2 **MS LANGDALE:** Chair, may I call the next witness,  
3 Christopher, please.

4 **CHRISTOPHER (sworn)**

5 (Evidence given in private session)

6 **THE CHAIR:** Yes, do sit down.

7 Just before we start, Ms Langdale, I just wanted to  
8 say that this is a private session and we are hearing  
9 evidence from former students, and their evidence will  
10 be visible only on livelink and not on live stream.  
11 Transcripts will be published in due course, and  
12 accordingly there can be no broadcasting of these  
13 witnesses' evidence at all.

14 However, I am aware that a video that's about to be  
15 shown with the first witness is already in the  
16 possession of some media outlets who have previously  
17 published it. I'm content to permit the media to  
18 re-publish and re-broadcast the video in their  
19 contemporaneous reports of these proceedings, but only  
20 as long as the students' faces are pixelated to minimise  
21 intrusion into their private lives. So I hope that's  
22 understood.

23 Secondly, I just also have had a message that  
24 somebody's mobile phone or mobile phones are vibrating  
25 quite near the front of the room on silent and that's

1

1 sponsored or attached to the university, what was the  
2 significance of that for you?

3 **A.** I looked on the University website and it was listed as  
4 one of them and so that's where I was kind of looking  
5 for things. So it seemed like an easy choice.

6 **Q.** What was the accommodation like?

7 **A.** It was pretty nice, I thought. Yeah, I had no  
8 complaints on the accommodation.

9 **Q.** Reading your statement it sounds as though four of you  
10 moved in around the same time; is that at the beginning  
11 of term in September 2021?

12 **A.** Yeah, yeah.

13 **Q.** Then two others moved in slightly later and one of them  
14 was VC; is that right?

15 **A.** That's correct, yes.

16 **Q.** Can you remember roughly around when VC joined the  
17 accommodation?

18 **A.** Not off the top of my head, but I believe it was in  
19 October.

20 **Q.** When he joined, what were your first impressions and how  
21 did you get on with him?

22 **A.** So, I met him. I went in the kitchen one day and he was  
23 there. So I introduced myself, asked his name, what he  
24 was studying, just kind of general small talk. Didn't  
25 really think too much about it. I noticed that he was

1 interfering with the stenographer being able to carry  
2 out the recordings of the proceedings, so please do  
3 switch off phones to prevent that from happening.

4 Yes, Ms Langdale.

5 **Questioned by MS LANGDALE**

6 **MS LANGDALE:** Christopher, you have provided a statement for  
7 the Inquiry dated 27 October 2025. Can you confirm for  
8 us that it is true and accurate as far as you are  
9 concerned?

10 **A.** I can confirm that, yes.

11 **Q.** Do you have it near you?

12 **A.** I do, yeah.

13 **Q.** It might be useful.

14 Can we begin at paragraph 8 of your statement. It  
15 is your second year at university and you apply to  
16 Raleigh Park for accommodation. Tell us about that,  
17 what did you know about the accommodation, what did you  
18 do?

19 **A.** Yes, so I was supposed to go on a study abroad year,  
20 that year that I lived at Raleigh Park, and so the  
21 previous it was cancelled due to Covid, so I had to kind  
22 of scramble to make last minute arrangements. So I saw  
23 that it was a kind of a private but university sponsored  
24 accommodation. So I chose to kind of go there.

25 **Q.** What was the significance -- when you say university

2

1 older than the rest of us, but nothing strange  
2 immediately.

3 **Q.** Had you come straight from school to university?

4 **A.** Yes.

5 **Q.** He was a more mature student, you recognised that and  
6 saw that?

7 **A.** Yes.

8 **Q.** In terms of eating meals and the shared parts of the  
9 accommodation, did you share any of it with him?

10 **A.** So, there was six separate rooms and there were two  
11 bathrooms, so the three rooms at the back, they all  
12 shared the closest bathroom and then the three ones at  
13 the front we all shared a bathroom. So I shared  
14 a bathroom and then a kitchen/living area with him.

15 **Q.** So the kitchen area was a communal area for all six?

16 **A.** Yes.

17 **Q.** Did you ever eat meals together?

18 **A.** Not necessarily together, but we would eat at the same  
19 time sometimes, it just depends on people's schedules  
20 and what they were doing.

21 **Q.** Did VC get involved in the conversation if he was eating  
22 a meal at the same time as you?

23 **A.** No.

24 **Q.** Did you ever cook for each other or that kind of stuff?

25 **A.** No.

4

1 Q. Did you ever bump into him outside of the flat or  
2 socially?  
3 A. I think I saw him a couple of times in the Lidl that was  
4 across the road, but apart from that no.  
5 Q. So in a shop buying stuff?  
6 A. Yes.  
7 Q. Did you ever see him in clubs or bars, assuming you went  
8 to a few, did you?  
9 A. I did and, no, I didn't see him.  
10 Q. Was he a friendly person in those early days or how  
11 would you describe him?  
12 A. I wouldn't describe him as friendly, I would describe  
13 him as quiet, kept to himself, didn't really get  
14 involved with us, but at the same time I didn't have any  
15 issues with him at that time. So not friendly but not  
16 unfriendly.  
17 Q. You say in your statement at paragraph 33:  
18 "I saw a change in [his] personality ... around  
19 December 2021 or in January 2022."  
20 What sort of changes were you seeing in December?  
21 A. We would hear like the occasional kind of like scream --  
22 like noises from his room. He seemed like a lot more  
23 withdrawn. He wasn't ever warm to us, but maybe even  
24 more withdrawn, then there were some issues with the  
25 bathroom and hygiene; he would shave his body and blow

1 very short, didn't want to engage in a conversation. So  
2 I didn't really have any more than surface level  
3 conversations with him.  
4 Q. You didn't feel comfortable to raise directly that  
5 issue, was that the case, with him, I mean, not with  
6 your friends?  
7 A. You know it is a bit of an awkward thing to say "can you  
8 work on your hygiene and can you not do this". So we  
9 didn't bring it up prior to the 15th.  
10 Q. Did he ever have any visitors to see him at the  
11 accommodation or to meet him there as far as you are  
12 aware?  
13 A. Not that I'm aware of.  
14 Q. Did you ever see him when he was in Lidl or going out  
15 with anyone, or was he on his own?  
16 A. No, always alone.  
17 Q. What about his demeanour and tone of voice?  
18 A. Very flat, unemotional and unexpressive.  
19 Q. Did you say unemotional?  
20 A. Yes, very flat.  
21 Q. You tell us from paragraph 42 -- and if you can now in  
22 your own words -- what happened on the evening of  
23 15 January?  
24 A. So, the bathroom had been left in probably the worst  
25 state that it had been up to that point. I think

1 his nose and leave it in the shower. So if you went to  
2 get in there would be snot and hair in there, so that  
3 was one of the things we noticed.  
4 Q. What was your thinking at the time these things were  
5 happening?  
6 A. I didn't know about anything else, so I just thought it  
7 was a bit of a strange thing to do and it was not  
8 courteous to the other people that he lived with, so  
9 I thought it was rude.  
10 Q. Before the incident on 15 January, which we will come to  
11 now, did you have a conversation with him, or as far as  
12 you were aware any of your other flatmates, about the  
13 deterioration and the state of the bathroom, for  
14 example?  
15 A. Yes, so it was me, Ryan [X] and --  
16 Q. Please don't use surnames, if you can just use first  
17 names, please.  
18 A. So it was me, Ryan and then VC. So we shared the  
19 bathroom and Ryan had complained quite a lot about the  
20 state that it was being left in. So we would talk about  
21 that.  
22 Q. Talk about that with VC or just to each other?  
23 A. Not with him, kind of between ourselves. I had probably  
24 a handful of very short conversations where maybe I was  
25 trying -- how's it going? And he would say "good" or

1 there's a picture of it in the statement somewhere.  
2 I decided that I couldn't shower because of it and  
3 I didn't want to clean it myself because I didn't think  
4 I should have to do that.  
5 Q. Had you done that previously?  
6 A. Ryan had done that and I had done it occasionally, but  
7 Ryan primarily. So I didn't want to clean it up after  
8 him and so I knocked on the door and I just asked him  
9 "can you please clean it up. This isn't fair to the  
10 other people", and then he didn't really say much but  
11 kind of brushed it off and went back in his room.  
12 Then a few hours later he came in the kitchen and  
13 I asked him if he had cleaned it up yet --  
14 Q. A few hours, so was it a few hours?  
15 A. Yeah, it is difficult to say. I can't remember exactly.  
16 In my understanding it was maybe a couple of hours,  
17 a few hours. But a period of time had passed. He came  
18 in the kitchen so I said to him, "Have you cleaned it up  
19 yet?" He said, "No, and I'm not going to, what are you  
20 going to do about it?"  
21 That upset me and I thought that was rude so I said  
22 "I will call you a dirty bastard". He told me to say it  
23 again. I said it again and then he kind of came flying  
24 across the room, threw a punch. I dodged the punch and  
25 then we were wrestling. He ended up getting me in

8

1 a headlock and then I was asking him "Please let go of  
2 me, let go", and eventually he let go. I called the  
3 police. The police came. In the interim I wanted to  
4 wait outside because I didn't feel safe in there. He  
5 wouldn't let me leave, so I had to stay in the kitchen  
6 with him. The other members of the flat were outside at  
7 this point so it was me and VC in the room. I remember  
8 him looking very intensely at me the whole time and  
9 didn't say anything, just kind of leaned against  
10 the counter top there and stared at me.

11 At that point I was feeling pretty worried.  
12 I didn't feel like that was a normal reaction to the  
13 situation. So I called the police again and asked them  
14 where they were, if they were coming and they told me  
15 that you are on the highest priority, that they are  
16 coming as quick as they can. So then we waited a little  
17 bit longer and then the police came in, separated us and  
18 spoke to both of us.

19 **Q.** So, at this point I am going to suggest that we play the  
20 footage of the first part of the incident when you ask  
21 one of your flatmates to film it, and also footage later  
22 on that you take and the calls in between. So we will  
23 just listen and see them all and then I will ask you  
24 some more questions arising.

25 So the first video, please, WITN0059002.  
9

1 me, his weight is on me, so I can't stand up from there,  
2 so yes, I was kind of stuck.  
3 **Q.** How strong was he?  
4 **A.** He was strong, yes.  
5 **Q.** The second video you take, how would you describe that  
6 situation? I'm going to tell you soon how that is  
7 described in medical notes, but what did -- how would  
8 you seek to describe what that felt like?  
9 **A.** It felt quite ominous. I didn't know why he wouldn't  
10 let me leave. I didn't know if there was a plan behind  
11 it or what was --  
12 **Q.** Sorry, I missed that?  
13 **A.** I didn't know what was going on basically, I didn't know  
14 why he wouldn't want me to leave. I would have thought  
15 if he was upset with me, he would be happy to see me  
16 leave, but he wasn't and I didn't know why and I found  
17 it quite distressing.  
18 **Q.** You sound distressed on the call, were you distressed?  
19 **A.** Yes, yes.  
20 **Q.** When you say "ominous", did you think something else  
21 might happen, did you think he might do something again?  
22 **A.** I just didn't know. So I really thought it escalated  
23 very quickly before and then could escalate that quickly  
24 again.  
25 **Q.** The police came out. I'm going to take you to documents  
11

1 **(Video played)**  
2 Then if we can have the call, please, NGPF0000057.  
3 This is your first call at 19.12.  
4 **(Audio played)**  
5 So before we play anything else, that call lasts  
6 4 minutes 5 seconds, so you are off the phone around  
7 19.16, 7.16pm. Then if we can see the next video  
8 please, WITN0059003.  
9 **(Video played)**  
10 If we can play the second call at 19.19,  
11 NGPF0000058.  
12 **(Audio played)**  
13 So the first video, you ask someone to take that  
14 footage, that phone footage. Why did you ask  
15 somebody -- I'm sorry if it seems obvious -- to do that?  
16 **A.** Just so that it is captured and evidence, it shows what  
17 happened. Yeah.  
18 **Q.** You refer in the call to "cranking my neck", how did  
19 that feel?  
20 **A.** It did not feel good. Yeah, it was pretty painful. My  
21 neck felt pretty stiff, but it was ultimately okay.  
22 **Q.** How was he preventing you from getting up from the sofa?  
23 Again you see where he is in relation to where you are,  
24 but can you just explain that?  
25 **A.** Yes, so my head was kind of down and then he's on top of  
12

1 from the police later, but I'd like to just hear it from  
2 you if we can. When the police came out, we know two  
3 officers came out, they are giving evidence next week,  
4 talk us through that?  
5 **A.** Okay. So, the police come in the flat, they  
6 immediately -- one of them takes me into the hallway and  
7 then the door is closed. The other one speaks to VC.  
8 They ask me what happened, I explained. Then, from what  
9 I remember, [VC] had told them a different story to what  
10 I had and so they said "oh, he's got a different story".  
11 So I showed them the video of what happened.  
12 **Q.** Pausing there. Do you remember showing them that at the  
13 flat?  
14 **A.** 100 per cent.  
15 **Q.** You showed the officer that you were talking to, which  
16 video?  
17 **A.** The headlock video. I 100 per cent showed that.  
18 **Q.** Thank you. Carry on.  
19 **A.** So, I showed him the video and then he said something  
20 like "well, I know what happened now then". So then he  
21 went and spoke to the other officer and VC. He came  
22 back out and said, "you know you don't have any  
23 injuries" or he asked me if I had any injuries and  
24 I said "well, nothing I can really think of, my finger  
25 hurts a bit, my neck hurts but nothing really".  
12

1 Q. You have mentioned your finger in your statement; did  
2 that hurt? What happened to that?

3 A. When I was wrestling around with him I must have somehow  
4 hurt my finger. It was swollen and I didn't get any  
5 medical treatment for it, but it definitely was injured.

6 Q. Sorry, carry on.

7 A. So, he says "well, you don't have enough for ABH because  
8 you don't have any real injuries, this is going to be  
9 common assault" kind of -- a little bit -- I felt like  
10 it was dismissive in a way, like they were trying to  
11 basically tell me that nothing would happen.

12 Q. When you say "they", just to be clear, there's two  
13 officers, one speaking to VC --

14 A. The one I was speaking to.

15 Q. Just the one that was speaking to you. And you are sure  
16 this was being said to you at the scene, if you like,  
17 not later on the account of this was at the scene.

18 A. No, he said that at the scene. He said: "Do you want  
19 to -- we can do this thing called restorative justice  
20 where we go in there and we tell VC that he needs to  
21 apologise and shake your hand, and if he doesn't then we  
22 will arrest him and we will take him [to the jail  
23 I guess]."

24 So, they asked if I wanted to do that. I agreed  
25 because I felt like well they basically told me that

13

1 A. I believe he may have asked me but I didn't respond  
2 until the Sunday. I remember him saying on the Saturday  
3 night that "I work night shifts this week" or something,  
4 so "I will be -- right at the start of my shift, I will  
5 be at the police station, so if you come around." Maybe  
6 he did say to me on that night and then I think he maybe  
7 followed up the next day.

8 Q. So he made an arrangement with you to continue the  
9 conversation about the case, so you went the next day.

10 A. So I went the next day. I remember it was around 8 or  
11 9 pm, sat in the police station with him. They were  
12 asking me "Oh, can you provide the video, bring your  
13 phone with the videos and we will tape(?) that." So  
14 I did. If I remember it didn't work or it couldn't  
15 transfer or something.

16 But part of it was finalise the statement; the other  
17 one was give the videos to them. So I did the  
18 statement, I finalised that, and then they asked me do  
19 I want to pursue it and at that point, to be honest,  
20 I kind of thought it was a waste of time and they said  
21 you will have to -- you may have to appear at court and  
22 kind of acted like it would perhaps be work for me. So,  
23 I just said, yeah, we will leave it at that. The only  
24 thing I wanted was for him to not live in the flat  
25 anymore.

15

1 nothing was going to come of this, so why not just make  
2 it easy and agree to that. So I did. And then they  
3 went and spoke to him. He didn't agree to do that, so  
4 he didn't apologise, he didn't shake my hand. But then  
5 they didn't arrest him and nothing happened, no, yeah.

6 Q. When you use the word "arrest", had the officer talking  
7 to you used that word or was it just in your mind, if he  
8 doesn't say sorry they will arrest him?

9 A. They said it, if he doesn't agree we will arrest him.

10 Q. Then he didn't agree. Did you follow that up with the  
11 officer you were speaking to and say "Well he hasn't  
12 agreed, so are you going to arrest him"? How did you  
13 leave it then?

14 A. I don't believe I asked that question, no.

15 Q. You went to the police the next day, which was  
16 a Sunday -- this happened on Saturday evening, didn't  
17 it?

18 A. Yes.

19 Q. You went to the police station on the Sunday. What  
20 happened then? Can you remember then?

21 A. Yes, so I believe the officer contacted me and asked if  
22 I would go and finalise the statement and all the  
23 paperwork.

24 Q. Was that on the Saturday night he contacted you when he  
25 had left or between --

14

1 Q. When you say a statement, we will go to it in a moment,  
2 there is a pocket book entry you signed. Do you mean  
3 that statement, not a different statement, not one that  
4 you wrote like this Inquiry?

5 A. Yeah, I can't recall.

6 Q. You also say that you said to the police, based on the  
7 incident and his staring, there was something not right  
8 with VC?

9 A. Yes.

10 Q. Did you say that at the station or when they came out?

11 A. So I said that at the night that it happened. So I was  
12 in -- we were in the hallway and I think we were in my  
13 room very briefly and the officer came to give me his  
14 card with his information and details on it and I said  
15 to him "There's something not quite right about [VC].  
16 He is just strange. You need to look into him because  
17 this is not right".

18 Then the next day, when I was at the police station,  
19 it was the same officer and he said "I looked into what  
20 you said. I can't say very much, but there's something  
21 to it" and that was all that I was told.

22 Q. "Something to it" what did you think that meant?

23 Something to him having --

24 A. I assumed it meant there was some previous history with  
25 him.

16

1 Q. Mental health history?  
 2 A. I didn't know.  
 3 Q. You didn't know?  
 4 A. Yes.  
 5 Q. Were you saying when "something's not right", were you  
 6 thinking in your mind he doesn't seem mentally well, or  
 7 he doesn't seem right for other reasons, or what?  
 8 A. Yeah, I mean, the way that I kind of thought about it  
 9 was if that was me and I lost my temper and then  
 10 I attacked someone, if the police are on the way I would  
 11 be thinking about how do I minimise this, how do I --  
 12 but he didn't seem to have that, he just didn't really  
 13 seem to react to the fact it was the police and just  
 14 kind of stayed -- he didn't seem to make a difference to  
 15 him.  
 16 Q. You tell us at paragraph 71:  
 17 "Before the incident on the 15 ... I never saw [him]  
 18 behave unusually or aggressively or show signs of mental  
 19 illness but after this incident, he did".  
 20 Just unpacking that, aggressive and mental illness  
 21 are not necessarily the same thing.  
 22 A. I think when I said "I had not seen signs of mental  
 23 illness", when I look back in hindsight, perhaps I had,  
 24 but at that moment I had not noticed anything, I just  
 25 thought people are quiet, people are -- some people are

1 We go down:  
 2 "Summary:  
 3 "Suspect is a resident at the student complex in  
 4 which an argument over the cleaning of the shower has  
 5 taken places. Words were exchanged and the suspect has  
 6 put his arm around the victim's neck in a neck lock."  
 7 That, as a description of the incident, what do you  
 8 say about that? Do you think that captures it, or not?  
 9 A. I mean, it captures it. I don't think there's anything  
 10 totally wrong about that, no.  
 11 Q. The argument, as it were, emerged much later, didn't it?  
 12 You say there was a break between you asking him to  
 13 clean up the shower and this continuing later.  
 14 Now you know it was early evening, you know  
 15 the times of the 999 calls, can you place when earlier  
 16 on in the day you had said anything about it?  
 17 A. No, I can't place it exactly.  
 18 Q. Can we go to page 2, please, of the same document. We  
 19 can keep the whole page on because actually I just want  
 20 to see at the bottom it says again:  
 21 "Assault - S39 - Common assault."  
 22 Next page, page 3, the timing of it, 15 January,  
 23 7 pm. If we go over to page 5. It is recorded there in  
 24 the middle:  
 25 "To obtain statement from victim To obtain phone

1 withdrawn. I didn't think it is necessarily a sign of  
 2 him being mentally ill, but perhaps in hindsight it was.  
 3 Sorry can you repeat the question.  
 4 Q. What were the signs of aggression after the incident?  
 5 What did you see?  
 6 A. After the incident he was much more hostile to us. So  
 7 if we were talking loudly or someone -- he would come  
 8 and yell, like, "shut the fuck up" and he was a lot more  
 9 openly hostile with us.  
 10 Q. You say he'd knock on doors, specifically Ryan's door?  
 11 A. Yes, I can't remember too much about that, but Ryan,  
 12 I remember, had probably the biggest issue with him. He  
 13 would -- because their rooms were next to each other.  
 14 So he would knock on Ryan's door. There were some  
 15 instances prior to the 15th where he went into people's  
 16 rooms in the night. There was an incident with me when  
 17 he knocked on my door, it was early in the morning it  
 18 would have been, like 7.30/8 am and then asked me if  
 19 I heard screams. I believe he said with Abdullah.  
 20 Abdullah was asleep and woke up and he was in the room  
 21 and asked him the same question I believe.  
 22 Q. Can we go now, please, to some police documents. If we  
 23 start at NGPF0000055. This is a police Occurrence Log.  
 24 So, if we look at the top of it, it says:  
 25 "Assault - ABH/Common."

1 footage To interview suspect."  
 2 If we go over to the next page, page 6, there is  
 3 phone footage of the incident recorded under the CCTV.  
 4 Then if we go to page 7, the box at the top, you  
 5 see:  
 6 "... victim ... has attended ... Police Station and  
 7 given a Negative PNB [that's pocket notebook] as he no  
 8 longer wishes to make a complaint. He states that all  
 9 he cares about is that he wants the suspect to be  
 10 removed from the complex and he will be going through  
 11 the proper channels."  
 12 We can go, if we may, to the notebook, NGPF0000056.  
 13 If we go to the second page we see where the entries  
 14 begin for you. If we go to the third page, doing the  
 15 best I can, Christopher, what that says if we go from  
 16 the fifth line down:  
 17 "I have reconsidered my desire to make a complaint  
 18 and I have decided that I do not wish to make  
 19 a statement or make any complaint. I do not support  
 20 police prosecution and I'm not willing to attend court.  
 21 The reason for this is that I am not bothered about  
 22 getting him done but I'm only wanting him out of the  
 23 property. I have already put in a complaint requesting  
 24 this. I would like to state that I'm not in fear of him  
 25 and I'm happy that I have been ..."

1 I cannot read that word, something by the police.  
 2 No doubt that will be dealt with in evidence next week:  
 3 "I make this statement of my own free will with no  
 4 third party involvement."  
 5 Then there is a signature obviously covered for  
 6 these purposes. Do you remember signing that?  
 7 **A.** I remember signing it, I guess, yes. Yes.  
 8 **Q.** You tell us in your statement you went to the police  
 9 station at 9.40 pm that Sunday evening, that fits with  
 10 what you were saying about the night shift pattern and  
 11 had this discussion. Is that what you felt about the  
 12 incident or did you feel pressure in respect of the  
 13 incident, or tell us how you felt?  
 14 **A.** I don't think I would have used those words at the end,  
 15 especially about I'm not in fear of him. I don't think  
 16 they were -- perhaps I was coached slightly, I don't  
 17 think I used those words.  
 18 **Q.** Was your primary view that you wanted him out of the  
 19 property?  
 20 **A.** Yes. So my view was kind of I just don't want to have  
 21 to deal with him personally. I don't really care what  
 22 happens to him, I just don't want to see him, don't want  
 23 to be around him.  
 24 **Q.** You should see, please, witness statement WITN0024001,  
 25 page 3, from the officer that spoke to you at  
 21

1 officers something didn't seem right and he was looking  
 2 into it, whatever that was.  
 3 **A.** Yes.  
 4 **Q.** Did he ever mention mental health issues to you?  
 5 **A.** No.  
 6 **Q.** Then if we go to paragraph 28 of this statement, the  
 7 officer says:  
 8 "In Nottingham City Centre we would deal with very  
 9 similar reports of assaults most days especially from  
 10 Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday nights, many of  
 11 which involve students. Typically, the person reporting  
 12 the incident is not injured and does not wish to engage  
 13 with the police. We would normally contact them the  
 14 following day to see if they want to make a complaint  
 15 and, if they do not, we would ask them to sign a Pocket  
 16 Notebook Entry to confirm. However, the crime would  
 17 still be recorded."  
 18 That's characterised as an event involving students  
 19 typically at a weekend. Do you have any comment on  
 20 that?  
 21 **A.** Yeah, I don't think it is necessarily the same thing.  
 22 Obviously when you think of a student you think of  
 23 someone who maybe was the age I was at the time, 19, 20,  
 24 21. VC was significantly older than that. It happened  
 25 in a flat not on the street. Yeah, I don't necessarily  
 23

1 paragraph 15. It says at 14 and 15:  
 2 "When we arrived at the flat, my recollection is  
 3 that I spoke to the caller ..."  
 4 That's you. Then he says:  
 5 "Christopher did not really engage with me. He did  
 6 not want to make a statement and he said he wanted to  
 7 think about whether or not to make a formal criminal  
 8 complaint against [VC] ... He told me that there was  
 9 some video on his phone of the incident but he did not  
 10 provide that to me at that time."  
 11 **A.** That's false. I showed him the video.  
 12 **Q.** The first video?  
 13 **A.** Yeah.  
 14 **Q.** Not the second one that was on your phone?  
 15 **A.** I maybe showed both but I know for a fact that I showed  
 16 him the first video.  
 17 **Q.** If we look at paragraph 23, the officer says:  
 18 "I did not contact any other organisations or  
 19 agencies about this matter. This appeared to me to be  
 20 a 'one off' falling out between flatmates. Although  
 21 I was made aware of a possible mental health history on  
 22 the part of [VC] ... I did not have any concerns from  
 23 what I saw and heard that the incident was related to  
 24 any mental health issues on his part."  
 25 You said earlier that you had suggested to the  
 22

1 think it's very comparable but I can see where -- what  
 2 they are getting at with that.  
 3 **Q.** You say in your statement that you felt intimidated by  
 4 VC and wanted nothing to do with him. Is that how it  
 5 linked why you wanted him out of the flat, you did not  
 6 want anything to do with him?  
 7 **A.** Yes.  
 8 **Q.** Did you give that reason for wanting him out of the flat  
 9 speaking to the officer either at the station or on the  
 10 day?  
 11 **A.** I can't recall.  
 12 **Q.** Did you ever retract or say anything other than you felt  
 13 intimidated or distressed by what happened? Did you  
 14 ever try to brush it off and say "It wasn't a big deal,  
 15 I'm fine"?  
 16 **A.** Yeah. At the time you feel like your pride's been hurt  
 17 and you don't want to maybe say everything, you want to  
 18 kind of seem like you're okay. So perhaps I did,  
 19 I can't recall exactly.  
 20 **Q.** You clearly sound distressed when you are phoning 999.  
 21 So if you are being candid about how you did feel about  
 22 it and somebody had explored it with you like we are  
 23 now, what would you say about how you felt about it?  
 24 **A.** There was just something very wrong about the situation.  
 25 I felt like it -- not necessarily what happened but his  
 24

1 reaction I found very unsettling, very unusual, and that  
2 was perhaps what distressed me the most is that I felt  
3 I couldn't relate and I couldn't see what he was  
4 thinking and, yeah, that was what I found distressing  
5 about it.

6 **Q.** In the medical notes it becomes referred to as "the  
7 hostage situation" when you are not effectively being  
8 allowed to leave the flat. We see on the video VC  
9 circling back to you when you want to try and leave the  
10 flat. Did it feel like that in the moment?

11 **A.** Yes.

12 **Q.** What words would you say to describe not being able to  
13 leave meant for you at the time?

14 **A.** Yes, it did feel like that at the time. Because when  
15 the assault happened there were two other people in the  
16 room. It was just me and him at that point. He's  
17 staring into my eyes and, yeah, it did feel like that to  
18 me.

19 **Q.** Was the officer who spoke to you aware of the fact that  
20 you were prevented from leaving? You are not sure you  
21 showed that video, in fact you said you didn't show them  
22 that footage. Were they aware of that part of the  
23 situation?

24 **A.** I can't recall but I would be very surprised if I didn't  
25 mention that because I filmed the video and I've called

25

1 **Q.** Did you report that interaction to someone?

2 **A.** I believe so. I believe I emailed the Residential  
3 Experience Team.

4 **Q.** Dealing with the events -- we will go to the documents  
5 again after you have recounted what you remember, if  
6 I may. So in terms of him moving out and being in the  
7 flat and him not being in the flat, what happened around  
8 those days? So we know the incident is on the 15th, you  
9 have gone to the police station on the 16th. What  
10 happens next in terms of where --

11 **A.** So I didn't stay at the flat on the Sunday evening  
12 I believe, so I was at a friend's house and I was  
13 driving back from the friend's house and back to flat 15  
14 at Raleigh Park. and I got a phone call from I believe  
15 it was Chris at the Residential Experience Team, and he  
16 asked me where I was. I said I'm driving at the moment  
17 back to the flat, and he told me not to go in the flat.  
18 He said the police are outside and they are getting VC  
19 the help that he needs and under no circumstances go  
20 back to the flat. We have a temporary flat for you that  
21 you are going to stay in so when you come back go to the  
22 reception and they will show you the temporary flat.

23 **Q.** Could you get any of your belongings?

24 **A.** So initially, no, but I think it was that evening they  
25 said "we are going to take each of you in individually

27

1 the police thinking that that was kind of an escalation  
2 in a way. So I'm fairly sure I would have said that to  
3 the police although I can't recall exactly.

4 **Q.** You tell us in your statement:

5 "For the remaining 1 ½ years at university, after  
6 [VC] ..." I will come in a moment to how he moved out  
7 and when, you "only saw him once again."

8 Can you tell us about when you saw him once again?

9 **A.** Yeah, so we were sat in the kitchen condition, I can't  
10 remember exactly who was there, but me and maybe one or  
11 two of the other people that lived in the flat, and then  
12 the kitchen door had a window and the kitchen door, if  
13 someone opened the front door you would see the door  
14 open and then whoever came in you would see them through  
15 the window glass, and the door opened and I saw VC walk  
16 in.

17 So, of course, I was -- what's going on? So I come  
18 out the kitchen and asked him what he's doing here. He  
19 said he was here for a bank statement or something along  
20 those lines, about a bank statement. I said we didn't  
21 have them and asked him to leave. He looked at me for  
22 a moment and then walked into the bathroom, used it,  
23 presumably I guess, I don't know, and then left the  
24 flat. It was very tense. He didn't really say much but  
25 it was a very intense interaction.

26

1 into the flat, you grab whatever belongings you need for  
2 the short-term." I think the idea was VC didn't know  
3 anything was wrong, so don't kind of make it seem like  
4 anything was out of the ordinary, so just go in get your  
5 things and then leave and then each of us did that one  
6 by one.

7 **Q.** What did you think when they said "get him the help he  
8 needed", what did you think was happening?

9 **A.** I assumed that meant like psychiatric care.

10 **Q.** If we can go then, please, to a UNI document with  
11 UNIN0000194, page 2. We see at the bottom, I think we  
12 can read it like that -- can you read it like that?

13 **A.** Yes.

14 **Q.** We see at the bottom that you send on 16 January -- so  
15 just after midnight when the events have happened -- you  
16 send this email to a Jamie Dickinson. Can you tell us  
17 what that says?

18 **A.** "I was assaulted by a fellow student and flatmate  
19 tonight at Raleigh Park. The police were rang and the  
20 crime reference number is 22000028303. This has caused  
21 me a lot of stress and anxiety and I would love to speak  
22 to someone from the University about this, this is  
23 further causing me anxiety as I have an exam on Monday  
24 and I currently don't feel safe and can't focus on my  
25 exam. The student who I was assaulted by and who

28

1 trapped me in the flat and physically wouldn't let me  
2 and my flatmate Ryan leave is called [VC].  
3 Unfortunately I don't know his last name but I know he  
4 studied a masters in mechanical engineering at the  
5 University. The police came to my accommodation and  
6 dealt with the situation, but unfortunately, although he  
7 had intent to hurt me, I stopped him by grabbing him and  
8 holding him, stopping them from arresting him as  
9 i didn't sustain any injuries. This has caused me a lot  
10 of stress as he is still present in the flat and he  
11 doesn't seem the most stable of people.

12 "Any support would be extremely well received."

13 **Q.** Just focusing on what you say there, so you say  
14 "stopping them from arresting him as I didn't sustain  
15 injuries", by then you had signed or intending --

16 **A.** So that was the day, so I must have signed --

17 **Q.** Or said that you didn't want that to --

18 **A.** Yes.

19 **Q.** But you say:

20 "... unfortunately, although he had intent to hurt  
21 me ..." What did you mean by that?

22 **A.** So when the police came, they explained to me that  
23 because I wasn't injured -- if I'm speaking frankly, the  
24 idea was that nothing is going to happen, you are  
25 wasting your time kind of thing. So, the way that

1 So how stressful is this as this is going on and you  
2 are doing an exam?

3 **A.** Yes, very stressful.

4 **Q.** He says:

5 "That's absolutely fine, do you have a time tomorrow  
6 ..."

7 You say:

8 "Any time tomorrow is fine as my exams have finished  
9 fully by then."

10 Did you find ResX helpful or Christopher Hoskins  
11 helpful?

12 **A.** Yes, I'd say so. Yes.

13 **Q.** We know from his statement that he had spoken to people  
14 in the Mental Health Advisory Service, Claire Thompson  
15 and Ellie Turner and he was corresponding with you and  
16 emailing other students as well in the flat on  
17 18 January.

18 If we can have, please, on the screen WITN0032001,  
19 page 10, paragraph 30. He says:

20 "I attended the Raleigh Park flat on 18 January ...  
21 and supported the students with their move. My  
22 recollection is that the other students were not  
23 particularly concerned about the situation and not  
24 worried that VC was a risk to them. They were worried  
25 about the impact on their exams of having to move and

31

1 I thought about it in this email was because he hadn't  
2 hurt me, they didn't arrest him, so I didn't -- nothing  
3 happened, but I was still obviously worried about the  
4 situation and that.

5 **Q.** We know that email that you sent to Jamie Dickinson was  
6 passed on to Christopher Hoskins, who worked for ResX,  
7 who I think managed the University owned accommodation  
8 and some other third party accommodation, don't they,  
9 that's who you were dealing with, ResX. Did you know  
10 about who ResX were before you had to deal with this  
11 matter?

12 **A.** Not really, no.

13 **Q.** If we go back to page 2, we see a response from the  
14 Residential Experience Manager:

15 "My name is ... Chris ..."

16 At the top. You get this back on the Monday  
17 morning:

18 "My name is ... Chris.

19 "I understand from your email over the weekend, that  
20 you are currently experiencing issues with another  
21 student within your flat and this is making you feel  
22 unsafe and causing you distress?"

23 If we go to page 1, in reverse order, you say:

24 "I'd love to have a call but I have an exam today so  
25 I'm busy ..."

30

1 the inconvenience. I informed them of the emergency  
2 protocol ie in an emergency they should contact security  
3 or the police ... I recall that VC was in the flat at  
4 the time of the move but that he was asleep in his  
5 room." (As read)

6 Does that ring bells with you?

7 **A.** Yes, that's what I was talking about previously about  
8 taking each of us in one by one and to collect the  
9 things that we needed, so that's what that's referring  
10 to, yeah.

11 **Q.** He was there when that happened to support you?

12 **A.** So he -- I believe in my case he waited outside the  
13 door, but he said: "If anything happens, shout or  
14 whatever and I will come in." With that, that was the  
15 thing that I thought was strange because it very much  
16 felt like we were being secretive or -- and I wasn't  
17 sure that that was why would we be doing that? Why  
18 would we be sneaking around trying not to disturb him?  
19 I thought that was odd. That was the only event around  
20 that that I thought probably wasn't handled right.

21 **Q.** When you say "not handled right", did you wonder why you  
22 were moving out and he wasn't? He was waiting for  
23 something.

24 **A.** No, it was more why were we each going in one by one and  
25 kind of creeping around. It just didn't -- it felt like

32

1 we were in a dangerous situation and at the time we  
2 didn't know anything about his history, we didn't know  
3 anything that would happen in the future, but the  
4 protocol that he is referring to, it felt like there was  
5 danger and I thought, well, if you are acting like we  
6 are in danger and this is a risk, why are we doing it?  
7 Why can't someone else go in and get our things or why  
8 can't [VC] be removed and we go get our things and then  
9 he goes -- I didn't understand that.

10 **Q.** If we can have UNIN0001804, page 1. This is a note,  
11 Christopher, from Claire Thompson who is working with  
12 the Mental Health Advisory Service. She makes  
13 a telephone call to you, I think, on 17 January. This  
14 is the note:

15 "Telephone call to Chris."

16 Do you remember her phoning you?

17 **A.** I don't remember her specifically, but I remember  
18 speaking to various different people about it at the  
19 time.

20 **Q.** This note records:

21 "Happened Sat[urday] night, police attended and  
22 managed the situation.

23 "Accommodations are trying to find somewhere else  
24 for [them] at the moment.

25 "A few issues last night. More involved the other

1 **A.** I can't recall but we didn't get any financial  
2 assistance. That's all I can recall.  
3 **Q.** So Residential Experience was one route of you reporting  
4 this. We also see, if we can have please, UNIN0002240,  
5 page 3. This is an email that you have sent to -- you  
6 tell us the email address and what you were doing?  
7 **A.** I believe it stands for "support social sciences", so  
8 I was part of the business school which I think it fell  
9 under, and the social sciences department.  
10 **Q.** How did you know that email address? Did you know who  
11 was going to receive that?

20 to page 1. You do a reply, saying:  
21 "... sorry ... not getting back to you, your email  
22 [was] ... buried in my Inbox ... temporarily moved to  
23 another flat ..."  
24 She says:  
25 "Great, I'm so pleased you have been moved. I hope

1 flatmate.

2 "Been ongoing issue re cleaning."

3 Does that remind you of what the conversation was  
4 about?

5 **A.** Not particularly, but when they speak about other  
6 issues, I'm guessing that I must have informed her about  
7 the "shut the fuck up" and screaming and more aggressive  
8 behaviour. So I think that's probably what this refers  
9 to.

10 **Q.** Did she give you any information about him?

11 **A.** No.

12 **Q.** Nothing at all?

17 were health issues or mental health issues?

21 forwarding to the residential team. You say you have  
22 been temporarily moved; "no cooking utensils or food";  
23 "told not to enter"; "this is costly"; could you get  
24 "any financial assistance".

25 Did you get any response to that?

18 **A.** I think at that time I just saw it as the University  
19 broadly, maybe didn't differentiate between different  
20 departments.

21 **Q.** So you sent it to the department with which you were  
22 studying. You sent it to the Residential, and you also  
23 looked like you did a report through the  
24 Report + Support system?

25 **A.** Perhaps. I think they said they did that on my behalf

1 in the previous email but I --

2 **Q.** I see. So they did that. If we go to just for

3 completeness, UNIN0000362, if we go to page 2:

4 "Text from e mail from the student received this

5 morning: I was assaulted by a fellow student ..."

6 So that has been uploaded to this Report + Support

7 format.

8 **A.** Yes.

9 **Q.** But that was not something you were aware of, that

10 process, that you --

11 **A.** No.

12 **Q.** -- could report harassment, abuse, or upset via that.

13 You wouldn't have known that.

14 **A.** No.

15 **Q.** Can we just please go to UNIN0000157. You won't have

16 seen this at the time but if you could just look at it.

17 It is a Critical Incident Record of Claire Thompson's.

18 If we look in the bottom box. 18 January. Five

19 paragraphs down. Telephone call from Ellie, that's

20 Ellie Turner:

21 "She [has] spoke[n] to secondary services and it has

22 become clear that they have not shared key risk

23 information about [VC] ... who has needed further

24 hospital admissions and exhibited increasingly

25 aggressive behaviour and has stopped taking medication.

1 So you had reported that you had seen him. Was any

2 feedback given to you about the fact that he had come to

3 the accommodation or not?

21 no I wasn't completely surprised by that although

22 obviously it is a strange phone call to get. So no,

24 **Q.** Can you read -- you can read it to yourself, the

25 description of the conversation. Is that an accurate

3 arranged via Chris [you, obviously] to place the

5 assessment is complete."

6 Did you know that, that information at the time that

23 quiet room. He denied attending Raleigh Park and

3 **Q.** It says:

4 "Chris advised he 'started mouthing off' and said

5 something along the lines of 'I'll call you a dirty

6 bastard'. [VC] ...reportedly responded to this by

7 throwing a punch and wrestling ensued for a short

9 You explained:

10 "[VC]... was 'acting strangely' and refused to let

11 them leave the flat."

12 This is when you called the police. How did you

13 describe to the doctor the refusal to leave the flat?

14 **A.** I can't remember.

 16 latch so it is secure and should [VC] make a further  
 17 appearance, call the police immediately ..."  
 18 A. So I said I had only seen him once and that was true.  
 19 The previous incident, it must have been 5 April --  
 20 February, we -- a security guard had knocked on our door  
 21 and told us that he saw [VC] outside. I didn't see him  
 22 on that occasion.  
 23 Q. You just saw him the one time --  
 24 A. When he came in the flat and that must have been the  
 25 April incident based on this email. So the previous one

41

1 will be vigilant, we are here, we are security" as well?  
 2 A. I really appreciated the security guard doing that.  
 3 I believe his name was Jovi. I thought that he was very  
 4 good for that and I was thankful that he was there and  
 5 that he saw it because who knows what would have  
 6 happened if he wasn't.  
 7 Q. No more questions from me, Christopher, other than this.  
 8 Do you have any reflections? You have seen more  
 9 documents than perhaps you did at the time, any  
 10 reflections you would like to share with the Chair or  
 11 not?  
 12 A. Yes, I think we were put at a lot of risk and we weren't  
 13 given information that we really should have had. If  
 14 someone had been sectioned months prior, maybe we should  
 15 have been able to make an educated decision on whether  
 16 we wanted to live with him, but we weren't told that, we  
 17 weren't told anything. I got lucky and I'm fine. Maybe  
 18 I wouldn't have, but that's where we are and, yeah,  
 19 I just think we just weren't told and we should have  
 20 been.

**Questioned by THE CHAIR**

22 **THE CHAIR:** Yes, there is just one question I was going to  
 23 ask you, Christopher. Can we just go back to  
 24 NHFT0000168\_0228. This is when you are phoned by the  
 25 doctor. He doesn't record you anywhere in there

1 in February I hadn't seen him directly. We were told by  
 2 a security guard who knocked on the door that "that guy  
 3 who got kicked out your flat, I've just seen him down  
 4 there and you guys need to watch out, basically, and be  
 5 careful".  
 6 Q. Was that a university security guy who told you that?  
 7 A. I believe he worked for the accommodation not the  
 8 University, but I really don't know.  
 9 Q. Did he tell you how he was addressed or how he appeared  
 10 or anything like that?  
 11 A. He said he was hiding his face and he had a big coat on  
 12 and you can see what he -- yeah, he made it seem like it  
 13 was very ominous.  
 14 Q. You have used that word a couple of times now, is that  
 15 how it felt, ominous, what you were being told?  
 16 A. Yes, because I just didn't know anything. This person,  
 17 from what I was told, I knew that he was into  
 18 involuntary psychiatric care. Well, you don't know the  
 19 extent, you don't know if he's going to be more violent.  
 20 I just -- it felt like there was a lot of unknowns and  
 21 then when someone tells you "yes, he was trying to get  
 22 in the door, you guys need to be careful", it feels  
 23 pretty ominous. Yes.  
 24 Q. Did they tell you if they were being vigilant or trying  
 25 to take some of that off your shoulders by saying "we

1 referring to a headlock. Do you think you would have  
 2 told him that or not?  
 3 A. I think I would have told him that, yes.  
 4 Q. You have said that he refused to let you leave the flat,  
 5 and you explained that he was acting strangely. Do you

 9 A. Yes, I think I probably would have, but I can't say

 19 We would like if Ms Kaur could read into the record  
 20 the statement of one of the flatmates and then after the  
 21 break we will call two other students.  
 22 **THE CHAIR:** Yes, thank you.  
 23 **Witness Statement of Sam read by MS KAUR**  
 24 **MS KAUR:** The Nottingham Inquiry witness statement of Sam  
 25 who studied at the University of Nottingham between 2020

44

1 to 2025. Sam sets out the background.

2 "I have been asked to set out any interactions I had  
3 with VC as a student at the university and anything else  
4 that may assist the Inquiry. I met VC in my second year  
5 of my 5-year degree at the university when I was in  
6 private accommodation called Raleigh Park.

7 "I was friends with Chris and one other, and as we  
8 had left it too late to sort out our accommodation for  
9 the next academic year, we agreed between us that we  
10 would move into this private accommodation together.

11 "Our friend dropped out of this agreement, so it was  
12 just Chris and I that ended up moving in together at  
13 Raleigh Park. This accommodation was cheap and there  
14 was not much else available. You could apply off the  
15 website, and you were able to pick, to live in the flat  
16 together with other students you already knew.

17 "We found Raleigh Park on a private website, but it  
18 might have been affiliated or endorsed by the  
19 university. If we had any issues with the property we  
20 would go to the property rather than the university.

21 "There were times when the University was getting  
22 contacted about matters that happened at the  
23 accommodation and I assumed someone from the  
24 accommodation was contacting them, for example when the  
25 incident in January 2022 took place. We may have

45

1 "I think I first met VC a few days after he moved  
2 in. I got a message saying someone new had moved in.  
3 I can't remember the initial meeting with him.

4 "I know that us flatmates messaged each other, but  
5 I can't remember if it was individual messaging or on  
6 a group chat after we learned someone new was joining  
7 the flat.

8 "I cannot recall the specific moment I met VC  
9 because it wasn't really a thing or an event for me.  
10 All I know is it would have happened somewhere in the  
11 flat.

12 "VC was quiet. We would say hi to him but a lot of  
13 the time he wouldn't reply. I assumed he was doing his  
14 own thing. If he was in the kitchen cooking, he'd sit  
15 there and eat his food with us, but outside of that he  
16 wouldn't spend time with us.

17 "I was close with Chris and Ryan, but the other  
18 flatmates had their own thing going on. We were all on  
19 good terms though.

20 "We were surprised when VC moved in as the academic  
21 year had been going for a while and because he wasn't in  
22 the same age range as us. From Chris asking him, we  
23 knew he was 30 years old and the others ... were all  
24 around 19 years old.

25 "Nothing in particular stood out to me about VC's

47

1 contacted the university too but it's been a number of  
2 years so I cannot remember if we did.

3 "When reviewing property and being offered Raleigh  
4 Park, I do not remember if I was advised about the  
5 security on site or around the premises and nor can  
6 I recall if we had to sign guests in. We might have,  
7 I'm not sure and I can't remember. I do recall that  
8 there was security staff around the building but not  
9 inside the building.

10 "The flat was a non-smoking premises, but some  
11 flatmates may have smoked in their flats, but I wasn't  
12 involved in this. I never saw VC smoke weed and never  
13 smelt weed coming from his room.

14 "I only met VC when he moved into the flat.  
15 I assumed because my friend dropped out, there was now  
16 a spare place and that's why he moved in. We as a flat  
17 were not expecting anyone else joining because the  
18 academic year had already started.

19 "There might have been four of us at that point in  
20 the flat. Another flatmate also moved in later after  
21 the start date.

22 "The layout of our flat was once you came into the  
23 front door, the kitchen was on the left and then along  
24 a corridor there were doors to the bedrooms. There were  
25 two bathrooms, 6 bedrooms and a kitchen/dining area.

46

1 clothing. I think VC's voice was maybe a bit monotone,  
2 but we would not really have conversations, only brief  
3 encounters with him.

4 "Assault on 15 January 2022.

5 "I don't know if it was changes in VC's personality,  
6 but it was more that some of the flatmates were getting  
7 annoyed with the state VC was leaving the shower in. VC  
8 only changed in personality when Chris confronted him  
9 about the state the shower was left in, and it escalated  
10 quickly after that.

11 "One of the flatmates said to me to come and look at  
12 the shower and I was shocked at its state. Chris saw it  
13 too and knocked on VC's door and, in a nice way, told  
14 him that it was bad and he needed to clean it.

15 "VC responded being funny with Chris, saying  
16 something like 'I'm not going to do it, you can clean it  
17 for me.' A few hours later we were in the living room  
18 playing Playstation. In the room with me were Chris and  
19 Ryan. VC had been to the shops and come back. His  
20 shared fridge was in the corner of the kitchen living  
21 area where we were playing so he had to come over, and  
22 that's when Chris confronted him.

23 "Chris was sat down and asked about the shower. VC  
24 responded in a bit of a confrontational way by saying  
25 'you can do it'. Then Chris called him 'a dirty

48

1 bastard'. VC took his jacket off, squared up to Chris  
2 and said 'say it again'. Chris said it again and VC  
3 came at Chris.

4 "Chris was sat on the sofa and VC tried to punch  
5 Chris while he was on the sofa and then through the  
6 motion ended up sitting onto Chris. At first, we were  
7 trying to get VC off Chris, but we couldn't get him off.  
8 Then Chris was in a headlock but could still speak, and  
9 we were all trying to reason with VC to let go of him.

10 "Chris told me to start filming and I did this on my  
11 iPhone. This is the footage already in the media. I no  
12 longer possess this footage and provided a copy at the  
13 time to Chris. We thought if we could [help] get it on  
14 camera we could show it to the police. I don't know who  
15 called the police.

16 "I don't think I could accurately say how long Chris  
17 was in a headlock for, but it was for more than  
18 a minute. When VC realised that Chris was not fighting  
19 back and that he was on camera, he eventually let go of  
20 Chris.

21 "I can't remember all of it that well, but I do know  
22 that when VC came off of Chris it was tense. We didn't  
23 know if VC would carry on with the assault. I left the  
24 building shortly after that. VC was in the kitchen and  
25 I wanted to leave. I went to my friend's house.

49

1 "Around 18 January ... someone called Chris from the  
2 residential team from the university, which was called  
3 ResX, contacted us. This was the first time I had heard  
4 from this organisation.

5 "I think they might have knocked on the door,  
6 I can't remember. It was in the morning and we were  
7 told to go to a bench on the premises but outside of the  
8 flat and speak to someone from the university. They  
9 told us there that VC needed sectioning, and we needed  
10 to move out of the flat.

11 "I think we were told to take minimal items with us,  
12 as we were initially told it was just going to be for  
13 a day and that we would be moved into an empty flat on  
14 the Raleigh Park premises.

15 "I can't remember if we were told to go into the  
16 flat one by one to remove our items so VC would not  
17 know, but the ResX university person came with us. The  
18 issue was that they did not want VC to know that  
19 something was going on.

20 "I can't remember getting my stuff, but we moved  
21 into the spare flat on a different block. We must have  
22 been there for a few nights. I had only packed minimal  
23 items which made things difficult for me to stay for  
24 that length of time.

25 "The days we were kept at this spare flat kept

1 I wasn't there when the police showed up.

2 "The police did not speak to me after the assault.  
3 The only time the police spoke with me was recently to  
4 take a statement after the June 2023 attack.

5 "On the night of 15 January, I can't remember when  
6 I came back to the flat. It would have been ... later  
7 that night or in the morning. I went to stay with  
8 a close friend, and I used to stay over there often.

9 "I cannot recall getting a text telling me that VC  
10 was still living there after this assault, but I do  
11 remember that someone told me that VC was told not to  
12 interact with us.

13 "Incident on 16 January 2022.

14 "The day after ... there was an incident with Ryan.  
15 I came out of the bathroom and saw VC confronting Ryan  
16 about the bathroom light. VC said the fan kept him  
17 awake. VC was confrontational.

18 "Incident on 17 January ...

19 "On 17 January, VC stormed into the lounge and told  
20 us to 'shut the fuck up'. We were playing PS4 at the  
21 time. Considering Chris was told by the police that if  
22 they get another call from us about VC, VC could be in  
23 trouble with them and with VC knowing that we could call  
24 the police this seemed irrational behaviour from him.

25 "Move on 18 January ...

50

1 getting extended. We were told that this was because  
2 there was an issue with a lack of availability of beds  
3 in the hospital that VC needed to go to, so he could not  
4 be moved and so he had to remain in the flat.

5 "When we were finally told that we could return to  
6 the flat, I went back as I had taken so little with me.  
7 I remember Chris stayed in the temporary flat for  
8 longer.

9 "We were told that VC had been sectioned and that if  
10 he came back to get his stuff, he would be escorted out.  
11 But VC did come back.

12 "I lived in the bedroom next to VCs in the flat.  
13 I knew that he had been sectioned but I could hear him  
14 in his room the day after he had been sectioned. I knew  
15 it was VC even though I couldn't see him as I was used  
16 to the noises he made that came from his room, that you  
17 could hear through the walls. There was no one else in  
18 the flat bar me.

19 "I spoke to Chris from ResX about this and he  
20 apologised and said that he had been told VC wasn't  
21 allowed to come back to the flat. They said they were  
22 embarrassed.

23 "There was no way to feel comfortable with VC in the  
24 flat now. We had assumed that straight after ... 15  
25 [of] January assault that he would have been arrested or

52

1 taken away, so we were shocked that he was still allowed  
2 to live with us and stay in the flat that same night.  
3 How were we supposed to live in the same flat as him?  
4 We were told by ResX that VC could not be removed on the  
5 spot.

6 "I can't recall sending a statement to the  
7 university about a request that VC be moved from the  
8 flat. The university did reach out to me after the 15  
9 [of] January assault but a good couple of days after it.

10 "Call from VC's psychiatrist.

11 "A few days after the assault with Chris and VC's  
12 sectioning, VC's psychiatrist called me. They asked me  
13 if I had seen VC and how he was acting. I was woken up  
14 by the phone call.

15 "I'm not sure who gave the psychiatrist my phone  
16 number, but I'm assuming it was Raleigh Park. I never  
17 really gave my number out. I didn't really know what  
18 was going on as I had literally just woken up, but  
19 I think he was asking me what VC was like. I was too  
20 out of it to understand. I didn't hear of anyone else  
21 in the flat getting a call from VC's psychiatrist.

22 "Incident on 21 April 2022.

23 "On 21 April, just Chris and I were in the flat. We  
24 had forgotten about VC by this stage as he was not at  
25 the forefront of our minds. Chris and I were in the

53

1 I can't remember if anything came of it. The security  
2 guard said he was going to speak to his boss, but  
3 I can't remember seeing him again.

4 "I never heard anything or saw VC again from that  
5 point.

6 "I don't recall receiving any messages from the  
7 university pre-VC joining us or after this incident to  
8 advise us or forewarn us that VC had mental health or  
9 vulnerability issues.

10 "During the January assault VC wasn't softly spoken  
11 as he usually was, nor was he softly spoken when he was  
12 looking for the letters on 21 April. VC was  
13 confrontational when Chris asked him not to come into  
14 the flat after he used the toilet.

15 "Before January, there was never a reason for VC to  
16 be confrontational, as we didn't speak to him. So, it  
17 is hard to make a judgment about his character.

18 I didn't really notice changes -- the bathroom was  
19 always being left in a state anyway. VC's demeanour  
20 only changed when Chris said something to him.

21 "I never did see VC out and about and never heard  
22 anything from others about him.

23 "I did not know whether VC was prescribed and/or  
24 taking medication for any reason and I did not hear any  
25 other accounts or reports about VC while I was

55

1 kitchen and VC just walked in. We were shocked.

2 "Ryan used to leave the door on the latch, but the  
3 block entrance door would have been locked as you needed  
4 swipe security card to gain entry, so VC must have  
5 waited around until someone let him in.

6 "He said that he wanted his letters, and we said we  
7 didn't have them. He was walking around the kitchen  
8 looking for his letters. Then he walked into the  
9 corridor and went and used one of the toilets. Chris  
10 said, 'you don't live here anymore, you can't use the  
11 bathroom' and VC said something like 'you just need to  
12 chill out'.

13 "Then I think Chris called the university or the  
14 ResX and told them that VC had come back. I'm not sure  
15 what they said to Chris.

16 "A few hours later, it was dark by this point, we  
17 could hear slamming on the door, and it was a security  
18 guard saying that they had found VC walking on the  
19 premises with most of his face covered. The security  
20 guard recognised VC and asked him what he was doing,  
21 then followed him. The security guard saw him trying to  
22 get into the flat. The security guard mentioned that he  
23 might have a weapon. We suggested calling the police,  
24 but the security said that he would speak to his boss.

25 "I was worried thinking what if he came back.

54

1 a student.

2 "I was not aware or made aware of any interactions  
3 which VC had with the University of Nottingham's  
4 security team, mental health or support team, NHS mental  
5 health services or the police. I had limited  
6 interactions with these organisations myself.

7 "In relation to the effectiveness of these bodies,  
8 the thing that concerned me and Chris was that we were  
9 told that VC was more of a risk to himself than others.  
10 I didn't agree with this given that he had already  
11 attacked Chris. This messaging was coming from ResX.

12 "I spoke to my family about what had happened, and  
13 everyone was shocked that he was still in the flat.  
14 I can't remember if I showed them the footage of the  
15 attack.

16 "Nottingham attacks.

17 "When the Nottingham attacks happened, based on the  
18 description on the news, I thought it fit the  
19 description of VC. I saw the blurry CCTV footage, and  
20 someone posted in the group chat saying, 'is this not  
21 the guy we lived with?'.

22 "I think the next day I got a phone call from a no  
23 caller ID number, and it was police asking if I would  
24 speak to them. They said they were outside. They came  
25 inside and questioned me but wouldn't say why. When

56

1 I mentioned VC, they said they could not say. They said  
2 they just wanted to know about my previous flatmate and  
3 previous living arrangements. Not long after, another  
4 policeman came and took a statement from me in my house.

5 "I felt shocked when I found out about the attacks,  
6 in some ways it didn't feel real at first. It's the  
7 kind of event you see on the news; it's not something  
8 you ever expect to be close to.

9 "I cannot remember if the University reached out to  
10 me then. I was annoyed at the whole situation, rather  
11 than anyone in particular.

12 "I've now watched the documentaries. We weren't  
13 aware of his medical history before VC moved into the  
14 flat. The whole picture looks a lot different to what  
15 we knew at that time.

16 "I don't think VC should have been moved into a flat  
17 with us who didn't know his situation and were not aware  
18 of his history."

24 boys who were already there. I was probably the oldest,  
25 about 22. And he was a lot older. He was probably

4 **THOMAS (affirmed)**

5 **THE CHAIR:** Thank you. Sit down, please. Yes,  
6 Miss Langdale.

**Questioned by MS LANGDALE**

8 **MS LANGDALE:** Thomas, you provided the Inquiry a statement  
9 dated 12 November 2025.

10 **A.** Yes.

11 **Q.** Can you confirm the contents are true and accurate as  
12 far as you are concerned?

13 **A.** I can confirm.

14 **Q.** You have a statement with you, a copy with you?

15 **A.** Yes.

16 **Q.** Can I start with you, please, around paragraph 5. You  
17 were in your third year and you were looking for  
18 accommodation and you opt for Raleigh Park. Can you  
19 tell us about how you chose that accommodation, what you  
20 expected from it?

21 **A.** Yes, so in my second year of -- at the end of the first  
22 year of my university experience, Covid happened.  
23 Second year was mostly lockdown. So there was a lot of  
24 learning online. Third year, which was Raleigh Park,  
25 I wanted a kind of a university experience again, in

58

1 towards like late 20s, maybe early 30s. Initial  
2 interactions, you could get a conversation out of him.  
3 He seemed approachable. So I managed to -- there were  
4 times in the kitchen where I would be there kind of  
5 cooking or doing what not, and he was doing there so  
6 I would obviously just have a chit chat and get to find  
7 out a little bit more about him, but initially nothing  
8 out of the ordinary.

9 **Q.** Did you eat together at a table as a group, or did you  
10 do your own thing?

11 **A.** Not really. I mostly ate in my room as I was still  
12 studying. There was a kitchen, a dining room table in  
13 the kitchen that some boys would eat at, but as far as  
14 I'm aware I'm not sure that we would all eat together at  
15 the same time.

16 **Q.** What about the bathroom situation? Were there a couple  
17 of bathrooms in the flat for six people?

18 **A.** Yes. There were two bathrooms. So once we were all six  
19 of us there we kind of split it between three and three,  
20 just on the locations of the room and what's kind of  
21 closest in proximity, so -- whatever.

22 **Q.** Were you sharing the one with VC or not?

23 **A.** No, I wasn't. I was sharing with Abdullah and Sam  
24 because we were at the end of the flat.

25 **Q.** You used to go to swim training which is quite intense

60

1 and frequent, presumably?

2 **A.** Yes, I did. In and amongst around my studies

3 I would try to go because first year I didn't really do

4 it, second year it wasn't available. So third year,

5 I wanted to try and get that feeling. So yes, I was

6 kind of in and out quite a lot.

7 **Q.** That was your first impression. You say that by

8 December, so three months on, "it wasn't a great

9 environment to live in".

10 **A.** Yes, I think we started to see some unusual activities

11 or interactions with him. I noted kind of a sense of

12 paranoia in one of the situations. I heard knocking in

13 the evening. I think some boys reported some other

14 things going on as well. So it was kind of slowly

15 changing in the atmosphere.

16 **Q.** When you say "paranoia", you give an example at

17 paragraph 16 of your statement of something that

18 happened. Can you tell us about that?

19 **A.** Yes, so I think this was when he moved in, in a lot of

20 these kind of university halls we have like a big kind

21 of bulletin board where he can post whatever you want,

22 pinpoint it up and there is some stuff that's already on

23 there like contact details for emergency, et cetera.

24 **Q.** In the bedroom?

25 **A.** Yes, in each individual bedroom. Each individual

1 that his music is too loud kind of thing.

2 **Q.** Did he play loud music?

3 **A.** I don't know, the thing is I was in and out and I also

4 had a partner at the time as well, so I tried to stay

5 away as much as possible. But we noticed some unusual

6 things and we shared it amongst ourselves to keep each

7 other up to date and also to see if they kind of

8 experienced similar things as well.

9 **Q.** Any other examples that you were aware of, apart from

10 hearing loud music or thinking someone may have gone

11 into the room?

12 **A.** Not that I'm aware of, I'm not sure what the other boys

13 have said about the situation, but as far as I'm aware,

14 I've got my personal encounter and basically knocking on

15 the doors in the evenings.

16 **Q.** You make the point that as far as you are aware you

17 didn't ever smell cannabis or thought whether he did

18 drugs, you weren't concerned about that?

19 **A.** No.

20 **Q.** Were you at the time worried about whether he was

21 delusional about things? You used the word "paranoid",

22 what was it?

23 **A.** I don't know, there was something off with his character

24 in a way which seemed a little bit unusual. I think it

25 was when he approached me about the situation that

63

1 bedroom would have the same thing and you can put

2 whatever you want up to customise it however you wanted

3 to. But when you move in the accommodation puts some

4 stuff on there already. I think he didn't really notice

5 it before so he kind of had the feeling that someone had

6 gone into his room to put it on or like around his

7 bedroom so I kind of showed him like -- I tried to

8 explain to him, like, these are in all the bedrooms, no

9 one has gone in, kind of thing. Showed him, you know,

10 that I have it in my room as well to put him more at

13 concern, that one had been into his room or done that?

14 **A.** Yes. I think so. The fact that someone has gone into

15 his room and kind of gone in, but there might have been

16 some other things that he was kind of paranoid about.

17 **Q.** You say at paragraph 19, when you were in the flat

18 together you discussed the things that he had done:

19 "We weren't trying to oust him but we found it weird

20 and unusual and we did not really want him as a house

21 mate with this kind of behaviour".

22 Was that discussed between you?

23 **A.** It was kind of in passing when we were there and it was

24 just things happening during the night. Sam mentioned

25 that he would knock on his door in the evening to say

62

1 I mentioned earlier.

2 **Q.** The leaflets?

3 **A.** Yeah, yeah. It didn't sit right with me, it was kind of

4 not really a typical thing that you would kind of bring

5 up in a way, and I could see how his behaviour was, it

6 was different to what I had seen of him previously as in

7 it's just like -- it felt like a state of paranoia that

8 he was experiencing. But, yes, I think we could -- we

9 started to notice kind of a change in behaviour.

10 **Q.** Was that anything you felt able to raise with the

11 University as a group, whether via their mental health

12 services or support services or anything like that at

13 the time?

14 **A.** I wasn't too sure. I wasn't convinced that he was

15 paranoid. Obviously it is just a single event that he

16 displayed. Whether me kind of saying if he has

17 something going on, I wouldn't know. But that's what we

18 kind of -- we just spoke about those individual

19 situations --

20 **Q.** Unusual things --

21 **A.** Yes.

22 **Q.** January 2022, we have just heard from your former

23 flatmate about that. You weren't in on 15 January --

24 **A.** No.

25 **Q.** -- and didn't witness any of that. You say you were

1 shown the footage. Who showed you that? Near to the  
 2 time did they show you that footage?  
 3 **A.** I think one of the boys might have shown me it, but  
 4 I have also seen it from this Inquiry as well.  
 5 **Q.** What was your reaction to that when you saw it at the

1 there was a joint statement signed or from flatmates to  
 2 the University about the incident on the 15th and how  
 3 the flatmates felt about VC being in the flat and the  
 4 disregard for them. You signed up to that. Did you  
 5 agree with that, that there was disregard for the  
 6 flatmates and concern about that?  
 7 **A.** Yes, I believe, if I'm right in my thinking, that this  
 8 was in order to kind of get him out of our flat and  
 9 trying to create a better atmosphere.  
 10 **Q.** Shall we put it on the screen so you can see it?

 12 **Q.** It is UNIN0001788. So this is the document.

 14 **Q.** Do you recognise this document --  
 15 **A.** Only since the Inquiry. At the time I didn't see this,  
 16 but there was talk in the chat of creating a letter to  
 17 kind of give it to the accommodation to help.  
 18 **Q.** You were fine with that?  
 19 **A.** I was fine. I trusted what they were going to write.  
 20 **Q.** You have read it and you are fine with what's written  
 21 there?  
 22 **A.** Yes, now, but I didn't read it at the time when I signed  
 23 it because I wasn't in a lot and it mostly concerned the  
 24 other boys who stayed there more often and if they  
 25 needed me to sign it as well in order to help their case

67

1 **A.** I wasn't too sure what to make of it because I could see  
 2 one of the other boys going in and around VC, so he was  
 3 letting him pass, but he wasn't letting Chris pass,  
 4 which seems like it was just targeted towards Chris who  
 5 mainly was the person who was kind of driving getting VC  
 6 out of the accommodation because it wasn't a great  
 7 atmosphere to be in and it was kind of causing a lot of  
 8 concern for us where we are at university, we kind of  
 9 need to be focusing on exams, et cetera, and life stuff.  
 10 Obviously people want to go home to a nice place where  
 11 we feel comfortable.  
 12 **Q.** You say at paragraph 28:  
 13 "We didn't feel like we would and should have to  
 14 clean up after him."  
 15 So the shower issue was becoming a real issue, or  
 16 was a real issue?  
 17 **A.** For the other boys yes. We -- me, Sam and Abdullah were  
 18 using kind of the bathroom which was clean. But yeah,  
 19 he left it in quite a state, but with Uni accommodation,  
 20 you know, I didn't really know what to make of it.  
 21 Sometimes you have that housemate who just leaves dirty  
 22 pots, kind of thing. I thought it might have been along  
 23 those lines. But yeah, it was messy and it was quite  
 24 frequent as well.  
 25 **Q.** We know -- we have had it up on the screen before --

66

1 then I trusted them.  
 2 **Q.** In terms of moving out from the property, leaving the  
 3 flat, can you remember much now about how you were asked  
 4 and when you were asked to take your belongings and  
 5 leave the flat?  
 6 **A.** Yes, it is kind of a bit disjointed from what  
 7 I remember, but there was an external person called  
 8 Chris or someone from this --  
 9 **Q.** From ResX?  
 10 **A.** ResX. He kind of got us all together, told us about the  
 11 situation of [VC] and that he is unwell and for the  
 12 foreseeable future we had to move to a temporary  
 13 accommodation still in Raleigh Park just for our own  
 14 safety and also his safety from how he described the  
 15 situation. So it was the case of we had to take as much  
 16 as we could in that situation and then relocate almost  
 17 immediately, and yeah.  
 18 **Q.** You say "... a third party was there to keep us safe  
 19 ..." when you got the stuff, you say that at  
 20 paragraph 35.  
 21 **A.** Yes.  
 22 **Q.** What did you think you had to be kept safe from?  
 23 **A.** They kind of -- I think this was after the fact of the  
 24 headlock and so they kind of made out that VC was  
 25 a dangerous individual to be with. So, when we moved

68

1 out, I think he was there to help us and to kind of ship  
2 us to the new accommodation, but we only picked up a few  
3 things. So, later on, either that same evening or  
4 another day, we were allowed back to pick up some more  
5 things to kind of stay at the temporary accommodation  
6 more permanently.

7 **Q.** Did you feel in the picture about what was going on in  
8 that period?

9 **A.** Not really. The guy from ResX tried to help piece it  
10 a little bit more for us in a way that we learned that  
11 he was on medication and he hadn't been taking it.

12 **Q.** From him --

13 **A.** From the ResX. And that there was a situation where he  
14 needed to get assessed kind of for his own -- he, as in  
15 VC, needs to get assessed in order to work out what's  
16 going on. I think from that, learning about his  
17 medication, it kind of pieced some pieces together for  
18 us for the behaviour that we were seeing. But, yes.

19 **Q.** You say you can't remember what day he left, but there  
20 was a time when he was gone and the University man said  
21 you shouldn't have to worry anymore?

22 **A.** Yes.

23 **Q.** And they did not replace VC, so there were five of you  
24 thereafter. Was that the same ResX person who said that  
25 to you, the University man, or was that someone else?

69

1 **Q.** Yes.

2 **A.** I can't remember what time of day it was, but I was in  
3 kind of the same aisle, I looked further down and I saw  
4 him, or someone who looked very similar to him, and I  
5 was a bit confused because it had been a good couple of  
6 months since he got moved out and from my knowledge it  
7 was kind of like he's still in the area. Yeah, I might  
8 have told the boys that I saw him, but nothing more  
9 after that.

10 **Q.** When you saw him was there anything unusual about it,  
11 did you say hello to each other or you didn't  
12 acknowledge each other?

13 **A.** No, I didn't talk to him. I think after -- there was  
14 a long time where I didn't really say much to him.  
15 Probably from kind of January onwards and just kind of  
16 kept to myself. But no, I didn't say anything to him  
17 and, I don't know, he was just shopping, it looked like,  
18 so there wasn't really too much to say.

19 **Q.** Yes, thank you. You have obviously read more from the  
20 documents that have been sent since your time there.

21 Finally, do you have any reflections to offer, or to  
22 say to the Chair about what happened or your time there  
23 or, if you have set it out, how do you set it out?

24 **A.** Nothing more from what I have kind of said in my witness  
25 statement so far.

71

1 **A.** I believe it's the same one. I don't think he contacted  
2 me directly because Chris was the main kind of source of  
3 the contact, but as far as I'm aware, but yes, it was  
4 kind of we had someone externally tell us that whilst we  
5 are in this temporary accommodation we can kind of start  
6 to move back to our main residence.

7 **Q.** You say you started getting a lot of post for VC when he  
8 wasn't there?

9 **A.** Yes.

10 **Q.** It kept coming and the boys started to put it in the  
11 bin.

12 **A.** Yes, which paragraph is this?

13 **Q.** Paragraph 39.

14 **A.** Okay, perfect.

15 **Q.** Were you there in April when he came back and went into  
16 the accommodation looking for bank statements or not?

17 **A.** I can't remember. I'm not sure.

18 **Q.** Do you think you saw him again after he had left the  
19 accommodation or don't you know?

20 **A.** I did, yes. I said that I saw him in the supermarket in  
21 paragraph 42.

22 **Q.** Tell us about that.

23 **A.** This is a local supermarket near Raleigh Park. It is  
24 just -- I don't know if you know Nottingham or the map  
25 of it, but it is literally just a Lidl across the road.

70

1 **Q.** Thank you, Thomas, I have no further questions. Chair?

2 **THE CHAIR:** I have no further questions. Thank you very  
3 much. You are free to go.

4 **A.** Thank you.

5 **THE CHAIR:** Yes, Ms Langdale.

6 **MS LANGDALE:** May I call Joel, the last witness, please.

7 **THE CHAIR:** Yes, thank you. I understand the witness is on  
8 his way. (Pause)

9 **JOEL (affirmed)**

10 **Questioned by MS LANGDALE**

11 **THE CHAIR:** Thank you, do sit down. Yes, Ms Langdale.

12 **MS LANGDALE:** Joel, you have prepared a statement for the  
13 Inquiry dated 21 September 2025.

14 **A.** Yes.

15 **Q.** Can you confirm the contents are true and accurate as  
16 far as you are concerned?

17 **A.** Yes.

18 **Q.** Do you have a copy of it with you?

19 **A.** Yes.

20 **Q.** You set out you were completing a Masters degree in  
21 mechanical engineering at the University of Nottingham  
22 between 2017 and 2021?

23 **A.** Yes.

24 **Q.** You tell us it was in your third year of your degree  
25 that you had to complete a group design project. Was

72

1 that an important component of your degree?  
 2 **A.** Yes, it was, I think, a 25% of the year mark, something  
 3 around that region.  
 4 **Q.** You say here, I think, 20-something per cent, so  
 5 a significant piece of work. You were in a group of  
 6 three, I think, or four originally; is that right? How  
 7 was it that you were allocated --  
 8 **A.** Yes, we were originally a group of four, me and three of  
 9 my friends from the previous years of the course were  
 10 together and then VC was added to the group when we were  
 11 setting up the project.  
 12 **Q.** Who added him to the group and why was he added to your  
 13 group?  
 14 **A.** I believe it was his personal tutor and it was because  
 15 the groups were planned to be groups of five and because  
 16 we had been spotted to be a group of four, they spotted  
 17 an opportunity to add VC to the group.  
 18 **Q.** I think you say there is about 300 people on the course?  
 19 **A.** Yes.  
 20 **Q.** Was it the case that people tended to settle in their  
 21 own groups in the course --  
 22 **A.** Yes, I think within the first few months of the course,  
 23 people generally sort of gravitated to their own  
 24 friendship groups or people that they lived around or  
 25 near in, like, student accommodation.

73

1 we had a Facebook Messenger group chat like before the  
 2 project was started because we were sort of a core  
 3 friendship group. And after VC was added to the group,  
 4 we would generally talk to him through emails on the  
 5 University email system because he didn't, like, either  
 6 have Facebook or want to be added to the group.  
 7 **Q.** But you invited him on if he wanted to, did you?  
 8 **A.** Yes.  
 9 **Q.** Did you have that discussion?  
 10 **A.** Yes.  
 11 **Q.** But he didn't want that mode of group communication, but  
 12 he had emails so you could communicate?  
 13 **A.** Yes.  
 14 **Q.** You say you were supposed to meet in person at least  
 15 once every week; did you do that as a group?  
 16 **A.** Yes, so that was with our supervisor of the project, so  
 17 that was -- I think Ben Rothwell was his name.  
 18 **Q.** Did VC always come to those meetings?  
 19 **A.** Yes, he would be present in those.  
 20 **Q.** What was his participation like in those meetings?  
 21 **A.** Generally quite quiet and reserved. Never really raised  
 22 any issues or responded to issues that were raised  
 23 during the meeting. It was just sort of he would take  
 24 the notes that were relevant to him and take them away  
 25 and do them himself, but never really spoke too much in

75

1 **Q.** It is for the tutors to make sure that everybody is in  
 2 a group, effectively?  
 3 **A.** Yes.  
 4 **Q.** We are talking about academic year 2019 to 2020, aren't  
 5 we, here?  
 6 **A.** Yes.  
 7 **Q.** So when VC was added to your group, had you seen him in  
 8 the labs or in the University very much or was that your  
 9 first introduction?  
 10 **A.** So I had seen him in some of the lectures when we shared  
 11 modules in the previous years and seen him in a few of  
 12 the compulsory labs within those modules, but I'd never  
 13 really interacted with him too much before the project  
 14 was started.  
 15 **Q.** What was the project? What was the aim of it?  
 16 **A.** The aim of it was to provide a drone, like a manned  
 17 drone, for the aerospace department for a test platform  
 18 so that they could release objects that they required  
 19 testing to test the flight path of, like, from a height  
 20 using the drone that we would design.  
 21 **Q.** Understood. Now, there were four of you -- five of you  
 22 in total in the group. Did you have a way of  
 23 communicating in a group, set up a chat or anything like  
 24 that?  
 25 **A.** So myself and the three original members of the group,

74

1 those meetings.  
 2 **Q.** But was following what was going on and when tasks were  
 3 allocated?  
 4 **A.** Yes. So he would, like, individually go off and do his  
 5 tasks, but we would sometimes have to chase it up with  
 6 the work he was assigned and it would sometimes take him  
 7 a while to respond to us, which might be a bit  
 8 concerning with the timescales of the project.  
 9 **Q.** You say at paragraph 17:  
 10 "We tried to gee [VC] up and get the energy going  
 11 but he wasn't receptive to [that]."  
 12 What did you mean by that?  
 13 **A.** We just tried to get him a bit more involved in the  
 14 group. Sort of try to provide a bit more input into the  
 15 meetings or when we were like going through different  
 16 designs, just trying to get his thoughts on things, but  
 17 yeah, we never really seem to like up his energy or  
 18 interest in the project much by us trying to include him  
 19 in the conversations.  
 20 **Q.** You say he gave the impression he was quite indifferent  
 21 to how the project was progressing and just wanted to  
 22 know what work he had to carry out.  
 23 **A.** Yes. So he would -- he never really seemed too, like,  
 24 fussed about the marks we were going to be given or the  
 25 marks we would get back when the work was reviewed and

76

1 he would only ever really be interested in the bits he  
 2 was doing, whereas other members of the group would,  
 3 like, ask how everyone else was getting on and see if  
 4 they needed any help on the bits that they were working  
 5 on. But we never really got that from VC.  
 6 **Q.** You do say though:  
 7 "We never got to a conflict over the work because  
 8 [VC] would always pull through."  
 9 Do you mean pull through with his bit?  
 10 **A.** Yes, so it would be completed by the time that we needed  
 11 to submit the work.  
 12 **Q.** You say "the four of us would review VC's work" between  
 13 you and add a few bits of detail. How did that work?  
 14 Did you discuss that with him and what was going on?  
 15 **A.** That was mostly because we were getting a lack of  
 16 communications from him in terms of the work he was  
 17 doing, and we would sometimes get reviews that his bit  
 18 of the work was a bit below the standard that we were  
 19 wanting to achieve. So just as the four of us, we would  
 20 just go over anything that he had sent to us via email  
 21 just to double check any sort of calculations or  
 22 drawings that he would produce just to make sure that,  
 23 like, we would cast our eyes over it and agree --  
 24 **Q.** Would he know you were doing that, that was part of the  
 25 discussion?

77

1 drone so that it would fly correctly and as we intended.  
 2 When we said that the person that would programme,  
 3 like, wouldn't have to go in person and manufacture, VC  
 4 was quite quick to accept doing the programming. So  
 5 that just gave me the insight that he was maybe a bit  
 6 more happy to be isolated from the rest of us.  
 7 **Q.** Did you ever see him with anyone else in university or  
 8 see him around?  
 9 **A.** Never really too much, it was just in lectures, I never  
 10 saw him outside of university.  
 11 **Q.** Did you go on nights out at university, did you ever see  
 12 him around and about?  
 13 **A.** I never saw him on a night out, no.  
 14 **Q.** Did you appreciate he was a little bit older than you,  
 15 or not?  
 16 **A.** Yes, I had, like, assumed he was a bit older, but we  
 17 never actually discussed his age.  
 18 **Q.** What about in the labs and around the University, did  
 19 you see him discussing things with other people aside  
 20 from you --  
 21 **A.** It was mostly just when it was needed, so in the labs  
 22 when you would have to be working in, like, set teams  
 23 that you were assigned, he would communicate within his  
 24 teams, but after that he was very much just back  
 25 isolated, like walking back to wherever he needed to go

79

1 **A.** No.  
 2 **Q.** You say at paragraph 24 you did a lot of the drafting of  
 3 the report between the four of you and you let VC  
 4 continue on the stuff he had already been working on,  
 5 and he didn't usually join Teams calls between you, but  
 6 he did come to the ones every week, did he, the one with  
 7 the tutor?  
 8 **A.** Yes, so he would be in the in-person ones.  
 9 **Q.** Do you know if he liked doing the remote learning over  
 10 Teams or if that was an issue for him?  
 11 **A.** I'd never discussed that with him.  
 12 **Q.** You say he gave you the impression that he was quite  
 13 happy to remain more isolated from the group; could you  
 14 just expand upon that?  
 15 **A.** Yes, so he was just, again, like, the lack of  
 16 communication with the rest of the group and in  
 17 particular the thing that gave me the most insight on  
 18 that was that as a group we were discussing the four of  
 19 us needed to -- this was before the Covid lockdown -- we  
 20 were supposed to build the drone ourselves and, like,  
 21 manufacture it in the University labs. When we were  
 22 discussing that as a group, we said that four of us  
 23 would go in to manufacture it and because of the  
 24 requirements of the drone we needed also someone to  
 25 programme the, like -- just the electronics within the

78

1 sort of on his own.  
 2 **Q.** Did you ever notice any signs of mental health problems?  
 3 **A.** Nothing was evident to me from the times I interacted  
 4 with him, no.  
 5 **Q.** Any aggressiveness or unusual behaviour?  
 6 **A.** No, he was always quite laid back in terms of our  
 7 interactions.  
 8 **Q.** You say in terms of:  
 9 "I don't think I ever felt intimidated by him,  
 10 I just trusted him less with the work ..."  
 11 **A.** Yes, that was just because from, like, the reviews we  
 12 would get back, just like a few of the comments would be  
 13 based around his work or some lacking detail in his  
 14 work, so that was the reasoning behind that.  
 15 **Q.** You have seen -- we have seen various documents relating  
 16 to the group project and your supervisor setting you all  
 17 up. Can we just go to a couple of documents. One,  
 18 please, is UNIN0000209, it is an email from VC,  
 19 presumably, to the group.  
 20 This is dated 25 November. You said you could  
 21 communicate through emails, how many times would you get  
 22 an email?  
 23 **A.** Not very regularly. It was mostly just whenever he  
 24 finished his work. That's when we would get an update.  
 25 **Q.** So that's an email setting out his views on the aspect

80

1 of the work he was doing. Was that something that was  
 2 received with confidence? Was that clear to you?  
 3 **A.** So, from what I can remember regarding this bit of work,  
 4 he had sort of made a change to what we had agreed  
 5 within the group because where we are referring to there  
 6 the 3.5kg mass of the components, I believe, as a group,  
 7 we had agreed that we had changed the requirements to be  
 8 5kg, but it seems that he was set on just doing the  
 9 calculations for 3.5 even though we had previously  
 10 agreed a change in that.  
 11 **Q.** Was there a reason for that, the preference for the 3.5?  
 12 **A.** I'm not sure. I think it was just -- it was better if  
 13 we could meet that requirement, but as a group we'd sort  
 14 of decided it would be quite a restriction on the design  
 15 that we wanted to go for, so we had agreed it with the  
 16 supervisor to increase that weight threshold, the  
 17 calculations that VC did, he just took it on his own  
 18 initiative to change that back to the old requirement  
 19 that was set.  
 20 **Q.** Did you have to change it back again? Did he have to  
 21 change it back to the 5 or did you stick with it --  
 22 **A.** So we didn't have time before the review. So we had  
 23 an initial design review in person. So we didn't have  
 24 time to change it before then. So it was down to VC to  
 25 then talk through those calculations in person to make

81

1 the work that he needed to do. So it was always on  
 2 time. We might need to add a bit to it, which is why  
 3 the score was probably a bit sort of in the middle of  
 4 there because we didn't, like, completely trust the  
 5 work.  
 6 **Q.** We see UNIN0001504, page 1. Another one of these. The  
 7 same ranking. I think the same on another one which  
 8 I do not need to take you to. So your comment that he  
 9 seemed to pull through was what you were assessing him  
 10 as a peer at the time as a group by the looks of that?  
 11 **A.** Yes, so it was just a measure of how they helped the  
 12 project get through to completion and how much their  
 13 work actually contributed to, like, getting the highest  
 14 grade that we could.  
 15 **Q.** Yes, thank you. That can go down. So in that period,  
 16 2019-2020 in doing this work, you have described he  
 17 seemed isolated, did not say very much, didn't engage  
 18 with you on Facebook. But overall you, at that stage,  
 19 weren't concerned he had any mental health problems and  
 20 weren't concerned that he was aggressive or violent?  
 21 **A.** No, not from the interactions I had. I thought he was  
 22 quite an introverted person which was quite normal with  
 23 the range of people at university. There was always  
 24 quite a range of personalities and that was, like,  
 25 a pretty normal one to what I had experienced in my

83

1 sure that -- because he was the one that knew the most  
 2 about those.  
 3 **Q.** And he did that?  
 4 **A.** Yes.  
 5 **Q.** If we can look at UNIN0001462. There is a few of these  
 6 in the bundle. I think we have about three:  
 7 "Peer assessment of contribution."  
 8 How does it work? Everybody in the group has to  
 9 comment on each other's work or what?  
 10 **A.** Yes, so these were at the time confidential from the  
 11 rest of the group and it was just a review of how  
 12 everyone else contributed to the group and the person  
 13 that was doing it would put their name at the top and  
 14 give themselves a mark of 50. That was sort of the  
 15 baseline for, like, they have contributed at the same  
 16 level as me to the project would be a score of 50.  
 17 Above that you thought they were really helpful in the  
 18 work and they provided more. Lower was they needed a  
 19 bit more help with their work and they sort of slowed  
 20 the group down a bit.  
 21 **Q.** If we look at this 40-60, which is where VC is rated at  
 22 55 is:  
 23 "Team member - well motivated, hard-working,  
 24 contributed to the overall success of the project".  
 25 **A.** Yes. So that score would be based on the -- we did get

82

1 previous years there.  
 2 **Q.** Was he keen to get his degree? Did he appreciate the  
 3 importance of the marks in that project as you did?  
 4 **A.** I've never really spoken to him about his aspirations or  
 5 anything about that. So I can only go off that he  
 6 didn't seem like the most interested in the project.  
 7 So, I wouldn't be entirely sure if he was like fully  
 8 motivated to the finish the degree to a high standard.  
 9 **Q.** Yes, thank you. I have no further questions, Joel.  
 10 Chair?  
 11 **THE CHAIR:** No, I have no questions. Thank you, Joel, for  
 12 coming.  
 13 We are going to finish there now. We are going to  
 14 start again on Monday, not tomorrow, at 10 o'clock.  
 15 Thank you.  
 16 **(4.50 pm)**  
 17 **(The Inquiry adjourned until 10.00 am on Monday,**
