

8 429 Q. So, we'll see some even closer examples in due course,
9 but let us turn now please to row 20, which is now
10 timed at nine minutes to six in the evening. 12:15

11 A. Yes.

12 430 Q. Again, we see the same combination as we saw a moment
13 or two earlier, that previous call being about half an
14 hour before this one, the 615, provisionally attributed
15 to Liam Campbell calling the 437 red phone 12:15
16 provisionally attributed to Oliver Treanor at this
17 time?

18 A. Yes, correct.

19 431 Q. Next, row 21. We've moved forward over an hour in the
20 time. 12:15

21 A. Yes.

22 432 Q. This is the phone provisionally attributed to
23 Peter Campbell?

24 A. Yes.

25 433 Q. which is calling that 430 red phone? 12:15

26 A. Yes.

27 434 Q. And given the provisional attribution to Oliver Treanor
28 just an hour or so before, that provisional attribution
29 has been maintained here?

1 A. Yes.

2 435 Q. Next, we're going to see another of these pairings that
3 we've seen before. [Presentation played].
4 Seamus Daly, 076, calling 989, Joseph Fee?

5 A. Yes. 12:16

6 436 Q. The time of that 19:38:19?

7 A. Correct.

8 437 Q. The length of the call, four seconds?

9 A. Yes.

10 438 Q. So, if they spoke, not very much can have been imparted 12:16
11 by way of words?

12 A. Nothing of any real substance, no.

13 439 Q. Although it is possible that one can communicate quite
14 a lot in a very short period of time?

15 A. Yes. 12:16

16 440 Q. But, equally, if it was a voicemail the same would be
17 true?

18 A. Yes.

19 441 Q. We can see that at row 23 we have another of these
20 examples that we spoke about, that at some point in 12:16
21 19:38, Joseph Fee on the provisional attribution called
22 his answering service?

23 A. Yes.

24 442 Q. And the call was of similar length to the call from
25 Seamus Daly to Joseph Fee? 12:17

26 A. That's right, yes.

27 443 Q. So the pattern; incoming call to Joseph Fee and in the
28 same minute call to the answering service by Joseph Fee
29 for a similar length of time?

1 A. Yes.

2 444 Q. And if we move forward please to row 24. [Presentation
3 played]. We have another call to the answer service?

4 A. Yes.

5 445 Q. This a longer one, 16 seconds, and it's timed at 19:48? 12:17

6 A. Yes, correct.

7 446 Q. Now, it may be that that is in the wrong order on our
8 timeline because our next entry is timed at 19:48:27?

9 A. Yes.

10 447 Q. So, in the same minute as that answer phone entry? 12:18

11 A. Yes.

12 448 Q. For 15 seconds?

13 A. Yes.

14 449 Q. And that is a call Joseph Fee to Colm Murphy?

15 A. Yes. 12:18

16 450 Q. Now there, I say "may be" in fact, Mr. Safranauskas,
17 given that that's an outgoing call by Joseph Fee does
18 that tend to suggest that the order included in the
19 timeline is correct, in other words that Mr. Fee
20 checked his answer phone and then made a call to 12:18
21 Colm Murphy?

22 A. Yes, there's obvious commonality between the duration,
23 but when you look at the outgoing call, it's Joseph Fee
24 to Colm Murphy, so, yes, it's in the right order.

25 451 Q. Next, we're now at 19 minutes past eight in the 12:18
26 evening, do we see another call?

27 A. Yes.

28 452 Q. Joseph Fee to Colm Murphy?

29 A. Yes.

1 453 Q. Now, if we just again pause for a moment and bear in
2 mind call pattern analysis, and what that might be able
3 to help us with, if everybody looks at row 22, that is
4 an entry that we saw a few moments ago, 19:38, a call
5 from Seamus Daly to Joseph Fee? 12:19

6 A. Yes.

7 454 Q. Followed in this ordering by a checking of the answer
8 phone?

9 A. Yes.

10 455 Q. And then another check of the answer phone performed 12:19
11 ten minutes later?

12 A. Yes.

13 456 Q. And then a call by Joseph Fee to Colm Murphy?

14 A. Yes.

15 457 Q. So, again, is one potential inference that the message, 12:19
16 if that was what it was, by Seamus Daly to Joseph Fee
17 was something that he picked up and then caused him to
18 call Colm Murphy?

19 A. Yes.

20 MR. GREANEY: That takes us through to row 26 in our 12:20
21 presentation. I'm now going to turn over, please, to
22 Mr. Rafferty who's going to take us through the next
23 section and the Inquiry Legal Team summary.

24

25 MR. MARK SAFRANAUSKAS, WAS QUESTIONED BY MR. RAFFERTY 12:20
26 AS FOLLOWS:

27

28 458 Q. MR. RAFFERTY: Good afternoon, Mr. Safranauskas.

29 A. Good afternoon.

1 459 Q. whilst the presentation moves on, we're going to look,
2 aren't we, at the topic of attempted theft of vehicles
3 prior to 15th August, isn't that right?
4 A. We are, yes.

5 460 Q. And we're first going to look at the information from 12:20
6 Mr. Hugh McFadden?
7 A. Yes.

8 461 Q. Just to help orientate everyone in terms of the place,
9 and the date and the time. It's right, isn't it, that
10 he gave evidence or gave information to Gardaí to say 12:20
11 that he lived in County Donegal, isn't that right?
12 A. That's right, yes.

13 462 Q. And on the evening of 12th August 1998, he was making
14 his way home from Dublin to Donegal and stopped in
15 Carrickmacross, isn't that right? 12:21
16 A. Correct.

17 463 Q. And he said that he did that between 9:00 and 9:30 in
18 the evening?
19 A. Yes.

20 464 Q. So, Mr. McFadden said in his statement to the Gardaí 12:21
21 that he got out of his vehicle in Carrickmacross,
22 having parked it on the left-hand side of the street,
23 across from toilets at the bottom of the town. He said
24 that he locked the car with his key and that had the
25 effect of locking the door permanently and disabling 12:21
26 the engine. It could only be released by the car key.
27 And he said that on the way to the bathroom across the
28 road he noticed a large white Peugeot 405 parked facing
29 the same direction as his car on the opposite side of

1 the road. And isn't it right, Mr. Safranauskas, that
2 in describing the Peugeot he said that it was a pearl
3 white colour?

4 A. He did, yes.

5 465 Q. And can you recall what other description he gave in 12:21
6 relation to that vehicle?

7 A. He did say that two individuals got out of it.

8 466 Q. He said in his statement, I believe as well, that it
9 needed a wash?

10 A. Yes. 12:22

11 467 Q. But it was a vehicle that "looked to be in good nick"
12 in his terms. He said it was a car that had no spoiler
13 and no wheel trims, isn't that right?

14 A. Correct.

15 468 Q. And you were just going on to say that he had made an 12:22
16 observation, I think, is that right?

17 A. Yes. So, as he walked back to his car he saw two
18 individuals walking towards it.

19 469 Q. And he was particularly concerned, he said in his
20 statement to the guards about the rear left-hand 12:22
21 passenger door, isn't that right?

22 A. Yes.

23 470 Q. So we understand from Mr. McFadden that he said that
24 the central locking on this particular door, something
25 hadn't been working properly and that had been the case 12:22
26 for some time. He said that sometimes he would forget
27 to check that door manually. And he told the Gardaí
28 that having checked his car he then went to look for a
29 restaurant that he knew, isn't that right,

1 Mr. Safranauskas?

2 A. Yes.

3 471 Q. He said the restaurant was busy and he decided to
4 travel on home to Donegal?

5 A. Yes. 12:23

6 472 Q. So, if we can move the presentation on please.
7 [Presentation played]. We understand, Sir, that as he
8 was walking back to his car that he saw, initially from
9 a distance of about 200 yards, the two men that he'd
10 seen earlier sitting in the white Peugeot 405 at his 12:23
11 car. Mr. McFadden, Sir, we will go on to provide
12 information to the guards in September and he would
13 compile, ultimately, or the guards would compile,
14 ultimately, a CompuSketch of the people who he
15 described as being at his vehicle. 12:23

16

17 Now, am I right, Mr. Safranauskas, that the
18 CompuSketch, as you can see, is labelled
19 "CompuSketch 2," is the person that he described as
20 having been the passenger of the Peugeot 405 vehicle? 12:23

21 A. Yes.

22 473 Q. Mr. McFadden said, Sir, that he was the person who was
23 standing beside the driver's door of his vehicle. And
24 he said that he was looking in the sunroof.
25 Mr. McFadden described him as someone in the following 12:24
26 terms. He said that:
27
28 "He was very well built, very robust, about 17 stone,
29 close to six foot in height, in his early thirties.

1 His hair was scrappy looking, straggly at the back,
2 greasy and combed back as if he had run his fingers
3 through it. It was black in colour and he had a black
4 goatee beard with a moustache as part of it. The rest
5 of his faced had stubble on it. He was a bit fattish 12:24
6 around the face. He would be overweight and he wore a
7 check shirt with the colour black in it and blue jeans.
8 They were faded out looking but not dirty."

9
10 Mr. McFadden said that he had the impression, Sir, that 12:24
11 the person had tried the driver's door to see if he
12 could open it. He said:

13
14 "The other individual was at the back of the vehicle
15 and was leant over and looked as if he was trying to 12:25
16 open the front."

17
18 He went on to say that:

19
20 "He had gone onto the footpath on the passenger side of 12:25
21 my car and I saw him looking into my car. He also
22 seemed to be trying the doorhandles."

23
24 And that second person that he described,
25 Mr. Safranauskas, that's the person you can see 12:25
26 depicted in CompuSketch 1, isn't that right?

27 A. That's right, yes.

28 474 Q. Mr. McFadden said:

29 "The second fellow was smaller than the first, about

1 5'10, mid to late 20s, 25 to 27 years old with sandy
2 blonde hair."

3 A. Yes.

4 475 Q. He said:

5
6 "It was short and straggly and it looked a little as if
7 he had just got out of bed."

8
9 Isn't that right?

10 A. Yes.

11 476 Q. Mr. McFadden went on to say:

12
13 "I cannot remember what he was wearing, he was the
14 driver of the Peugeot 405."

15
16 Just move on in the presentation a little bit.
17 [Presentation played]. Mr. McFadden said that when he
18 was about 30 yards away from his vehicle he got the
19 impression two men had seen him and started to move
20 back towards their car. He unlocked his car and got 12:25
21 in, looking across the Peugeot 405, when he said he saw
22 what he described as "the big hefty fellow staring at
23 me staring me out." Mr. McFadden then concluded,
24 Mr. Safranauskas, didn't he, by saying:

25
26 "The Peugeot drove off doing a U-turn coming back up
27 the street and away."

28
29 A. That's correct, yes.

1 MR. RAFFERTY: Thank you, Mr. Safranauskas, I think we
2 can look at line 28 on the timeline now.
3
4 MR. MARK SAFRANAUSKAS WAS QUESTIONED FURTHER BY MR. DE
5 LA POER AS FOLLOWS: 12:26
6
7 477 Q. MR. DE LA POER: If I can return to look at small
8 number of telephone calls.
9 A. Yes.
10 478 Q. Seamus Daly to Joseph Fee on the provisional 12:26
11 attributions?
12 A. Yes.
13 479 Q. The time is now 21:19?
14 A. Yes.
15 480 Q. Now, again, I'd just remind everybody that there had 12:26
16 been contact between these two handsets at 19:38, that
17 was our row 22?
18 A. Yes.
19 481 Q. And that there was, in between that contact and the one
20 we are looking at, at row 28, also contact between 12:27
21 Joseph Fee 989 mobile and the Colm Murphy 585 mobile?
22 A. That's right, yes.
23 482 Q. Having considered row 28, let's move forward please to
24 row 29. [Presentation played]. Steadily,
25 Mr. Safranauskas, working our way through the evening 12:27
26 of 12th August?
27 A. Yes.
28 483 Q. And here at row 29 we can see a voice call of
29 50 seconds between the landline of Paul Jennings and

1 556, Sile Grew?

2 A. Yes.

3 484 Q. And we remind ourselves from yesterday that they were

4 siblings-in-law?

5 A. They were, yes. 12:27

6 485 Q. [Presentation played]. Row 30, 21:55, a 13-second

7 contact between the Joseph Fee 989, Seamus Daly green

8 phone, 076?

9 A. Yes.

10 486 Q. So, again, just reminding ourselves of what we've 12:28

11 looked at over the course of this evening in terms of

12 those particular handsets: Contact at 19:38 for a very

13 short time; subsequent contact with Colm Murphy in the

14 early evening; contact at 21:19 (that's our row 28);

15 and then the position is reversed in terms of which is 12:28

16 the calling number at 21:55, about half an hour later?

17 A. Yes.

18 487 Q. Row 31, the last in this sequence. [Presentation

19 played]. We have the Colm Murphy landline?

20 A. Yes. 12:28

21 488 Q. That is 911, and that is contacting the 556 mobile of

22 Sile Grew. A lengthy contact, by any measure, two

23 minutes and 16 seconds?

24 A. Yes.

25 489 Q. Now, the next entry we're just going to note at the 12:29

26 moment, we're going to hear soon an animation in

27 relation to John Brady but not just yet. But, we can

28 note that according to his witness statement, as

29 Mr. Rafferty will take us through in due course, that

1 at 22:30 he parked his blue Opel Vectra outside 25,
2 St. Macartan's Villas at Carrickmacross?

3 A. Yes.

4 MR. GREANEY: Giving that as the approximate time that
5 he was parking. I'll hand over now, please, to 12:29
6 Mr. Rafferty to deal with row 33.

7

8 MR. MARK SAFRANAUSKAS WAS QUESTIONED FURTHER BY
9 MR. RAFFERTY AS FOLLOWS:

10 12:29

11 490 Q. MR. RAFFERTY: So, Mr. Safranauskas, we're going to
12 look at the information received Mr. Paul Ward, and
13 that's, obviously, a name that the Inquiry has heard
14 already this week?

15 A. Yes. 12:30

16 491 Q. Mr. Ward, Sir, told the Gardaí on 16th August 1998 that
17 he was in a relationship with a lady called,
18 Teresa Connolly, who lived at an address at 56
19 St. Macartan's Villas in Carrickmacross, isn't that
20 right, Mr. Safranauskas? 12:30

21 A. Yes.

22 492 Q. I think is that what we're about to see in the
23 presentation?

24 A. Yes.

25 493 Q. Mr. Ward told the Gardaí that he saw her almost every 12:30
26 weekend since buying the car, which I will come to in a
27 moment, Sir. He said that:

28

29 "Since September 1997, I would routinely park my car

1 outside 56 St. Macartan's Villas most weekend nights
2 and it would normally be parked for up to four hours."
3
4 And he said that he had his car washed and filled with
5 petrol on the evening of the 12th, wednesday 12th 12:30
6 August 1998. Having left his home at around about 8:30
7 in the evening, and then drove to Ms. Connolly's house.
8 He stated, Sir, that he drove along the main
9 Dublin-Derry Road to Carrickmacross and then up through
10 Cloughvalley, up Farney Street and on to St. Macartan's 12:31
11 villas "where I parked it outside number 56 for about
12 30 minutes." And then, Mr. Safranauskas, he told the
13 Gardaí, didn't he, that he then left the property with
14 Ms. Connolly?
15 A. Yes. 12:31
16 494 Q. He travelled in his vehicle to Hope Castle in
17 Castleblayney which is understood by the Inquiry,
18 certainly, to be a licensed premises. At this point
19 where we see St. Macartan's Villas, number 56, you've
20 already been asked question about the individual called 12:31
21 Anthony Donegan?
22 A. I have, yes.
23 495 Q. I believe the Inquiry has already received some
24 information in relation to an account given by
25 Mr. Donegan -- 12:31
26 A. Yes.
27 496 Q. -- which related to St. Macartan's villas, isn't that
28 correct?
29 A. Yes.

1 497 Q. As best you can, could you try and assist us to marry
2 together the information he gave to the Gardaí and what
3 we see then on screen in the presentation?
4 A. Yes. So, this will become more apparent in subsequent
5 entries when we have a look at a sketch that 12:32
6 Anthony Donegan gave of the area of Macartan's villas
7 in a police interview. Now, what I would draw your
8 attention to, at this point, is the long stretch of
9 road which is Macartan's villas and, again, we'll see
10 it as the piece plays on, we'll see an "X" around a 12:32
11 particular spot on that long stretch of road. And then
12 what we'll also see on that sketch is that there is an
13 arcing road which in this context here is Convent View,
14 but in Anthony Donegan's sketch when applying this
15 logic to it, it does bear resemblance to the Macartan's 12:32
16 villas area.
17 498 Q. Yes, and does it bear resemblance to the arc that
18 you've described?
19 A. It does, yes.
20 499 Q. Thank you. And, so, he we know that Mr. Ward and 12:33
21 Ms. Connolly stayed at the place called Hope Castle
22 until around 10:40 on that evening and that they left
23 to return to Carrickmacross. Mr. Ward said that he had
24 returned to his car and found it as he left it before
25 travelling back to her property. And he said: 12:33
26
27 "At that stage all lights worked on the week on this
28 journey and all had been working perfectly up to that
29 date, other than the light flashing unit on the

1 headlight switch. Nobody followed me, to my knowledge,
2 and on arrival at 56 St. Macartan's Villas at
3 11:00 p.m. I saw nothing unusual.
4

5 So if we can move the presentation on please. 12:33

6 [Presentation played]. We are going to see next an
7 image of a vehicle, could you tell us about that
8 vehicle please, Mr. Safranauskas?

9 A. Yes. So, we have already heard information about this.
10 This is Paul Ward's vehicle which he cleaned and 12:34
11 polished and took a photo of.

12 500 Q. We know, Sir, in a statement that he provided to the
13 Gardaí on 16th August that he said that:
14

15 "In September of 1997, when I resumed my duties at 12:34
16 Dundalk RTC, I bought a car, a maroon-coloured Vauxhall
17 Cavalier 1600 CC petrol from Martin Carragher in
18 Annyalla in Castleblayney, paying £3,300 for it. I
19 would describe the car as being wine in colour and in
20 very good condition. It had central locking, a 12:34
21 sunroof, electric windows, and had a tow bar fitted - a
22 standard-type one."
23

24 Mr. Ward said, Sir, that:
25

26 "The car's registration plate read 91-DL-2554 written
27 in black on a white background with an IRL crest in the
28 corner."
29

Mr. Ward knew that the car had been imported. He said:

1
2 "The car was undamaged with no dents or scratches save
3 for a small spot of rust on a rear panel."
4
5 He went on to say: 12:35
6
7 "The only additions to the vehicle were two main mud
8 flaps..." which he had fitted himself.
9
10 He said the car had a badge in the front windscreen in 12:35
11 relation to his part-time employment. He then went on
12 to say in another statement to the Gardaí, the car
13 displayed a tax disc and an insurance disc in a white
14 plastic rectangular holder, which was located in the
15 front windscreen in the centre and behind the rearview 12:35
16 mirror. He said the tax disc expired in July 1998, and
17 the insurance was due to expire in July of 1999.
18
19 If I could ask you to play the presentation,
20 Mr. Safranauskas. [Presentation played]. If you can 12:36
21 tell us what we see on the screen now?
22 A. Yes, this is V5 certificate of ownership of the
23 Vauxhall Cavalier owned by Mr. Paul Ward.
24 501 Q. And we can see in the top left-hand corner,
25 approximately, of the image, the name Mr. Paul Ward, 12:36
26 isn't that correct?
27 A. We can, yes.
28 502 Q. I think he we might be able to see this in at least two
29 different locations, but in the bottom right-hand

1 corner, or thereabouts, you appear to see the
2 registration 91-DL-2554, is that correct?
3 A. Just there, yes.
4 503 Q. Thank you. If we can move the presentation on.
5 [Presentation played]. We should then see 12:36
6 56 St. Macartan's Villas?
7 A. Yes.
8 504 Q. He is that the property to the foreground?
9 A. Yes, correct.
10 505 Q. Behind the post that we see towards the left, is that 12:36
11 correct?
12 A. Yes. Just there, yes.
13 506 Q. Thank you. We know, Sir, here that Mr. Ward told the
14 Gardaí, he said:
15 12:36
16 "I parked my car about 10 feet forward of the entrance
17 to number 56 and adjacent to a high green hedge."
18
19 I think, Mr. Safranauskas, in terms of the hedge that
20 Mr. Ward's describing, can you just see that on the 12:37
21 image?
22 A. Yes, just there.
23 507 Q. He said:
24
25 "I locked the car having clicked the steering wheel in 12:37
26 the locked position. When I parked it, it read 96,660
27 miles or thereabouts, 50 miles up or down."
28 508 Q.
29 That's the hedge that we referred to a minute ago?

1 A. Yes.

2 509 Q. And what direction is this image?

3 A. This is going the opposite direction, so 56 Macartan's

4 villas would be to the right of camera view.

5 MR. RAFFERTY: Thank you, Mr. Safranauskas. 12:37

6

7 MR. MARK SAFRANAUSKAS WAS QUESTIONED FURTHER BY MR. DE

8 LA POER AS FOLLOWS:

9

10 510 Q. MR. DE LA POER: If you would like to play the 12:38

11 presentation on. [Presentation played]. We move away

12 from events in Carrickmacross and we return to the

13 telephone calls?

14 A. Yes.

15 511 Q. Row 34 in our timeline, as displayed on the screen, 12:38

16 we're now at one minute past 11 in the evening on 12th

17 August, is that right?

18 A. Yes.

19 512 Q. And we have a call from the 076 green phone to the

20 family home of the Daly family? 12:38

21 A. Yes.

22 513 Q. And that is a call that lasts a period of one minute

23 and six seconds?

24 A. Yes, that's right.

25 514 Q. We're going to see that combination calling from 076 to 12:38

26 the Patrick Daly phone later again, aren't we?

27 A. We are, yes.

28 515 Q. Now, we're back to combination we have already seen

29 here?

1 A. Yes.

2 516 Q. This is a call from the Colm Murphy landline in the
3 Ravensdale area?

4 A. Yes.

5 517 Q. And it is to the Sile Grew mobile telephone? 12:39

6 A. Yes.

7 518 Q. 556, a duration of 49 seconds and if anybody wants to
8 make a cross-reference, we saw that same combination at
9 row 31 for a period of two minutes and 16, and that was
10 a call that was about half an hour or nearly an hour 12:39
11 earlier to this one?

12 A. Yes.

13 519 Q. So, over the page. [Presentation played]. If we just
14 take our time on this one, Mr. Greaney already
15 introduced it to us on Monday, but it's important to 12:40
16 note all of the data points that are available in
17 relation; do you agree?

18 A. Yeah, I do.

19 520 Q. So, this is a call at 21:21:03?

20 A. Yes. 12:40

21 521 Q. And it is from the landline of Paul Kelly?

22 A. Yes.

23 522 Q. And it is to the phone of Anthony Donegan?

24 A. Yes.

25 523 Q. We have a red beacon marking the location of the 12:40
26 landline but this is an occasion, Mr. Safranauskas, on
27 which we asked Dr. Tart to help us with the cell site
28 information but there is no such information available
29 within the material we have?

1 A. Yes, that's correct.

2 524 Q. And are you aware - and Dr. Tart will be able to speak
3 to this in greater detail - the reason for that may be
4 that it is an incoming call on that handset where data
5 for cell site was less reliably recorded? 12:40

6 A. Yes, that's my understanding.

7 525 Q. So, we don't know which mast the Donegan phone is using
8 at that time, we know that earlier that day he had used
9 masts in the Dundalk area and there is one occasion of
10 a use of a mast to the northwest of that, but in the 12:41
11 run-up to this period, in terms of the most recent
12 calls, the masts were in the Dundalk area?

13 A. Yes, that's right.

14 526 Q. And we can see from the duration of the call of 27
15 seconds, that call will have ended at 23:21:30? 12:41

16 A. Yes, that's right.

17 527 Q. So, that is row 36. If we then move to row 37, which
18 is the next presentation point. [Presentation played].
19 So, having being involved in a 27-second call with the
20 Anthony Donegan mobile telephone, just 28 seconds after 12:42
21 it ends?

22 A. Yes.

23 528 Q. So, we're 23:21:58, that same Paul Kelly landline now
24 calls Seamus Daly's 076 green phone?

25 A. Yes, that's right. 12:42

26 529 Q. And the length of that call, as a matter of fact, is
27 precisely, to the second, the same length?

28 A. Yes.

29 530 Q. And, again, Mr. Safranauskas, based on your experience,

1 this is an example where the potential inference as to
2 a connection between calls may become stronger?

3 A. Yeah, this is a much stronger example of that.

4 531 Q. Of course, that isn't necessarily conclusive on its own
5 but we see a very close time relationship between the 12:42
6 calls?

7 A. Yes, we do.

8 532 Q. And when one is looking at these sort of inferences, is
9 one of the factors that may be taken into account in
10 terms of assessing its strength, to see whether we see 12:43
11 that same pattern occur any other time?

12 A. Exactly that, yes.

13 533 Q. The line of reasoning going that it is less likely that
14 they are unrelated if the pattern occurs more than
15 once? 12:43

16 A. Yes.

17 534 Q. So, just recap over the two calls that we've seen, the
18 time is shortly before midnight, about 39 minutes
19 before midnight on the 12th?

20 A. Yes. 12:43

21 535 Q. Tipping into the 13th. The contact, firstly, from
22 Paul Kelly and to Anthony Donegan, and then immediately
23 after from Paul Kelly to Seamus Daly?

24 A. That's right, yes.

25 MR. DE LE POER: I'll turn back to the part of the 12:43
26 presentation that deals with what happens in
27 Carrickmacross at this point.
28
29

1 MR. MARK SAFRANAUSKAS WAS QUESTIONED FURTHER BY
2 MR. RAFFERTY AS FOLLOWS:

3
4 536 Q. MR. RAFFERTY: we're going to look now at the period of
5 time, the early hours of 13th August?

12:44

6 A. Yes.

7 537 Q. And potential sightings of Mr. Ward's vehicle, isn't
8 that right?

9 A. Yes.

10 538 Q. We heard from Detective Superintendent Casserly earlier
11 on, and he's given some evidence about those sightings,
12 but the first that we are aware of is from Ms. Rose
13 Finnegan, is that correct?

12:44

14 A. Yes.

15 539 Q. And she lived close to St. Macartan's Villas, is that
16 correct?

12:44

17 A. That's right, yes.

18 540 Q. Can you just show that to us on the screen, please.

19 A. That's a bit further down, around here [indicating].

20 541 Q. And we know that she told the Gardaí that she had been
21 at home all day on 12th August, Sir, and that at around
22 15 minutes after midnight, so very early on 13th
23 August, she had accompanied someone onto the footpath
24 outside her home, and when doing so they noticed a
25 maroon-coloured car parked on the street, and she said
26 that it had a Donegal registration, isn't that correct,
27 Mr. Safranauskas?

12:44

12:45

28 A. It is, yes.

29 542 Q. And she recalled a certain part of the registration, is

1 that correct?

2 A. Yes.

3 543 Q. What was that?

4 A. 91-DL.

5 544 Q. And she couldn't remember the figures that followed 12:45

6 that, is that correct?

7 A. Correct.

8 545 Q. So, Ms. Finnegan told the Gardaí that the car was, in

9 her view, probably owned by a relative of a neighbour

10 who lived in Donegal. She said she knew nothing about 12:45

11 cars but it was a maroon car that was facing the end of

12 the cul-de-sac. She said that she had her hand on the

13 front passenger wing of the car. And that she'd seen

14 it parked in a similar position on a number of previous

15 occasions. whilst she didn't know the owner, she said 12:45

16 that she knew the car to see and she didn't see

17 anything else of interest or hear anything of interest

18 at that time.

19

20 we can move the presentation on to the next sighting, 12:45

21 Mr. Safranauskas.

22 A. Yes.

23 546 Q. That involves Mrs. Teresa Drumgoole, isn't that

24 correct?

25 A. Yes. 12:46

26 547 Q. And she lives also in the vicinity?

27 A. Yes.

28 548 Q. She lives at 45 St. Macartan's villas?

29 A. Correct.

1 549 Q. And she said that she and her family drove a maroon
2 four-door saloon Vauxhall Cavalier vehicle, which will
3 appear on the screen now in a moment?
4 A. Yes.
5 550 Q. That's it on the right-hand side in two images, 12:46
6 Mr. Safranauskas?
7 A. That's right, yes.
8 551 Q. She said, Sir, to the Gardaí that on the night of 12th
9 August she parked her car outside number 47, as the
10 space outside her home was occupied. She described the 12:46
11 car as being around 10 to 15 yards from her front gate.
12 She left the car unlocked, as she always did. She did
13 not check the steering lock was in place.
14
15 Sir, Mrs. Drumgoole went to bed about 15 minutes after 12:46
16 midnight on 13th August, very early hours of that
17 morning, with her bedroom being to the upstairs front
18 of the property she said that the window was open and
19 the curtains were drawn. Mrs. Drumgoole said she lay
20 awake for some time. 12:47
21
22 Mr. Safranauskas, at around a quarter to one or ten to
23 one in the morning it's correct to say that the engine
24 of her car was being turned outside?
25 A. Yes, that's right. 12:47
26 552 Q. And did she say that she heard it just give one engine
27 spin?
28 A. Yes.
29 553 Q. And then stopped?

1 A. Yes.

2 554 Q. "Which is also a feature of the starter of my car. It
3 will only turn once and then you have to turn the key
4 and start again. There was complete silence after
5 that. I heard no vehicles or persons or anything 12:47
6 outside."
7

8 Sir, Mrs. Drumgoole said she went to the window seconds
9 later but that she didn't see anything or anyone. From
10 where she was standing she could not see the place 12:47
11 where she parked her car. She said that she went back
12 to bed and went to sleep and that she went to her car
13 about 15 minutes after midday on 13th August. She said
14 the car had not been moved. There was nothing unusual
15 in the vehicle or on the ground around the car. 12:48
16

17 Mrs. Drumgoole said that she noticed the driver's door
18 was closed but not fully secure saying to the Gardaí
19 that you would have to give it another push to fully
20 close it. She did not notice any damage in the car or 12:48
21 anything missing. It started normally for her although
22 she noticed that the wiper switch was on.
23

24 If we could move the presentation on please.
25 [Presentation played]. We're going to look, 12:48
26 Mr. Safranauskas, at another person whose name we've
27 heard already which is Mr. Patrick Conlon, isn't that
28 correct?
29 A. Yes, that's right.

1 555 Q. And he lived in Pearse Avenue?
2 A. Yes.
3 556 Q. Close to St. Macartan's Villas?
4 A. Correct.
5 557 Q. He gave information to the Gardaí, Sir, about what he 12:49
6 heard and what he was doing on the evening of 12th
7 August into the morning of 13th August.
8
9 Mr. Conlon said, he described, it as quiet residential
10 area where he lived, consisting of a row of houses 12:49
11 which had an entrance at each end. Both entrances are
12 described as being on a steep rise. And he said around
13 about 1:00 a.m. on the morning of 13th August, car
14 lights were noticed reflecting off his front sitting
15 room window, just above where he had been watching 12:49
16 television. You heard earlier, Sir, about a football
17 match that had been of interest to him.
18
19 Mr. Conlon said that he was very wary of strange people
20 or cars being in the area. He pulled up the roller 12:49
21 blind, looked out and saw a car travelling from the
22 direction of Dundalk. Mr. Conlon described it as
23 cruising very slowly. He thought the vehicle was a red
24 Peugeot 405 car and said that he was almost 100% sure
25 about this. He thought it was suspicious given that it 12:50
26 was travelling slowly.
27
28 Mr. Conlon thought that the registration plate of the
29 vehicle included the details "JI," or possibly "RJI."

1 He said the three people were in the vehicle and had
2 travelled towards Carrickmacross Town Centre which is
3 when he last saw it.
4
5 The presentation, Mr. Safranauskas, can we move on 12:50
6 towards the centre of Carrickmacross?
7 A. Yes.
8 558 Q. [Presentation played]. And it's here that Garda Eugene
9 McKenna, an officer stationed in Carrickmacross at the
10 time in August 1998 said in his statement that he was 12:50
11 on duty in the early hours of 13th August. And he
12 said:
13
14 "At approximately 1:00 a.m. or 1:05, while approaching
15 Main Street Carrickmacross from Parnell Street in the 12:50
16 Shercock Road direction I slowed down and stopped my
17 vehicle. And as I did, saw a dark red or
18 maroon-coloured car, an Opel or a Vauxhall car,
19 Cavalier model drive down Main Street towards the
20 courthouse or Castleblayney direction." 12:51
21
22 Can you just clarify, Mr. Safranauskas, the direction
23 of the courthouse or Castleblayney as we look at it?
24 A. It would be off the left of the screen.
25 559 Q. So the vehicle that he sees was travelling from right 12:51
26 to left, is that right?
27 A. That's right, yes.
28 560 Q. He said:
29

1 "It was travelling fairly fast but not too fast. I
2 recall part of the registration number as 91-DL-5, I
3 cannot recall the other figures in the number plate.
4 It was actually the 'DL' caught my attention. There
5 appeared to be two occupants in the front of the 12:51
6 vehicle. I got a fleeting glimpse of the driver,
7 description as follows: A young male, late teens or
8 early 20s. Good or broad build. Seated over steering.
9 Sharp features. Slightly pointed nose. Short hair,
10 appeared fair or mousy. Fairly distinctive appearance, 12:51
11 possibly wearing a dark-coloured jacket. He appeared
12 square shouldered. I cannot say for definite if there
13 was a front seat passenger, I was aware of a shadow
14 only."
15 12:52
16 Garda McKenna, Sir, said that he spoke to Mr. Ward at
17 around 3:30 that morning when he reported his vehicle
18 stolen and he said that he didn't appear to be the
19 person observed in the red car earlier on Main Street.
20 12:52
21 The presentation then shows, Sir, as you can see, the
22 vehicle seen by Garda McKenna driving off towards the
23 left.
24
25 The presentation, Mr. Safranauskas, then moves back to 12:52
26 St. Macartan's Villas?
27 A. It does, yes.
28 561 Q. What time are we looking at?
29 A. We're now at around 3:30 in the morning.

1 562 Q. I think it might be a little earlier, Mr. Safranauskas.
2 A. Apologies, 1:45.
3 563 Q. 1:45, and here we see the vehicle of Mr. John Brady, is
4 that correct?
5 A. Yes. 12:52
6 564 Q. And his address was in St. Macartan's Villas?
7 A. It was, yes.
8 565 Q. Number 25, as he indicated on the presentation?
9 A. Yes.
10 566 Q. He said to the Gardaí that he owned a metallic blue 12:53
11 Opel Vectra, 1600 CC petrol saloon, four-door car. You
12 can see that, Mr. Safranauskas, in the top right-hand
13 corner of the screen?
14 A. We can, yes.
15 567 Q. He said that it had a registration 90-D-34639, is that 12:53
16 correct?
17 A. It did, yes.
18 568 Q. It appears on the screen. He described it as a
19 standard model with no extras whatsoever, and that it
20 had an individual door locking system which was all 12:53
21 working. He said that an alarm had been fitted but had
22 not been working for two or three months.
23
24 Did Mr. Brady say, Mr. Safranauskas, that he returned
25 home on the evening of 12th August, isn't that correct? 12:53
26 A. That's right, yes.
27 569 Q. And he said that he parked close to his house, is that
28 correct?
29 A. Yes.

1 570 Q. At about 10:30 and under a streetlight?

2 A. Yes.

3 571 Q. He said that he locked the car by clicking the steering

4 lock into place?

5 A. Yes. 12:54

6 572 Q. He told the Gardaí, Sir, that around quarter to two in

7 the morning, so 1:45 a.m. on the 13th, that he heard

8 the voices of males outside coming from the area of the

9 road, footpath outside his house. He did not, he said,

10 check on the voices and he could not make out the 12:54

11 accents. Mr. Brady said that he was conscious about

12 his car being parked outside and that he was protective

13 of it since there had been a previous attempt to steal

14 a different car of his four years earlier.

15 12:54

16 He said that at 9:00 a.m. on 13th of August, he left

17 his house and when he went to unlock his vehicle he saw

18 that he had been tampered with. So, Mr. Safranauskas,

19 can I just ask you to take us through the photograph

20 that we see in the bottom right of the screen? 12:54

21 A. Yes. So, we see damage to the door handle here.

22 573 Q. Mr. Brady told the Gardaí that it appeared to him that

23 there was damage where someone had pulled the plastic

24 mould surrounding the door lock. He could see in his

25 view that some type of instrument had been used to do 12:55

26 this as there was a deep round score mark that had been

27 made on the metal which I think, Mr. Safranauskas, you

28 have identified?

29 A. Yes.

1 574 Q. And he said he pushed the mould back into place,
2 travelled on to work and reported the incident to the
3 Gardaí that night.
4
5 I think we can now turn to row 43, Mr. Safranauskas, on 12:55
6 the timeline.
7 A. Yes.
8
9 MR. MARK SAFRANAUSKAS WAS QUESTIONED FURTHER BY MR. DE
10 LA POER AS FOLLOWS: 12:55
11
12 575 Q. MR. DE LA POER: So, Mr. Safranauskas, the row 43 isn't
13 given a specific time, but the weight of the eyewitness
14 evidence appears to suggest that it is sometime after
15 midnight, probably sometime around one o'clock. And 12:55
16 you will have very considerable experience, I know, of
17 the fact that sometimes eyewitnesses aren't exactly
18 precise with their timings because they don't
19 necessarily realise that what they're seeing is
20 significant? 12:56
21 A. No.
22 576 Q. But nevertheless we have a weight of evidence, we just
23 summarise it, which indicates that at about 12:15 the
24 Vauxhall Cavalier was still where it had been parked?
25 A. Yes. 12:56
26 577 Q. So, that is the eyewitness evidence of Rose Finnegan.
27 And then we have a number of eyewitnesses who lived in
28 and around the area, giving times of variously 12:45,
29 one o'clock or 1:45?

1 A. That's right.

2 578 Q. And we also have, from a witness who might be expected
3 to be more conscious of the exact time and who was
4 awake and alert and on duty namely Garda McKenna, that
5 at about one o'clock a vehicle matching the description 12:56
6 of the stolen Vauxhall driving past him in the
7 direction, one would expect, if it was going that way
8 from 56 Macartan's Villas?

9 A. That's right, yes.

10 579 Q. So, that gives rise to the entry 43, that it is from 12:56
11 this point that we are proceeding on the working
12 hypothesis that the car has been stolen?

13 A. Yes, that's right.

14 580 Q. Sir, I note the time but I think there will be
15 sufficient time, if I may, just to do the next four 12:57
16 entries and then that may be a convenient moment.

17

18 First, we have here which relates to 43, this is a
19 sketch that you've mentioned already, Mr. Safranauskas?

20 A. Yes. 12:57

21 581 Q. And do you want to just indicate, there are two
22 attempts which we can see from the handwriting left and
23 right at the top?

24 A. Yes.

25 582 Q. So, we'll ignore the first attempt but this is a 12:57
26 diagram that was drawn in interview by Anthony Donegan?

27 A. Yes.

28 583 Q. Leaving aside the first attempt, can you just draw our
29 attention, please, to the curve that you had previously

1 drawn our attention to, just to see if there's anything
2 that we can make at all of this?

3 A. Yes. So, the curved road there, this long stretch of
4 road here being Macartan's Villas.

5 584 Q. So, that's one possible interpretation of this but 12:58
6 would you be the first to agree that it's difficult to
7 make sense of this diagram, it isn't a clean fit on the
8 footprint at St. Macartan's Villas?

9 A. No, absolutely not.

10 585 Q. And it should be taken together in context with what 12:58
11 Mr. Donegan was saying at the time?

12 A. Yes, exactly that. Yes.

13 586 Q. Let's turn to the next four entries please.
14 [Presentation played]. Firstly, you've helped us here
15 with the distance from Carrickmacross where the vehicle 12:58
16 was taken, to the centre of Dundalk, a distance of
17 24.3 kilometres?

18 A. Yes.

19 587 Q. So, approximately 15 miles or so --

20 A. That's right. 12:59

21 588 Q. -- as the crow flies. 2:28, so if we proceed on the
22 basis the vehicle was stolen sometime around
23 one o'clock or so, by this time that would be
24 sufficient time, with the distances involved, for a
25 person to drive from Carrickmacross to Dundalk; do you 12:59
26 agree?

27 A. Yes, it would.

28 589 Q. We can see that Anthony Donegan's 498 phone is using a
29 cell site based in the Dundalk area?

1 A. Yes.

2 590 Q. And he is calling Paul Kelly's landline?

3 A. Yes.

4 591 Q. The call is of 12 seconds?

5 A. Yes. 12:59

6 592 Q. which means that will finish at 2:28:51?

7 A. Yes.

8 593 Q. And if we then move forward, please. [Presentation
9 played]. Less than one minute later, having been
10 called by the Anthony Donegan 498 phone for 12 seconds, 13:00
11 we see the Paul Kelly landline making an outbound call
12 to the Seamus Daly 076 phone?

13 A. Yes.

14 594 Q. That call is for exactly the same duration, 12 seconds?

15 A. Yes. 13:00

16 595 Q. And, as I've said, it's under a minute later?

17 A. Yes, that's right.

18 596 Q. So, there, if we have a look earlier in our timeline,
19 36 and 37, we see a not dissimilar pattern in terms of
20 the proximity of the call, the participants or the 13:00
21 numbers and their relative length to each other?

22 A. The 23:21 calls.

23 597 Q. Yes, indeed. Just to complete this sequence, please,
24 that was row 44, this is row 45. We see that just a
25 couple of minutes later, another contact from the 13:01
26 Paul Kelly landline to the Seamus Daly green phone?

27 A. Yes.

28 598 Q. And that's for a period of 18 seconds?

29 A. That's right.

1 599 Q. And then row 47, a third call in the space of less than
2 five minutes from the Paul Kelly landline to the 076
3 green phone?
4 A. That's right, yes.
5 600 Q. And those calls, when taking the combination of calls 13:01
6 together, the people to whom it's been provisionally
7 attributed, what is happening in the Carrickmacross
8 that we've just been looking at in between and what we
9 know is to happen involving Seamus Daly, all lead to
10 the inference which we are exploring as a working 13:01
11 hypothesis that Anthony Donegan was commissioned,
12 through Paul Kelly, to steal the car, that he then
13 stole it, and that Paul Kelly, having been told it had
14 been stole in the Dundalk area, as Anthony Donegan
15 admitted interview, then contacted Seamus Daly so 13:02
16 arrangements could be made to pick it up by the group
17 who were to carry out the bombing?
18 A. Yes, I agree.
19 MR. DE LE POER: Sir, would that be a convenient
20 moment? 13:02
21 CHAIRMAN: Yes, thank you.
22 MR. DE LA POER: would two o'clock be convenient?
23 CHAIRMAN: It would, thank you very much.
24
25 THE INQUIRY ADJOURNED FOR LUNCH AND CONTINUED AS 13:02
26 FOLLOWS:
27
28 CHAIRMAN: Mr. Rafferty.
29 MR. RAFFERTY: Thank you, Sir.

1 MR. MARK SAFRANAUSKAS WAS QUESTIONED FURTHER BY
2 MR. RAFFERTY AS FOLLOWS:

3
4 601 Q. MR. RAFFERTY: Good afternoon, Mr. Safranauskas.

5 A. Good afternoon. 13:59

6 602 Q. We finished just before lunch at what is row 47 of the
7 timeline.

8 A. Yes.

9 603 Q. So we can pick up on the next row, and that brings us
10 back to Mr. Paul Ward. We know from earlier that he 14:00
11 told the Gardaí that he had returned to 56 St.
12 Macartan's Villas at about 11:00 p.m. and he didn't see
13 anything unusual. He had said he had parked his car
14 about 10 feet forward of the entrance of that property
15 and gone inside. 14:00

16 A. Yes.

17 604 Q. Yes. So, we're now at slightly later on in the
18 morning, isn't that right, the morning of the 13th?

19 A. We are, yes. We're 3:30 in the morning.

20 605 Q. So, 3:30, Sir, he said that he and Ms. Connolly, having 14:00
21 been in the property through the evening, at that point
22 and during that time, nobody having entered or left the
23 property, in fact he said:

24
25 "I heard no activity outside the house, nor did I hear 14:00
26 any cars coming or going."

27
28 And he said:
29

1 "We were at the back of the house in the sitting room."

2
3 He said:

4
5 "At 3:30 a.m., I left number 56 St. Macartan's Villas 14:00
6 to return home to Castleblayney to find that my car was
7 gone. At first I thought I had forgot where I had
8 parked it but then I realised that it had been stolen.
9 I ran back to number 56 and I rang the guards. They
10 arrived a few minutes later and I told them what had 14:01
11 happened."

12
13 Pausing there, Mr. Safranauskas, we know, don't we, at
14 entry 49 of the timeline, we can see a call from
15 Mr. Ward through to the AGS, isn't that right? 14:01

16 A. That's right, yes.

17 606 Q. Mr. Ward also told the guards that nobody had
18 permission to take or use his car at any time. And in
19 a statement that he gave on 12th December 2001, Sir,
20 Mr. Ward said that he may have had brake pads fitted 14:01
21 once at the place from which he had bought the car but
22 he had no record of when this occurred and the car
23 would have been in the garage for only a few hours and
24 the only other occasion the car was out of his
25 possession was when it had a new exhaust fitted. 14:02

26
27 And to conclude a summary of his statement evidence to
28 the guards, Sir, he said in a statement from November
29 1998, he said:

1 "When I saw the number used on my car in the Omagh bomb
2 I knew the MDZ 5211 plates, as I had seen it a few
3 times on a car the same as mine."
4

5 He said:

14:02

6
7 "The car was very like mine in colour, make and model
8 and in its fresh appearance. It actually nearly ran
9 into me one morning when I was going to college at
10 Hoey's Filling Station and shop in Cullaville. The
11 only connection between the two cars almost identical
12 cars and both through Cullaville on most days going in
13 opposite directions."
14

14:02

15 we know, Mr. Safranauskas, as I said a moment ago,
16 Mr. Ward called the Gardaí at about 3:30 and that call
17 was received by Garda McKeown, isn't that right?

14:02

18 A. That's right, yes.

19 607 Q. He created a record of that call?

20 A. He did, yes.

14:03

21 608 Q. Can you take us through what that record indicates?

22 A. Yes. So, that records indicates that at 3:30 in the
23 morning an occurrence log was created detailing the
24 theft of the vehicle.

25 609 Q. Sir, Garda McKeown said in his statement that:

14:03

26
27 "I passed this message on to the members on mobile
28 patrol. I notified Monaghan Station and Control for
29 countrywide circulation. I notified Castleblayney

1 Station."

2

3 Move the presentation on. [Presentation played]. Can

4 you tell us, Mr. Safranauskas, what that document is?

5 A. Yes, so that's details of the stolen vehicle that are 14:03

6 being circulated to mobile patrols in neighbouring

7 Garda Stations. So, the red markers or the red radar

8 blips that you can see on screen at the minute signal

9 Carrickmacross Police Station, Castleblayney and

10 Monaghan Police Stations. 14:04

11 610 Q. We know that Garda McKeown said in his statement he

12 completed a Form A100 --

13 A. Yes.

14 611 Q. -- and forwarded to control, Mr. Safranauskas, is that

15 right? 14:04

16 A. Yes.

17 612 Q. He do we see on the left-hand bottom corner of the

18 image on screen something which supports that?

19 A. Yes.

20 613 Q. Sir, the Inquiry has been told by An Garda Síochána 14:04

21 that Garda Control Dublin was notified of the

22 unauthorised taking of the vehicle at 3:45 a.m. on 13th

23 August by way of a facsimile message. And,

24 Mr. Safranauskas, what is that on screen?

25 A. This is the RC1 form that was submitted to Monaghan 14:05

26 Garda Station, and, again, circulated to local Monaghan

27 Town patrol units, and this is at around 3:35 in the

28 morning now.

29 614 Q. I think we have some explanation of the terms that

1 appear in that document, Mr. Safranauskas, is that
2 right?

3 A. Yes.

4 615 Q. So, for example, at the very start it appears that it
5 says "U/T," what do we understand that to mean? 14:05

6 A. Unauthorised taking.

7 616 Q. Thank you. If we can move the presentation on.
8 [Presentation played]. I think in fact we're now at
9 row 55 of the timeline.

10 A. So, the reference you made to the UT is here. 14:05

11 617 Q. Yes, that's a reference to unauthorised taking, is it,
12 Mr. Safranauskas?

13 A. Yes, that's right.

14 618 Q. And what is this document?

15 A. This is a fax that was sent from Monaghan to all Garda 14:06
16 Station informing them of the theft of the stolen
17 vauxhall cavalier.

18 619 Q. And the time that that was issued?

19 A. At 3:40 a.m., so 10 minutes after the reporting of the
20 theft. 14:06

21 620 Q. Thank you, Mr. Safranauskas. What is this document
22 that's on screen?

23 A. So, looking at the top right, we can see A100.

24 621 Q. This is the form that Garda McKeown referred to, is it?

25 A. It is, yes. Again, giving details of the vehicle and 14:06
26 notifying the AGS in Dublin about the theft of the
27 vehicle.

28 MR. RAFFERTY: Thank you. [Presentation played]. I
29 now believe we are actually at row 55 in the timeline

1 and I will hand to Mr. de la Poer. Thank you.

2
3 MR. MARK SAFRANAUSKAS WAS QUESTIONED FURTHER BY MR. DE
4 LA POER AS FOLLOWS:

5 14:07

6 622 Q. MR. DE LA POER: Mr. Safranauskas, we start with row
7 55, a call by the 076 green phone, Seamus Daly, to his
8 answering phone for a period of four seconds?

9 A. Correct.

10 623 Q. It's 5:09 in the morning and so, a matter of hours
11 after he had spoken to Paul Kelly?

14:07

12 A. That's right, yes.

13 624 Q. We can move over row 56 because Mr. Rafferty has
14 already dealt with John Brady's account and we come to
15 row 57, which I think is next in the timeline?

14:07

16 A. Yes.

17 625 Q. On the presentation forgive me. [Presentation played].
18 We are now here in the morning, the time when most
19 people will be up and awake, 10:16 on the 13th, this is
20 a call from the 989 phone Joseph Fee to the 585
21 Colm Murphy phone?

14:08

22 A. That's right, yes.

23 626 Q. So, the attribution for 585 continuing on the basis we
24 discussed yesterday to be applied to Colm Murphy?

25 A. Correct.

14:08

26 627 Q. We then look for some more cell site information in
27 relation to Mr. Donegan's phone?

28 A. Yes.

29 628 Q. At 10:42 in the morning using a cell site in the

1 Dundalk area, this 10374 is the designation?

2 A. Yes.

3 629 Q. It's to an unattributed person, included for the
4 purpose of illustrating where his phone is at that
5 time? 14:08

6 A. Yes.

7 630 Q. Over the page on our timeline, for those who are
8 following in hard copy, we come to further contact
9 between Paul Kelly and Seamus Daly, they had last been
10 in touch at about 2:30 in the morning, is that right? 14:09

11 A. Yes, that's right.

12 631 Q. We're now 10:44 and the call is from the Paul Kelly
13 landline to the green phone?

14 A. That's right, yes.

15 MR. DE LE POER: Next in our timeline Mr. Rafferty will 14:09
16 be able help us with we're going to interrupt the
17 sequence of calls just to turn to an eyewitness.

18

19 MR. MARK SAFRANAUSKAS WAS QUESTIONED FURTHER BY
20 MR. RAFFERTY AS FOLLOWS: 14:09

21

22 632 Q. MR. RAFFERTY: We're going to look now at one of the
23 potential sightings of Mr. Ward's vehicle, isn't that
24 correct?

25 A. Yes, it is. 14:09

26 633 Q. [Presentation played]. If you could identify the time
27 of the day on 13th August that we're looking at?

28 A. So, approximately 10:45 in the morning.

29 634 Q. And the location?

1 A. The location is Crossmaglen.

2 MR. RAFFERTY: Ms. Byrne provided a statement to the
3 guards to say that on the morning of 13th August she
4 drove her car to Crossmaglen to do some shopping, Sir.
5 And at approximately 10:45 a.m., while she was seated 14:10
6 in her car in the Square in Crossmaglen, facing the
7 direction of Dundalk Road, a vehicle passed her
8 travelling towards the Dundalk Road. She said that she
9 noticed it bore a DL registration plate and it
10 immediately came to her attention as a friend of hers 14:10
11 also had a DL-registered car and such a registration
12 number would rarely be seen in Crossmaglen. Ms. Byrne
13 said:

14
15 "I looked at the years and it was 91-DL and it had four 14:10
16 digits in the number, the two in the middle were the
17 same. I noticed that the car was middle range in size
18 and maroon in colour. These facts I'm quite definite
19 about and when I heard the description of the car I
20 knew that it was the one I had seen." 14:11

21
22 Ms. Byrne said that she could not say how many people
23 were in the car as she was focused on the number plate.
24 The car travelled towards the Dundalk Road but she did
25 not see it park or the direction in which it continued 14:11
26 to travel. She said that it was being driven in a
27 normal way for the road and the weather conditions,
28 which were wet at the time. Ms. Byrne said she had no
29 doubt the number and the colour of the vehicle were

1 clear in her mind saying that she noticed that the
2 number plate on the rear of the vehicle was black
3 lettering on a white background and that it had, what
4 she thought was a badge at one end of the plate. It
5 was a normal saloon car and was travelling slowly. 14:11
6 Thank you.

7
8 MR. MARK SAFRANAUSKAS WAS QUESTIONED FURTHER BY MR. DE
9 LA POER AS FOLLOWS:

10
11 635 Q. MR. DE LA POER: Mr. Safranauskas, we continue with row
12 61, this is a phone call from the 076 green phone mis
13 that right?

14 A. It is, yes.

15 636 Q. To the 989 Joseph Fee phone on the provisional 14:12
16 attribution?

17 A. Yes.

18 637 Q. And, again, just looking for potential patterns in the
19 data from which inferences may be drawn, we can see
20 that the Paul Kelly call to the Seamus Daly phone took 14:12
21 place at 10:44?

22 A. Yes.

23 638 Q. And that this phone call is at 10:57, so about 12, 13
24 minutes or so later?

25 A. That's right, yes. 14:12

26 639 Q. Now, as to whether that call went to answer phone or
27 connected we need to look at the timings closely, don't
28 we, to have a look at row 62 as well?

29 A. Yes.

1 640 Q. Because, what appears to be the case is that that
2 earlier phone call would have still been in progress at
3 the time that the Joseph Fee same phone that was the
4 apparent recipient of that call, began to call the
5 Alan Clarke mobile? 14:13

6 A. Yeah, applying the -- adding the 33 seconds on to the
7 timing at which the call started that would bring it to
8 10:58:10.

9 641 Q. Yes. Again, assuming the data is exactly and
10 accurately recorded, is one potential explanation for 14:13
11 that, Mr. Safranauskas, that the earlier call, even
12 though it's as long as 33 seconds, is an answer phone
13 message, we know that Joseph Fee had an answer phone
14 because we see occasions of him checking it, and that
15 Seamus Daly's 076 green phone was in the process of 14:13
16 leaving a message at the time that the handset made a
17 call to Alan Clarke?

18 A. It's an explanation, yes.

19 642 Q. So, we then have two further calls in quick succession,
20 both four seconds in length, so very short after the 14:14
21 Alan Clarke phone which is on the screen now, we can
22 move through that, that's a 25-second call at 10:58?

23 A. Yes.

24 643 Q. We move forward to a quarter to midday or just short of
25 it, the 615, which as we've discussed previously, 14:14
26 Mr. Safranauskas, is attributed on a provisional basis
27 to Liam Campbell?

28 A. Yes.

29 644 Q. 430 currently in the hands of Oliver Treanor on the

1 provisional attribution, and both of those calls take
2 four seconds?

3 A. That's right, yes.

4 645 Q. So, again, maybe a very short message that is conveyed
5 to a person who answered or an answer phone message? 14:14

6 A. Correct.

7 MR. DE LE POER: So, we'll turn back now an hour after
8 the first eyewitness sighting that Mr. Rafferty dealt
9 with a moment ago to deal with the second.

10 14:15

11 MR. MARK SAFRANAUSKAS WAS QUESTIONED FURTHER BY
12 MR. RAFFERTY AS FOLLOWS:

13

14 646 Q. MR. RAFFERTY: Yes. This potential sighting,
15 Mr. Safranauskas, staff concerns Bernadette McCroary, 14:15
16 is that correct?

17 A. It does, yes.

18 647 Q. That was at 11:45 a.m. on 13th August?

19 A. It was, yes.

20 MR. RAFFERTY: Sir, she provided a statement to the 14:15
21 Gardaí on 28th of August 1998. She said that on 12th
22 August she had travelled to Castlebellingham in County
23 Louth to attend a function. And she'd stayed outside
24 an area called Kilsaran on the Drogheda side. She said
25 that the following morning at around 11:45 - so this on 14:15
26 the 13th just before midday - she left where she'd been
27 staying in a vehicle driven by her partner and headed
28 for Dundalk. She said that that after a couple of
29 minutes of travel on the main road, a maroon-coloured

1 car overtook her car at speed and that it was raining
2 heavily. She then saw the vehicle's brake lights come
3 on shortly after, and it appeared to undertake two
4 vehicles which had stopped ahead of it. The first of
5 those two cars in front intended to turn right.

14:16

6 Ms. McCroary said that she had seen that the
7 maroon-coloured car was a Donegal-registered car. She
8 said that her vehicle came behind the maroon car and
9 that the number plates were very similar to a number
10 "that I use in everyday life. The number that I saw on
11 the car was DL-2554. The first year number was in the
12 '90s," she said, but I cannot say which one of them it
13 was. This car had a boot and it was a Vauxhall
14 Cavalier.

14:16

15
16 About 100 or 150 yards after which undertook the gravel
17 lorry, this being the car that was intending to turn
18 right, the maroon car turned left into what appeared to
19 be a housing estate."

14:16

21 And she said she "did not see anyone except the driver
22 in the car, the driver was male."

23
24 Ms. McCroary that said she read The Belfast Telegraph
25 on 17th of August and she said that "the number of the
26 bomb car in Omagh was given in the paper as 91-DL-2554
27 and I was sure this was the number of the car I saw in
28 Kilsaran on the Thursday previous."

14:17

MR. MARK SAFRANAUSKAS WAS QUESTIONED FURTHER BY MR. DE
LA POER AS FOLLOWS:

648 Q. MR. DE LA POER: Mr. Safranauskas, just take a back a moment just so that we can see those, just to deal, drawing upon your expertise, thank you very much, as someone who has investigated very many serious crimes. We can see from what Mr. Rafferty has told us that at 10:45 we have a sighting of a vehicle which the witness, Bernadette Byrne, describes with very considerable detail and precision; would you agree?

A. Yes, I would.

649 Q. And that description is of a vehicle travelling from
north to south?

A. Yes.

650 Q. We, secondly, have, an hour later, on the other side of
the Border, so in the Republic of Ireland, a not
dissimilarly detailed and convinced witness describing
a vehicle that is travelling from south to north?

A. Yes.

651 Q. Now, there are a number of possibilities here, would
you agree?

A. I would.

652 Q. The first possibility is that they both seen the car
that was stolen from Mr. Ward and for that to be the
case the number plate would have to have remained the
same?

A. Yes.

653 0. That car would have had to have been taken into

1 Northern Ireland at some point between its theft and
2 the first sighting?

3 A. Yes.

4 654 Q. And it would have to be being driven now back towards
5 the Republic of Ireland? 14:18

6 A. Yes.

7 655 Q. That it has travelled beyond the Dundalk area and then
8 turned around and come back again and that that has all
9 taken place in the space of an hour?

10 A. Yes. 14:19

11 656 Q. Assuming the witnesses are correct, that that is the
12 vehicle that they have seen, it's the same vehicle and
13 that their timings are relatively accurate?

14 A. Yes.

15 657 Q. Another possible explanation, would you agree, at the 14:19
16 other end of the spectrum, is that they are both, quite
17 innocently, mistaken in what they've seen?

18 A. That's another possibility.

19 658 Q. Which is not to say that they didn't see a vehicle but
20 that, perhaps, their certainty isn't objectively 14:19
21 justified?

22 A. Correct.

23 659 Q. And in your experience as a police investigator, have
24 you seen occasions where eyewitnesses are completely
25 sincerely convinced of what they have seen but it has 14:19
26 subsequently turned out that they are wrong?

27 A. Yes, I have.

28 660 Q. So, we've done that at this stage, we're going to see a
29 number of more sightings that Mr. Rafferty is going to

1 take you through but should we bear that in mind and
2 that spectrum of possibilities as we hear about each of
3 these?

4 A. Yes, it's definitely a consideration to adopt.

5 661 Q. So if we just play on in the presentation. 14:20
6 [Presentation played]. So, you have here produced an
7 animation representing the change in number plates --

8 A. Yes.

9 662 Q. -- from the number plate the car bore when it was in
10 Paul Ward's possession to the cloned number plate of 14:20
11 Bernard McGinn's?

12 A. Yes.

13 663 Q. Now, from the evidence that you've had the opportunity
14 to review have you seen any indication that it is
15 possible to say, with any certainty, when that number 14:21
16 plate change took place?

17 A. No.

18 664 Q. If either of those two eyewitnesses are correct and
19 that that was the vehicle that they saw, that change
20 would have had to have taken place after either of 14:21
21 those?

22 A. Yes.

23 665 Q. A matter of irresistible logic?

24 A. Yes.

25 666 Q. But there is no indication, is there, from the evidence 14:21
26 when the change took place and, therefore, subject to
27 their evidence, would you agree there's the possibility
28 that that number plate change took place earlier?

29 A. Yes, correct.

1 667 Q. So, although you have represented, at this point in the
2 presentation, you shouldn't be taken to be suggesting
3 that this was the moment in time it occurred, as the
4 caption at the bottom says it is sometime between the
5 13th when it was stolen and when it arrived in Omagh? 14:22
6 A. Yes, exactly that.

7 668 Q. That is the full range that we have to contemplate?
8 A. Yes.

9 669 Q. Let's turn back to the timeline please and continue
10 with the presentation. Row 66. [Presentation played]. 14:22
11 We can take these as a sequence just playing through
12 them, Mr. Safranauskas, as they come up.
13 A. Okay.

14 670 Q. Because they are three calls from the 615 Liam Campbell
15 phone to the 430 red phone currently attributed in the 14:22
16 hands of Oliver Treanor lasting a minute and nine, four
17 seconds and eight seconds respectively over a period of
18 about 15 minutes?
19 A. That's right, yes.

20 671 Q. And there is, then, very shortly after the eight-second 14:22
21 call that we can see?
22
23 On the screen now, we can see there is a reversal in
24 terms of the person who made the call and the person
25 who received the call, this time 55 seconds just before 14:23
26 midday?
27 A. That's right, yes.

28 672 Q. Now, we're going to have a sequence of calls, again,
29 the purpose of which is to see where Mr. Donegan's

1 handset is, cell site based this Dundalk?

2 A. Yes.

3 673 Q. That's 12:05. 12:06, same general location for the
4 cell site?

5 A. Correct. 14:23

6 674 Q. 12:07, again a cell site in Dundalk?

7 A. That's right, yes.

8 675 Q. And then do we return, finally, in this sequence to the
9 615/430 back and forth that's been taking place?

10 A. Yes. 14:24

11 676 Q. This time 12:07, 17 seconds on the 13th?

12 A. Correct.

13 677 Q. We can move past row 74 because Mr. Rafferty has dealt
14 with this already, so we move on to 75. Another cell
15 site, we are now at 12:26, so some 15 minutes or so 14:24
16 later, and we can see a cell site was used to the
17 northeast, we are now on row 76, back to a Dundalk
18 cell?

19 A. Yes.

20 678 Q. And Dundalk cell for the call at 12:29? 14:24

21 A. Yes.

22 679 Q. [Presentation played]. Row 78, just pause it there.
23 We have, until this point, for reasons we gave
24 yesterday, been attributing the 430 phone to
25 Oliver Treanor, is that right? 14:25

26 A. Yes.

27 680 Q. The principal reason for that over and above the fact
28 that he was the subscriber is that we know that another
29 user was Liam Campbell, but there is a phone attributed

1 to Liam Campbell that appears to be phoning that 430
2 number, is that right?
3 A. Correct, yes.
4 681 Q. At this point there's going to be a sequence of calls
5 where it is, we don't see that continued pattern, is 14:25
6 that right, those two handsets are not calling each
7 other but there will become a point in time when 430
8 phone is calling another phone subscribed to
9 Oliver Treanor, is that right?
10 A. Yes, the 406 phone. 14:26
11 682 Q. The 406 light blue phone?
12 A. Correct, yes.
13 683 Q. And so, we're simply marking, at this point, that it
14 isn't clear, based on the approach that we're talking
15 to attribution who is the user of 430 on the hypothesis 14:26
16 that's being explored, to this point at least it is
17 Oliver Treanor?
18 A. Yes.
19 684 Q. There is then going to be a period of uncertainty?
20 A. Correct. 14:26
21 685 Q. And then there is going to be a period where the 430 is
22 phoning Oliver Treanor's other phone from which point
23 it is placed in the hands of Liam Campbell?
24 A. Correct, yes.
25 MR. DE LE POER: That is the significance of that. If 14:26
26 you want to just complete this. And then Mr. Rafferty
27 will pick up the AGS evidence.
28
29

1 MR. MARK SAFRANAUSKAS WAS QUESTIONED FURTHER BY
2 MR. RAFFERTY AS FOLLOWS:

3
4 686 Q. MR. RAFFERTY: Mr. Safranauskas, we know that
5 Garda McKeown said that after he'd been made aware of 14:26
6 the theft of Mr. Ward's vehicle he notified other
7 stations, including Garda Control, isn't that correct,
8 in Dublin?

9 A. Correct, yes.

10 687 Q. And then later on the day of the 13th at one o'clock we 14:27
11 understand, is it right, that the Gardaí say that at
12 1:00 p.m. on the 13th Garda Communications Centre in
13 Dublin Castle, known as Command and Control issued an
14 up-to-date list of stolen and located vehicles within
15 the Republic of Ireland up until 1:00 p.m. on 13th 14:27
16 August 1998?

17 A. Yes.

18 688 Q. He also said the details of the stolen located vehicles
19 was forwarded to CVI Belfast, Galway, Ennis Dublin
20 Airport Police? 14:27

21 A. Yes.

22 689 Q. Do you understand that the notification was only of
23 Mr. Ward's vehicle or of other vehicles?

24 A. No, we can see Mr. Ward's vehicle, the 91-DL-2554 is at
25 the top of this list and then there's a number of other 14:27
26 vehicles beneath it.

27 690 Q. And if we play the presentation on. [Presentation
28 played]. Sir, the Inquiry, you can see just focusing
29 in on that, the particular notification has a message

1 number, Mr. Safranauskas, is that right, in the top
2 right-hand corner?

3 A. It does, yes.

4 691 Q. Do you see that?

5 A. 2120. 14:28

6 692 Q. 2120. And we understand the CVI that's referred to
7 from the PSNI is called the Central Vehicle Index?

8 A. To my knowledge, yes.

9 693 Q. So, having received the notification sent at 1:00 p.m.
10 we understand from information from the PSNI indicates 14:28
11 that the report from the AGS of stolen vehicles was
12 registered and circulated through the Central Vehicle
13 Index at 1:23 on 13th of August 1998, isn't that
14 correct, Mr. Safranauskas?

15 A. Yes, depicted in the second line here. 14:29

16 694 Q. So, I think is it correct to say that this particular
17 document is a document which arose after the Omagh bomb
18 exploded but it records information of what occurred?

19 A. Yes, that's right.

20 MR. RAFFERTY: Thank you, Mr. Safranauskas. 14:29

21

22 MR. MARK SAFRANAUSKAS WAS QUESTIONED FURTHER BY MR. DE
23 LA POER AS FOLLOWS:

24

25 695 Q. MR. DE LA POER: As we allow that to play, if we turn 14:29
26 our attention back to row 81, the time is after 3:30 on
27 the 13th. [Presentation played]. We're going back to
28 the Dundalk area and Dundalk landline. Just north of
29 Dundalk, Paul Jennings, the sibling-in-law of

1 Sile Grew, with a contact of 47 seconds?

2 A. Correct, yes.

3 696 Q. Here, we have a call between father and son, we heard

4 about yesterday?

5 A. Yes. 14:30

6 697 Q. Father owning a haulage business, as you understand it?

7 A. MB Haulage, yes.

8 698 Q. And employing his son, a contact of 15 seconds in total

9 at just after 4:30?

10 A. That's right, yes. 14:30

11 699 Q. And you know from other material, don't you,

12 Mr. Safranauskas, that those two names though appearing

13 fleetinglly in this and only for the purpose of

14 contacting each other, feature more heavily in earlier

15 incidents? 14:30

16 A. Yes, that's right.

17 700 Q. Over the page, we had seen, at 3:30, the Paul Jennings

18 landline contact Sile Grew. Over an hour later we see

19 the Paul Jennings landline contact the Seamus Daly 076

20 number, it should be shaded green on our timeline but 14:31

21 it is in our evidence presentation on screen?

22 A. Yes.

23 701 Q. Next, 1:645, a 23-second call?

24 A. Yes.

25 702 Q. That one between a mobile telephone attributed to 14:31

26 Peter Campbell, pink phone ending 971 and here in our

27 attribution column, on the timeline on the screen

28 provisionally Oliver Treanor or Liam Campbell for this

29 23-second call?

1 A. That's right, yes.

2 703 Q. And then just a couple of minutes later, contact from
3 the yellow 259 Brady phone to 971 Peter Campbell phone?

4 A. Yes.

5 704 Q. If we move forward again, please. [Presentation 14:31
6 played]. We've got a contact from the green 076 phone
7 to Martin McGeough 522, Castleblayney landline?

8 A. Yes.

9 705 Q. Now, as we reach six o'clock on the 13th we can see the
10 Seamus Daly 076 phone in contact with or called by 14:32
11 John Connolly landline. Just remind us,
12 Mr. Safranauskas, John Connolly?

13 A. John Connolly was a neighbour of the Daly family and he
14 rented farmland to them.

15 706 Q. Did we hear yesterday in the attribution that the 14:32
16 suggestion that members of the Daly family had access
17 to his landline?

18 A. Yes, there was.

19 707 Q. Moving forward again 18:21, another contact from the
20 Emerald Bar to Sile Grew's mobile telephone? 14:32

21 A. Correct.

22 708 Q. This one 37 seconds?

23 A. Yes.

24 709 Q. [Presentation played]. Another call from the
25 Peter Campbell 971 to the 430 red phone? 14:33

26 A. Yes.

27 710 Q. That's a five-second call at 18:44:41?

28 A. Yes.

29 711 Q. 18:45:23, so less than a minute later was there then a

1 call to the voicemail?

2 A. There was, yes.

3 712 Q. That one being the 34 seconds?

4 A. Yes.

5 713 Q. Next, 7:10 in the evening, how long was that call 14:33

6 please?

7 A. 15 seconds.

8 714 Q. And who were the participants based on the provisional

9 attribution?

10 A. The outgoing was Sean Hoey on his 452 phone, and the 14:33

11 recipient was either Oliver Treanor or Liam Campbell.

12 715 Q. Thank you. Moving to our next one, please.

13 [Presentation played]. Another call, the purpose of

14 which is to identify the cell site being used by the

15 Anthony Donegan 498 phone? 14:34

16 A. Yes.

17 716 Q. That was being a site based in the Dundalk area?

18 A. Correct.

19 717 Q. 93 please. [Presentation played]. This is at 7:23 in

20 the evening on the 13th? 14:34

21 A. Yes.

22 718 Q. What information can we see here, please?

23 A. We can see that the green phone 076 attributed or

24 provisionally attributed to Seamus Daly contacts one of

25 the Sean Hoey landline numbers, 445. 14:34

26 719 Q. And can you help us, is that the landline based in

27 Jonesborough or the landline based in the Republic of

28 Ireland?

29 A. The landline based in the Republic of Ireland.

1 MR. DE LE POER: Thank you very much indeed. We'll
2 turn now to Mr. Rafferty who is going to help us with
3 another potential sighting.
4

5 MR. MARK SAFRANAUSKAS WAS QUESTIONED FURTHER BY
6 MR. RAFFERTY AS FOLLOWS:
7

14:35

8 720 Q. MR. RAFFERTY: Thank you, Mr. Safranauskas. So, in
9 relation to this further potential sighting, we should
10 all bear in mind your earlier comments in relation to
11 the change in registration details on the vehicle,
12 isn't that correct?

14:35

13 A. Correct, yes.

14 721 Q. And the care that we should take in terms of
15 considering the accounts offered by the various
16 individuals who have potentially sighted Mr. Ward's
17 vehicle, isn't that correct?

14:35

18 A. Yes.

19 MR. RAFFERTY: Mr. McDonnell said, a Brian McDonnell
20 said, in providing a statement to the Gardaí that on
21 13th August 1998 at 7:30 to 7:40 p.m. in the evening -
22 and two earlier viewings, we remember, were mid and
23 late morning of the same day from Ms. Byrne and
24 Ms. McCroary. And he said he was travelling with
25 family members between Carrickmacross and area called
26 Lough Egish, when a car passed him. He said that it
27 was 91-DL registration.
28

14:35

29 "It was a burgundy Opel or Vauxhall, but I'm not quite

1 sure of the model but I took it to be that type of
2 car."

3
4 He said that it passed him in a dangerous place and
5 travelling fast. It was two to three miles outside Carrickmacross. Mr. McDonnell said there was only the
6 driver in the car and he formed the impression that the
7 person was fairly young.

10 MR. MARK SAFRANAUSKAS WAS QUESTIONED FURTHER BY MR. DE
11 LA POER AS FOLLOWS:

13 722 Q. MR. DE LA POER: Have you plotted that third sighting
14 on our map?

15 A. Just in the middle of the previous two sightings, yes.

14:36

16 723 Q. So, just building the picture; Mr. Safranauskas, we
17 start in terms of the order of time at the entry that
18 is highest?

19 A. Yes.

20 724 Q. We then move down to the lowest entry and then we are
21 moving to the west and north for the entry we just
22 heard about?

14:36

23 A. Correct, yes.

24 725 Q. So, let us continue, please, to the telephone calls.
25 [Presentation played]. So, we just pause on this one
26 for a moment just to reflect on where we've got to.
27 Here we see a use of the 406 light blue phone?

14:37

28 A. Yes.

29 726 Q. Which is subscribed to Oliver Treanor.

1 A. Yes.

2 727 Q. And this is a call from the Peter Campbell 971 phone?

3 A. Yes.

4 728 Q. Now, that call is at 7:58 in the evening?

5 A. Yes. 14:37

6 729 Q. In fact, a little of over an hour earlier, if we were
7 to look at row 89 we can see that Peter Campbell was
8 calling the 430 number?

9 A. Yes.

10 730 Q. And if we just think about what that might mean in 14:37
11 terms of the working hypothesis and provisional
12 attributions, if it be right that that was
13 Peter Campbell he would know, or be likely to know, who
14 he was speaking to, if that call connected?

15 A. Yes. 14:38

16 731 Q. If it didn't, then he wouldn't. But earlier in the
17 day, two hours earlier at row 84, it seems likely that
18 there might have been a connection with 23 seconds on
19 the clock?

20 A. Yes. 14:38

21 732 Q. At all events, it would appear that the user of that
22 phone decided, just before eight o'clock, that they
23 would phone the 406 number?

24 A. Yes.

25 733 Q. And, again, if they knew that that was Oliver Treanor's 14:38
26 alternative phone then that might tell us something,
27 mightn't it, about who they were speaking to earlier on
28 the 430 phone?

29 A. It would, yes.

1 734 Q. So, we continue please, because we're going to see a
2 number of these calls involving the Peter Campbell pink
3 phone?
4 A. Yes.
5 735 Q. The next one is just under an hour later, again, it's 14:39
6 to the 406 Oliver Treanor phone?
7 A. Yes.
8 736 Q. And then 20 minutes later, a call, again, from the
9 Peter Campbell to the 406 Oliver Treanor phone?
10 A. Yes. 14:39
11 737 Q. [Presentation played]. We can then see at 21:13, a
12 six-second call from the landline belonging to
13 Liam Campbell and his partner Bernadette Lynch?
14 A. Yes.
15 738 Q. That, too, is to the 406 number? 14:39
16 A. Yes.
17 739 Q. Ten minutes later, we see a combination we've seen
18 before, Seamus Daly contacting the Paul Jennings
19 landline?
20 A. That's right, yes. 14:40
21 740 Q. Now, although the presentation you've created indicated
22 uncertainty for a period of time are we going to see
23 now, and from this point on the working hypothesis, the
24 430 is in the hands of Liam Campbell?
25 A. Correct, yes. 14:40
26 741 Q. And next call will explain why that is the case, is
27 that correct?
28 A. Yes, it will.
29 742 Q. Because we see the 406 number that was in use earlier

1 in that evening is now calling the 430 red phone?
2 A. That's right, yes.
3 743 Q. [Presentation played]. Another call from the green
4 phone to the Paul Jennings landline?
5 A. Correct. 14:41
6 744 Q. And then do we have the first of two calls in the space
7 of about 20 minutes from the pink, Peter Campbell phone
8 971 to the red 430 Liam Campbell phone?
9 A. Correct, yes.
10 745 Q. That one is seven seconds, 21:37. Tell us what the 14:41
11 time and length of the next one was please?
12 A. The next call is 21:56:27 and it's for a period of
13 11 seconds.
14 746 Q. That takes us, then, to complete row 104 and we can
15 then hear about another potential sighting? 14:41
16 A. Yes.
17
18 MR. MARK SAFRANAUSKAS WAS QUESTIONED FURTHER BY
19 MR. RAFFERTY AS FOLLOWS:
20 14:41
21 747 Q. MR. RAFFERTY: So, we're now into 14th August --
22 A. We are.
23 748 Q. -- Mr. Safranauskas, in the morning and there was
24 potential sighting by Mr. David Shakespeare, is that
25 correct? 14:42
26 A. There was, yes.
27 749 Q. The previous sightings we can see were in the
28 Carrickmacross, County Louth and potentially the South
29 Armagh area, isn't that right? But this one moves

1 further away?

2 A. Yes, it was.

3 750 Q. You can identify that as being over the Border into
4 Northern Ireland, is that correct?

5 A. Yes, that's correct. 14:42

6 751 Q. In the approximate direction of, one can see, using the
7 areas that are plotted on the screen, Emyvale to the
8 southeast and Omagh to the northwest, isn't that right?

9 A. Yes, that's right.

10 752 Q. Ballygawley Roundabout is through the main route from 14:42
11 that part of Emyvale and Aughnacloy to Omagh, isn't
12 that correct?

13 A. Correct.

14 753 Q. So Mr. Shakespeare, he provided a witness statement to 14:42
15 say that he had been in the Belfast area on the evening
16 of 13th August, and he had been driving home at
17 130 a.m. on the 14th, Sir. When he passed the
18 Ballygawley Roundabout and as he was doing so he said
19 that:

20 14:42

21 "A car flew up on my right side overtaking me. This
22 car was a burgundy-coloured Vauxhall Cavalier and I
23 would say at least three people in it. There was a
24 passenger seated in the backseat behind the front
25 passenger seat and I thought this car had a 14:43
26 registration which we began with 'MBZ.' This is a
27 number which Mercedes-Benz drivers look to buy. This
28 car was travelling fast, and as I drove on towards
29 Omagh I caught up with it again as I passed Kelly's Bar

1 on the left. I thought this strange as it was then I
2 saw the number started with MDZ and the numbers were
3 5211. This car pulled ahead again and I next caught up
4 with it as it slowed down at the Traveller's Rest. I
5 thought the boys were up to no good and remember doing 14:43
6 a double-check on the number again."

7
8 Mr. Shakespeare went on to say that he didn't see the
9 car again until the night of 23rd August when it was on
10 television in relation to the Omagh bomb. He said: 14:43
11

12 "I thought long and hard about this car before
13 contacting police to make sure my facts were correct.
14 This Cavalier car was just a plain car with nothing
15 distinctive and I think the reason I thought it was 14:44
16 initially MBZ was a bolt or screw was in the number
17 plate within the D."

18
19 The next potential sighting, Sir, was later on the 14th
20 at around 7:40 a.m., isn't that right, 14:44
21 Mr. Safranauskas?

22 A. It is, yes.

23 754 Q. And can you identify where that took place?

24 A. Yes. Just to the left of the map, so Fintona to Omagh
25 Road, just south of Omagh. 14:44

26 755 Q. And that's Mr. Robert Hamilton?

27 A. Correct.

28 MR. RAFFERTY: So, he said that at around 7:40 a.m. he
29 was at a bus stop on Fintona to Omagh Road. He noticed

1 a maroon-coloured vehicle about he believed was either
2 an Astra or a Cavalier, which was a hatchback
3 saloon-type model. He said that it had round panels
4 rather than square corners and was a new type of model.

14:45

6 Mr. Hamilton thought the vehicle looked suspicious as
7 he had not seen it in that location before. He looked
8 inside thinking someone may be asleep, but it was not
9 occupied. Nothing looked out of the ordinary.

14:45

11 The car had a light-coloured interior but he was unsure
12 of the colour. The exterior of the car did not have
13 significant marks but he remembered that it was very
14 clean and shiny.

14:45

16 Mr. Hamilton did not look at the registration plate on
17 the car and said that in the area at the time there was
18 a strange smell.

20 "It smelt like a garden centre would and I thought at
21 the time it may be from the derelict farm very close
22 by."

14:45

24 Mr. Hamilton said that the car was still there at
25 around 8:45 that morning and he said:

14:45

27 "I remember still thinking about the strange smell in
28 the area and thought of chemicals or fertiliser
29 associated with the nearby derelict farm."

1 MR. MARK SAFRANAUSKAS WAS QUESTIONED FURTHER BY MR. DE
2 LA POER AS FOLLOWS:

3
4 756 Q. MR. DE LA POER: If we move back, please, to the
5 telephones and row 107. [Presentation played]. Here, 14:46
6 we're going to see the pink 971 Peter Campbell phone of
7 provisional attribution calling the 406 Oliver Treanor
8 light blue phone?

9 A. We are, yes.

10 757 Q. The time is just after 10:00 a.m. on the morning of the 14:46
11 14th?

12 A. Yes.

13 758 Q. [Presentation played]. Next, we're going to see
14 Seamus Daly's green 076 phone contacting the 452 mobile
15 of Sean Hoey? 14:47

16 A. Correct, yes.

17 759 Q. A contact of 15 seconds between the two devices?

18 A. Yes.

19 760 Q. Finally, before turning back to another potential
20 sighting, do we have here, this is perhaps worth 14:47
21 pausing on, contact between 585 phone and the 980
22 phone?

23 A. Yes, we do.

24 761 Q. The reason we pause on this, Mr. Safranauskas, is you
25 can confirm, can't you, that those two phones are, 14:47
26 perhaps, the two most important phones in Chapter 3?

27 A. The two that travelled to Omagh, yes.

28 762 Q. Exactly, right. And here we see an occasion, first
29 occasion in our timeline of one contacting the other?

1 A. Yes.

2 763 Q. We are 25-and-a-half hours before the first indication
3 of the start of the bomb run?

4 A. Yes.

5 764 Q. So, a little over a day away, and we know that the 585 14:48
6 phone was subscribed to Colm Murphy?

7 A. Yes.

8 765 Q. And was a phone that he accepted that he had the usage
9 of?

10 A. Yes. 14:48

11 766 Q. We know, also, that Terence Morgan was the ordinary
12 user of 980, don't we, from our evidence yesterday?

13 A. We do, yes.

14 767 Q. It being subscribed by his father-in-law. And we know,
15 also, that each of them gave accounts which we should 14:48
16 acknowledge were not included in the deliberation of in
17 the judges in the proceedings in which they were heard,
18 so they were excluded from consideration, but each gave
19 accounts about how Colm Murphy had contacted
20 Terence Morgan, his foreman, and requested, on the 14:48
21 14th, that Terence Morgan provide his mobile telephone
22 980 to Colm Murphy?

23 A. Correct, yes.

24 MR. DE LE POER: So, we'll turn now please, to a
25 further sighting. 14:49
26

1 MR. MARK SAFRANAUSKAS WAS QUESTIONED FURTHER BY
2 MR. RAFFERTY AS FOLLOWS:

4 768 Q. MR. RAFFERTY: This is row 110 of the timeline, is that
5 correct?

14:49

6 A. Yes, it is.

7 769 Q. And it concerns a further potential sighting by a
8 person called Stella Fulton. And if you can bring us
9 to where that sighting was?

10 A. Yes. So, that's now around the Aughnacloy area to
11 Ballygawley Road and it's at 11:30.

14:49

12 770 Q. So, we've started with potential sightings in the
13 County Louth, South Armagh, Carrickmacross area, later
14 on on the 14th or in early hours of the 14th, we're
15 moving closer to the Omagh, Fintona direction and later
16 on the 14th we're back towards the Border area, is that
17 correct?

14:49

18 A. Correct, yes.

19 MR. RAFFERTY: So, Ms. Fulton provided a statement to
20 say, that as she left a house which was on the main
21 Aughnacloy-Ballygawley Road, at 11:15 to 11:45 on 14th
22 August, she saw what she described as:

14:50

24 "A maroon or burgundy Vauxhall Cavalier coming from the
25 direction of Aughnacloy. I took particular attention
26 of this vehicle as one of my sons drives a car the same
27 as this. She said that she followed the vehicle and
28 noticed that its registration plate read, '91-DL-244.'
29 She said that there were four digits at the end of the

14:50

1 registration number but she did not remember the
2 fourth. Ms. Fulton said that she remembered the
3 registration as another of her sons had a car with the
4 same year. She thought this vehicle was better looking
5 than her son's but she followed it until the 14:50
6 Ballygawley Roundabout. She could not say if there was
7 anyone to the rear or to the front passenger seat.

9 MR. MARK SAFRANAUSKAS WAS QUESTIONED FURTHER BY MR. DE
10 LA POER AS FOLLOWS: 14:50

12 771 Q. MR. DE LA POER: If we turn back to our timeline having
13 dealt with row 110 just then, we're now at 111, a
14 telephone contact between Seamus Daly on the green 076
15 phone to his partner, Sile Grew, 556? 14:51

16 A. Yes.

17 772 Q. That's at 11:38 --

18 A. Yes.

19 773 Q. -- and 21 seconds. Now, we can see at row 112 a
20 reference to Aughnacloy, Mr. Rafferty is going to deal 14:51
21 with that in just a moment but let's look at the next
22 phone call. 11:40 Seamus Daly then calling the Emerald
23 Bar?

24 A. Yes.

25 774 Q. The place where Sile Grew worked? 14:51

26 A. Yes.

27 775 Q. And then moving forward about 35 minutes contact
28 between brothers John Fee on 132, Joseph Fee 989,
29 duration 25 seconds?

1 A. That's right, yes.

2

3 MR. MARK SAFRANAUSKAS WAS QUESTIONED FURTHER BY
4 MR. RAFFERTY AS FOLLOWS:

5

14:51

6 776 Q. MR. RAFFERTY: we'll deal next, Mr. Safranauskas, with
7 the presentation bringing us to the Aughnacloy area --

8 A. Yes.

9 777 Q. -- and the Border crossing on the Monaghan Road. Now,
10 to give a little bit of background to this, Sir, the
11 Inquiry will hear from Col. McMullan on behalf of the
12 Ministry of Defence. He has provided statements which
13 set out details of what are called permanent vehicle
14 check points or PVCs which were in existence in the
15 counties on the Border in August 1998. He said that
16 vehicle monitoring arrangements and managing the Border
17 was a core component of the military response to the
18 Troubles. For present purposes, Sir, he said and
19 Inquiry says that there was PVC on site, which was on
20 the Monaghan Road in Aughnacloy at that time, and that
21 there were arrangements which he will speak to, to
22 monitor traffic crossing at that time.

24 The Inquiry understands, Sir, that in the aftermath of
25 the bombing, the police video viewing team as part of
26 its investigation, considered video recordings from a
27 range, including the military, along possible routes
28 taken by the bomb car. A team of four officers viewed

1 Insofar as the review identified information at that
2 Border crossing, which is of relevance to Chapter 3,
3 Sir, it noted several observations. And this one that
4 I'll come to now is at row 115 of the timeline, in
5 respect of a white Volkswagen Golf vehicle. Just play
6 the presentation on a little bit.

8 [Presentation played]. Thank you. And, Sir, what you
9 can see on the screen is -- this is a white Volkswagen
10 Golf, this is registration 91-MN-432, and it was
11 described by Mr. Greaney earlier this week opening
12 Chapter 3 that this was a car associated with the
13 Campbell family, and Michael Campbell, I think, in
14 particular. This is, obviously, the same Campbell
15 family, members of which were employed by companies
16 such as Town Glass Limited, including Liam Campbell.
17 This vehicle was recorded as having been observed
18 travelling south to north at the PVCP at 1:09 on the
19 14th of August as the screen shows.

22 clearly visible, if in fact there are occupants of more

24 camera operator held the frame for almost six minutes
25 such that the vehicles immediately following what we

27 Sir, you will hear evidence from the military and
28 police as to arrangements at the Border.

1 And can I just bring you to two other entries on the
2 timeline. So we've looked at entry 115, but just to
3 note entry 112, just three rows above, and if you can
4 mark also entry 151, which is over on page 17, you'll
5 see that both of those entries concern a Renault 19 14:56
6 with a registration CAZ 2513. So, the entry at row 112
7 relates, Mr. Safranauskas, isn't that right, to this
8 vehicle passing the PVCP travel nothing in north to
9 south direction?

10 A. Correct. 14:56

11 778 Q. And the entry at row 151 is south to north, is that
12 correct?

13 A. Correct.

14 MR. RAFFERTY: And, Sir, what the Inquiry understands
15 is that this vehicle is one which is described as 14:56
16 belonging to Francis Mackey, belonging to Mackey whilst
17 another report that we have seen indicates that it was
18 used by Francis Mackey.

20 MR. MARK SAFRANAUSKAS WAS QUESTIONED FURTHER BY MR. DE 14:56
21 LA POER AS FOLLOWS:

23 779 Q. MR. DE LA POER: We heard evidence, Mr. Safranauskas,
24 about Mr. Francis Mackey from Dr. John Morrison, didn't
25 we? 14:57

26 A. We did, yes.

27 780 Q. Let us resume, briefly, looking at a single entry here,
28 although they're separated buy that sighting that we've
29 heard about, of the Golf, we can see a repeat of

1 row 114 in terms of the mobile telephones, this one
2 just three seconds, so just after a quarter past,
3 John Fee, 132 to Joseph Fee, 989?

4 A. Correct.

6 MR. MARK SAFRANAUSKAS WAS QUESTIONED FURTHER BY
7 MR. RAFFERTY AS FOLLOWS:

8

9 781 Q. MR. RAFFERTY: So, Mr. Safranauskas, we're going to
10 look at another potential sighting?

11 A. Yes.

12 782 Q. So, as the presentation moves on if you can orientate
13 us to where that was and when it was?

14 A. [Presentation played]. So, we're now looking just
15 north of Dundalk in the Ravensdale area and we're 14:57
16 looking at a vehicle sighting from Thomas Hillen at
17 1:30.

18 783 Q. So far this appears to be the most easterly
19 observation, is that correct?

20 A. It does, yes. 14:58

21 784 Q. And it's back in the Border area, not from Dundalk or
22 from Newry, it was just over the Border?

23 A. Correct.

24 MR. RAFFERTY: That's from Mr. Thomas Hillen, Sir. He
25 provided a statement to say that he was with his wife 14:58
26 in Dundalk and then in Ravensdale on 14th August. He
27 said that he was travelling on the Ravensdale Park Road
28 through the Ravensdale Park Estate at approximately
29 1:30 in the afternoon. He saw an oncoming jeep

1 travelling fairly fast for the condition of the road
2 and that he pulled over to let it pass. He didn't know
3 the make or model of the jeep or see its registration
4 plate but there were two people within the car, and the
5 driver was male. He said he travelled along the road 14:58
6 and saw a maroon-coloured car travelling towards him.
7 This was about 200 yards behind the jeep. He pulled
8 over again and said:

9
10 "I remember looking out at the registration plate which 14:58
11 bore the figures MBZ or MDZ, I didn't catch the numbers
12 but I think they were fairly low. The vehicle was a
13 maroon-coloured Cavalier and it was not particularly
14 clean."

15 14:59
16 Mr. Hillen went on to say:

17
18 "The driver would have been in his 30s with a roundish
19 face, fairly well built. He had short black hair with
20 side locks. There was only one person in the car and 14:59
21 it appeared to be raised at the front."

22
23 Mr. Hillen thought that the vehicle must have been
24 re-registered as it looked like a car from 1987 or 1988
25 and the registration plate, he said, he thought would 14:59
26 have referred to a vehicle from 1992 onwards.

27
28 He stated that the point at which he saw the maroon
29 vehicle was around 500 yards from the Drumad Garda

1 Station on Ravensdale Park Road which is close to the
2 Border.

5 LA POER AS FOLLOWS:

10 Donegan 498 mobile for the purpose of the cell site?

12 786 Q. Dundalk usage --

13 A. Correct.

14 787 Q. -- in terms of the location of the site. And, again,
15 another mast based in the Dundalk area?

15:00

16 A. Yes.

17 788 Q. We are going to see a call at 14:32, Sean Hoey's mobile
18 to Seamus Daly's green phone?

19 A. Yes.

20 789 Q. Those two handsets having been in contact earlier in
21 the day, we can see that at row 108?

15:01

22 A. We can, yes.

23 790 Q. Then moving forward, please, another very short contact
24 between the 132 and the 989 handsets?

25 A. Correct.

15:01

26 791 Q. Do we then have a sequence of three calls over the
27 space of a minute or two, all of them from the
28 Damien Lawless family home landline 587 to the 430 red
29 phone which is being placed by the Inquiry on a

1 provisional basis in Liam Campbell's hands at this
2 time?

3 A. That's correct, yes.

4 792 Q. That's the second of them, row 123. The third of them
5 2:55:42, each call lasting either 12 or 20 seconds? 15:02

6 A. That's right, yes.

7 793 Q. Now, we have an apparent anomaly in the data which I
8 have no doubt will be beyond you as you're not a
9 telephone expert to explain, but we have apparently a
10 call of five minutes and 28 seconds between the John 15:02
11 Fee mobile and the Derek 'Shanty' Brady mobile?

12 A. Yes.

13 794 Q. But, apparently, whilst that call is going there is a
14 second outgoing call, so we're not dealing here, it
15 would seem with John Fee's voicemail, of three seconds? 15:02

16 A. Yes.

17 795 Q. It's, perhaps, not possible to make very much of what's
18 going on there but that's what the data indicates?

19 A. Yes, correct.

20 796 Q. We see the second of those calls now. We're back to 15:02
21 the Lawless landline?

22 A. We are, yes.

23 797 Q. To the 430, looking here at row 128. [Presentation
24 played]. If you just pause it there, that's 15:00:46,
25 Anthony Donegan and here we know the cell ID that the 15:03
26 Donegan phone is using, it's 5219?

27 A. Yes.

28 798 Q. But it has not been for Dr. Tart to identify from the
29 records available to him where that mast is?

1 A. No.

2 799 Q. [Presentation played]. 15:01, row 129, Lawless
3 landline to Liam Campbell, on 430?

4 A. Yes.

5 800 Q. That's at 15:01 for a minute and 17 seconds. 15:23, 15:04
6 contact from the red phone to the light blue phone?

7 A. Yes.

8 801 Q. Another cell site call for the Donegan 498, this using
9 a cell site located in the Dundalk area?

10 A. Correct. 15:04

11 802 Q. Light blue phone to the red phone, 15:50 for seven
12 seconds?

13 A. Yes.

14 803 Q. Another very short call, in terms of its duration, from
15 the 132 John Fee to 989 Joseph Fee? 15:04

16 A. Correct.

17 804 Q. We now have another sighting.

18 A. We do.

19

20 MR. MARK SAFRANAUSKAS WAS QUESTIONED FURTHER BY 15:05
21 MR. RAFFERTY AS FOLLOWS:

22

23 805 Q. MR. RAFFERTY: So, Mr. Safranauskas, whereas the last
24 potential sighting by Mr. Hillen, I think, we
25 established at that time was the most easterly at that 15:05
26 point.

27 A. We did, yes.

28 806 Q. If we look at a potential sighting by a lady called
29 Agnes Simpson. If you could bring us to where that

1 occurred?

2 A. We're now looking furthest north, directly in Omagh,
3 Market Street at 4:00 p.m.

4 MR. RAFFERTY: 4:00 p.m. She said, Sir, in a witness
5 statement that at around 4:00 p.m. she was walking down 15:05
6 Market Street towards Campsie and noticed a
7 maroon-coloured Vauxhall Cavalier parked outside
8 McIlroy's shoe shop. The letters of the registration,
9 she said, were MDZ which she observed as those letters
10 originated from County Antrim and she said that "they 15:06
11 caught my eye." Ms. Simpson believed there were four
12 numbers in the registration but could not remember what
13 they were when she was providing her statement to
14 police on 21st August. She remembered that the vehicle
15 was not clean, and it looked like it had not been 15:06
16 washed for a while and did not notice anyone within the
17 vehicle.

18

19 MR. MARK SAFRANAUSKAS WAS QUESTIONED FURTHER BY MR. DE
20 LA POER AS FOLLOWS: 15:06

21

22 807 Q. MR. DE LA POER: Row 135, please.

23 A. So, apologies I will just have to go ever so slightly
24 back, I believe it has been inserted into the wrong
25 place. 15:06

26 808 Q. I think we've just looked at that, that was row 132,
27 that's row 133. If we keep going we get the sighting,
28 I think, of Agnes Simpson. And there we are, that's
29 the four o'clock, is that right?

1 A. Yes, that's right, yes.

2 809 Q. So four o'clock and 12 seconds, we saw is there, that
3 was red phone, Liam Campbell 430 to 406 Oliver Treanor?

4 A. That's right, yes.

5 810 Q. That's the one that we moved over, we now have the 15:07
6 Agnes Simpson sighting?

7 A. Yes.

8 811 Q. Thank you. [Presentation played]. We're now looking,
9 I think, at row 136?

10 A. We are, yes. 15:07

11 812 Q. This is the Seamus Daly green 076 to dark blue 585
12 Colm Murphy?

13 A. Correct.

14 813 Q. Duration just two seconds?

15 A. Yes. 15:07

16 814 Q. Just before five o'clock?

17 A. Yes.

18 815 Q. We then have a call from 430 red phone to
19 David Lawless, a relative, as we heard, of
20 Damien Lawless? 15:08

21 A. Correct, yes.

22 816 Q. 17:13, another contact between the green and dark blue
23 phones, this one for 43 seconds?

24 A. Correct, yes.

25 817 Q. Currently having concluded that call then a call from 15:08
26 the same green phone to the Emerald Bar?

27 A. Yes.

28 818 Q. 33 seconds?

29 A. Correct.

1 819 Q. Then 20 minutes later another call, this one four
2 seconds, green phone to the Emerald Bar?
3 A. Yes.
4 820 Q. We then have a public call box call from within Dundalk
5 to Derek 'Shanty' Brady's yellow 259 phone? 15:09
6 A. Yes.
7 821 Q. That's row 141 on our timeline?
8 A. We do, yes.
9 822 Q. [Presentation played]. Then we're going to see a
10 couple of calls which the relationship between them may 15:09
11 indicate a connection, certainly may be capable of
12 supporting such an inference. 17:59 a two-second call
13 from the John Fee to the Joseph Fee handsets?
14 A. Yes.
15 823 Q. And then within 30 seconds or so of that call ending 15:09
16 the same John Fee handset calling the Derek 'Shanty'
17 Brady handset, this time for a period of two minutes
18 and 33 seconds?
19 A. Correct.
20 824 Q. Another contact here in the early evening between the 15:09
21 585 and the 980, just 10 seconds this first one?
22 A. Yes.
23 825 Q. And then less than a minute later, at 21-second
24 contact?
25 A. Yes. 15:10
26 826 Q. Both phones still in the hands of the ordinary users?
27 A. Yes.
28 CHAIRMAN: How are we doing for time, Mr. de la Poer?
29 MR. DE LA POER: well, that moment that is on screen

1 was a moment that I was going to propose that we might
2 take a ten-minute or so break.
3 CHAIRMAN: Yes.
4 MR. DE LA POER: Perhaps, we can leave it at that and
5 we'll come back to that when we resume. 15:10
6 CHAIRMAN: We'll resume around 3:20.
7 MR. DE LA POER: Thank you.
8
9 THE INQUIRY ADJOURNED BRIEFLY AND RESUMED AS FOLLOWS:

12 827 Q. MR. DE LA POER: Sir, thank you. Row 146,
13 Mr. Safranauskas?
14 A. Yes.
15 828 Q. We have seen calls involving the orange 980 phone and 15:23
16 until this point they have been attributed to
17 Terence Morgan, the foreman of Colm Murphy?
18 A. Yes.
19 829 Q. Now, from this point in the presentation are we
20 proceeding on the basis that there was a period of time 15:24
21 when that phone was in the hands of Colm Murphy?
22 A. Yes.
23 830 Q. In fact, we don't see any relevant calls on that phone
24 until the following day, do we?
25 A. No. 15:24
26 831 Q. And as we will see by the time we come to the period
27 immediately after lunch, that 980 phone is going to be
28 attributed on a provisional basis to the hands of
29 Seamus McKenna?

1 A. Correct.

2 832 Q. Do you want just to play this on and then we can look
3 at the next couple of calls? [Presentation played].
4 So, the person identified yesterday was the
5 father-in-law of Derek 'Shanty' Brady, Patrick Brady, a 15:25
6 call from the landline 520, duration just under a
7 minute?

8 A. Correct, yes.

9 833 Q. And then 10 minutes later, the Colm Murphy 585 phone
10 calling his home number? 15:25

11 A. Correct, yes.

12 834 Q. That's a call of 42 seconds?

13 A. Yes.

14 835 Q. And that's his home in Ravensdale?

15 A. It is, yes. 15:25

16 MR. DE LE POER: We'll turn now to another sighting
17 please.

18

19 MR. MARK SAFRANAUSKAS WAS QUESTIONED FURTHER BY
20 MR. RAFFERTY AS FOLLOWS: 15:25

21

22 836 Q. MR. RAFFERTY: So, Mr. Safranauskas, we're going to
23 move to the early evening --

24 A. Yes.

25 837 Q. -- on the 14th. Can you locate where this observation 15:26
26 was?

27 A. Yes. So, we are now looking at the Castleshane area at
28 the centre of the map, at 1830 hrs here.

29 838 Q. And that's approximately on the Border between the

1 North and Republic of Ireland, isn't that right?

2 A. Yes.

3 MR. RAFFERTY: Sir, a Mr. Maurice Gillanders provided a
4 statement to say that on 14th August 1998 he left his
5 home at around 5:20 to travel to Clones in County 15:26
6 Monaghan. He was driving his grey Vauxhall Cavalier
7 car and he crossed the Border from Middletown into the
8 Republic of Ireland at around 6:30. As he went through
9 Castleshane, he was at a junction with the
10 Dublin-Monaghan Road. He noticed a dark red Cavalier 15:26
11 or Opel vehicle approach from his left-hand side. He
12 thought the letters on the registration were KDZ but he
13 said definitely something DZ. The driver was the only
14 person in the car and a male who was smoking aged
15 between 35 and 40. Mr. Gillanders said: 15:27
16

17 "He had very dark brown hair, it was fairly long and
18 straggly. He had a very sparse beard where he hadn't
19 shaved for three or four days. He had a fairly thin
20 face." 15:27
21

22 Mr. Gillanders said that this vehicle did not have an
23 indicator on but stopped and turned right in the road
24 which he was seeking to exit, following another vehicle
25 which was blue or blue/grey which had come from 15:27
26 Mr. Gillanders right. Mr. Gillanders saw both vehicles
27 sitting parallel to one another in a side road that
28 they had then turned into. He said the grey car had
29 one person. The driver who was male and was in his

1 50s, he said, had grey curly hair and looked heavily
2 built. He had a round face. Mr. Gillanders commented
3 that he thought that what he had seen was suspicious as
4 it was 6:40 p.m.

5
6 He then said that when he was watching the television
7 on 16th August 1998, the details of the bomb car's
8 registration plate rang a bell with him as to what he
9 had seen on this particular evening.

10
11 MR. MARK SAFRANAUSKAS WAS QUESTIONED FURTHER BY MR. DE
12 LA POER AS FOLLOWS:

13
14 839 Q. MR. DE LA POER: Then we come to the penultimate
15 sequence of calls, we are at row 150?

16 A. We are, yes.

17 840 Q. And we remind ourselves, Mr. Safranauskas, that the
18 time is now 6:39 on the late afternoon of the 14th?

19 A. Yes.

20 841 Q. So we know that this is the evening before the attack?

21 A. Yes.

22 842 Q. A 55-second call from the red 430 phone to the light
23 blue 406 phone?

24 A. Correct.

25 843 Q. We can move over number 51, Mr. Rafferty has dealt with
26 that already. We've got another call from the Patrick
27 Brady landline to Derek 'Shanty' Brady's yellow phone?

28 A. Yes.

29 844 Q. Then at 18:53, a call from the green phone to the

1 Emerald Bar?

2 A. Yes.

3 845 Q. This call lasting one minute and 29 seconds?

4 A. Yes.

5 846 Q. Those following in hard copy, we can see that at 19:08, 15:29
6 over the, page row 154, a call to the Patrick Daly
7 landline, by Seamus Daly on the green phone?

8 A. Yes.

9 847 Q. A minute and five seconds?

10 A. Yes. 15:30

11 848 Q. At 19:18, 971 pink Peter Campbell phone to the
12 Oliver Treanor pale blue 406?

13 A. Yes.

14 849 Q. A minute and 14 seconds?

15 A. Correct. 15:30

16 850 Q. Two more cell site calls, Dundalk 0375, for the 8:04?

17 A. Yes.

18 851 Q. Or the 8:05 Clermont Carn 5218?

19 A. Yes.

20 852 Q. Both the Donegan phone. Now we have a very substantial 15:30
21 call indeed in terms of its length?

22 A. Yes.

23 853 Q. This is Declan McComish landline to the red 430 phone?

24 A. Yes.

25 854 Q. We are going to see in Part 4 and into Part 5, Mr 15:31
26 Safranauskas, that that red 430 phone provisionally
27 attributed to the hands of Liam Campbell the following
28 day and found to be a fact in the Breslin litigation,
29 that phone was based around the warning calls, wasn't

1 it?

2 A. It was, yes.

3 855 Q. At the time they were made?

4 A. Yes.

5 856 Q. Here it is the night before, four minutes and 38 second 15:31
6 conversation with Declan McComish's landline?

7 A. Yes.

8 857 Q. And then one more call before we consider the final
9 sightings, Peter Campbell's pink 971 to
10 Oliver Treanor's 406 pale blue? 15:32

11 A. Correct.

12 858 Q. 21 seconds, the time is just before 9 o'clock?

13 A. Yes.

14

15 MR. MARK SAFRANAUSKAS WAS QUESTIONED FURTHER BY 15:32
16 MR. RAFFERTY AS FOLLOWS:

17

18 859 Q. MR. RAFFERTY: So, sir, the two final potential
19 sightings that you are going to hear about occurred on
20 the evening of 14th August and they are at rows 160 and 15:32
21 161. You can see Mr. Safranauskas, can you just
22 identify, perhaps with reference to one of the earlier
23 observations we had from Mr. Thomas Hillen which we
24 would describe as the most easterly one --

25 A. Yes. 15:32

26 860 Q. -- where the first of the two observations we're going
27 to talk about occurred?

28 A. We're just looking above him now in the Mullaghbawn
29 area.

1 861 Q. So that's at 9:20 in the evening of the 14th August?
2 A. Correct, yes.

3 862 Q. Can we then just bring up the next observation because
4 we know that its said to have occurred 10 minutes
5 later -- 15:33

6 A. Yes.

7 863 Q. -- at 9:30.
8 A. So looking most north of the screen we are now looking
9 again at Market Street in Omagh and the sighting of Ian
10 Brown. 15:33

11 864 Q. So we have one at 9:20 in Mullaghbawn, it's to the far
12 east?

13 A. Yes.

14 865 Q. And then the north west we have Ian Brown, 10 minutes
15 later in Market Street, Omagh? 15:33

16 A. Yes.

17 866 Q. This, Mr. Safranauskas, the first of the two sightings,
18 so the one in Mullaghbawn is said to have been from an
19 anonymous source, isn't that correct?

20 A. It is, yes. 15:33

21 867 Q. Sir, the Inquiry understands the Gardaí received
22 information that a person had been travelling from a
23 hotel called the Fairways Hotel in Dundalk?

24 A. Yes.

25 MR. RAFFERTY: At around 9:20 in the direction of 15:33
26 Crossmaglen. He said that as he turned left at
27 Mullaghbawn he noticed a red Vauxhall with the
28 registration detail "DL" and the note records it was
29 shining and he thought it had bright wheels, two men in

1 front, woman in back. And in respect of Mr Brown's
2 potential sighting, he said in a statement that he gave
3 to the police on 18th September that he got into a
4 parked car roughly outside the Cosy Corner pub in
5 Market Street in Omagh between 9:00 and 10:00 p.m. on 15:34
6 14th August and he records saying that he saw a red
7 Vauxhall Cavalier with a Donegal registration drive up
8 Market Street past my vehicle. Mr Brown concluded by
9 saying he could not say where the vehicle went, but it
10 was a saloon shape and seemed to be in good state of 15:34
11 repair, it was freshly cleaned, there were two men in
12 the car and passenger was shorter than the driver.
13 Thank you Mr. Safranauskas.

14
15 MR. MARK SAFRANAUSKAS WAS QUESTIONED FURTHER BY MR. DE 15:35
16 LA POER AS FOLLOWS:

17
18 868 Q. MR. DE LA POER: We will conclude our of calls with the
19 final five for Part 3. Four of them concern three
20 handsets? 15:35

21 A. Yes, they do.

28 406 Oliver Treanor phone?

29 A. Yes.

1 871 Q. That's 39 seconds. 40 minutes later, 22:24, we have 15
2 second contact between the 971 pink phone and the 406
3 pale blue phone?
4 A. Yes.
5 872 Q. Interrupting that sequence of two different handsets, 15:36
6 this one, 076 green phone Seamus Daly, his partner's
7 phone 556, a minute and 20 seconds, shortly before
8 11:00?
9 A. Correct.
10 873 Q. And row 166, the final item in our Part 3 presentation, 15:36
11 it's 23:13, so shortly before midnight?
12 A. Yes.
13 874 Q. 14th of August, a ten second contact between the 406
14 pale blue Oliver Treanor phone and the 430 red Liam
15 Campbell phone? 15:37
16 A. Correct.
17 875 Q. And at this stage Mr. Safranauskas, we are going to
18 conclude your evidence. Sir, can I just say this about
19 what we are to expect? Firstly, in terms of today, can
20 I please invite everybody who has hold of a hard copy 15:37
