 2 (1.54 pm)
 3 **THE CHAIR:** Yes.
 4 **MR BLAKE:** Chief Inspector Mather, I'm now going to move on
 5 to a second topic, which is the search.
 6 Can we please bring on to screen NGPF0006136. This
 7 is the Incident Log, or incident report, and can we
 8 please turn to page 4.
 9 We spoke earlier about how this came about, and
 10 I think you said that essentially a lot of this is
 11 standard wording but ultimately what is expected in
 12 respect of the working strategy; is that right?
 13 **A.** Yes.
 14 **Q.** If we could scroll down the page, please, we can see
 15 that part of that ordinary working strategy is to
 16 "locate and deal with [the] subject safely".
 17 Then turning, please, to page 6 we see there the
 18 entry from the FIS, and again, part of the standard
 19 wording as to actions, appropriate actions, included
 20 those early observations for potential offenders.
 21 Could we please then -- well, actually, sticking on
 22 this page, we can see the entry there, 4.07:
 23 "Caller states that there's a female on the other
 24 side of the road ..."
 25 So by this stage, 4.07, you were aware that there

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1 outwards and you'd look for a direction of travel which
 2 we had at the time, and you would span out from there.
 3 **Q.** Who would you expect to coordinate that search?
 4 **A.** So I would expect the dispatchers to coordinate the
 5 officers doing that.
 6 **Q.** The dispatchers are those who sit below you in the
 7 Incident Control Room.
 8 **A.** Yes.
 9 **Q.** We're here at 4.09. I want to look at the Cathedral
 10 report the incident near the Cathedral. It's
 11 NGPF0007945, please. We have here logged at 4.09 a call
 12 from an off-duty officer who has been woken up by a
 13 female shouting "Get off me, get off me," and that's
 14 somewhere in the region of Derby Road near the
 15 Cathedral; is that right?
 16 **A.** Correct.
 17 **Q.** Now, that is very shortly after that first call on
 18 Ilkeston Road at 4.03, only a matter of minutes.
 19 Looking back at it now, if the attack on
 20 Ilkeston Road had happened at around 4.00, 4.03, would
 21 it have been realistic for the perpetrator to have
 22 reached that cathedral area and committed a further
 23 attack by that time?
 24 **A.** So I think they could have done if they were running, or
 25 I couldn't discount that they didn't have access to some

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1 were two victims involved.
 2 **A.** Yes, yes.
 3 **Q.** Another walking off. There's reference also to offender
 4 wearing a hoodie. I think we see that on the next page,
 5 sorry, page 7, if we scroll to 4.09 and 28 seconds:
 6 "Caller reports someone being robbed poss[ibly] been
 7 stabbed. One person lay on the floor and another
 8 walking off. Heard a scream and saw a female and male
 9 lay down.
 10 "Offender wearing a hoodie. Went towards the city
 11 centre. Caller has [a] video ..."
 12 At this stage there had been no reference to anybody
 13 running off; is that right?
 14 **A.** Yes.
 15 **Q.** Might this be a time to coordinate and set up an urgent
 16 search of the area?
 17 **A.** Yes, amongst other things.
 18 **Q.** At this stage, did you draw up some sort of search plan
 19 as to how that search might be carried out?
 20 **A.** No. So as a police officer, whilst you're not
 21 specifically trained to search for subjects, it's
 22 something you pick up on quite quickly because we do it
 23 very regularly, for robberies, burglaries, so on and so
 24 forth.
 25 Generally, you would start near the scene and work

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1 sort of vehicle, bike, car.
 2 **Q.** It's about a mile or thereabouts.
 3 **A.** Yes.
 4 **Q.** Looking at it now, realistically, could those two
 5 offences have been committed in that short period of
 6 time?
 7 **A.** Yes, because it's unclear what the offence is here for
 8 this incident.
 9 **Q.** Was it your view at the time that they were likely the
 10 same perpetrator?
 11 **A.** Yes, that was my working assumption.
 12 **Q.** Can you assist us, then, with how that sits with the
 13 explanation that you gave before lunchtime today that
 14 your working hypothesis was a robbery gone wrong?
 15 **A.** Well, I didn't know that this was another robbery
 16 victim. I wasn't too sure, there was a real lack of
 17 information, so I had to make a lot of assumptions. And
 18 again, I did that based on my policing experience.
 19 **Q.** Your reason for not giving armed authority before lunch
 20 was that, in part at least, that you were working on the
 21 hypothesis that it was a single incident. It's clear
 22 here, and the evidence you've just given, that you
 23 thought that the perpetrator had in fact committed
 24 another incident?
 25 **A.** Well, they may have done. I didn't know at the time.

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1 **Q.** So looking back again to that armed authority, if they
2 may have committed another offence towards the city,
3 might not that have been the time to give the direction
4 in respect of armed authority?
5 **A.** It could have been.
6 **Q.** By 4.19, there was a message about VC going down
7 Hopedale Close, and we won't bring it up but for the
8 record it's NGPF0004743.
9 If that is right, again, does that make it less
10 likely that the same perpetrator would have committed
11 the offence near the Cathedral, if they were heading
12 north up Hopedale?
13 **A.** If it were right then yes, but there was nothing to
14 suggest that I were right and there was also nothing to
15 suggest that they couldn't have turned left on to
16 Hopedale and then right and gone back towards the city
17 centre.
18 **Q.** Can we please bring up on to screen NGPF0007689, page 4.
19 This is the debrief, firearms debrief, and I just want
20 to bring on to screen a conversation regarding the Derby
21 Road and Cathedral area. We can see it's five lines
22 down:
23 "How did things develop in the FCR".
24 "First incident was cooling down."
25 "We were even less with staff -- busy waking up RG."

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1 "Redeployed officers including ARVs to assist.
2 "Next incident came in and still felt could be
3 nothing to do with the incident."
4 Is that really the highest you could put -- I mean,
5 those aren't your words but are those the highest really
6 that you could put that Derby Road Cathedral incident,
7 that it was conceivable that it could have been linked?
8 **A.** Yes, again, based on my policing experience, my time as
9 a FIM, it's rare to get an incident like that, it's rare
10 to get one in that location, and I would have been
11 uncomfortable, given my perception of the level of
12 search that was done on initial attendance, leaving that
13 without searching it more thoroughly.
14 **Q.** Can you assist us with the comments from GB. Who is GB?
15 **A.** Oh that's Gav Berry, one of the sergeants that sits next
16 to me.
17 **Q.** He says:
18 "Nothing to suggest in any way linked".
19 Can you recall that conversation at all?
20 **A.** So I can't recall necessarily what he said on this day
21 at the debrief, but I remember on the night it was
22 myself and Gav that had a conversation around this
23 incident, whether it was linked or not, that it seemed
24 unlikely that it would be just a coincidence, and the
25 need for a more thorough search.

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1 Is that Rob Griffin?
2 **A.** Yes.
3 **Q.** Was there a difficulty waking him up?
4 **A.** Not that I've recall.
5 **Q.** No.
6 "Other call with operator saying van running
7 [police] ... over.
8 **THE CHAIR:** "People".
9 **MR BLAKE:** "Anything for residual issues from first
10 incident?
11 "Probably about ten minutes into the first job.
12 "An off-duty cop has called in saying heard a woman
13 screaming.
14 "DIV attended and did an area search.
15 "Another call on Derby Road of female screaming --
16 DIV attended and hadn't turned [something]
17 And then GB says:
18 "Go back to the area and get out on foot and begin
19 searching.
20 "Nothing to suggest in any way linked -- close
21 approximately was just a coincidence."
22 MB says:
23 "Thought the location was conceivable could have
24 been in that area.
25 "Nothing ever came from it."

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1 **Q.** I'd like to take you to the maps that we explored
2 yesterday it's NGPF0008785 and if we could start on
3 page 2, please. We see here, this is the map that sets
4 out the PC Reynolds' movements and you see on the bottom
5 left-hand corner row one, he starts at Ilkeston Road at
6 4.18. He searches broadly in the right area to the
7 north of Ilkeston Road. Row 90, which is on the
8 left-hand side, one of the top entries on the left-hand
9 side, is 4.25, we see him, at least on the map, quite
10 close to where VC was at around, say, 4.22, the green
11 dot.
12 Now, his evidence, PC Reynolds' evidence, was this
13 was essentially using his own initiative and that's what
14 you've just described. Were you, at this stage,
15 directing anywhere, any particular location where
16 individuals should be searching?
17 **A.** Well, following the conversation with Sergeant Berry,
18 I directed him to task officers to search that cathedral
19 area.
20 **Q.** So in respect of north of Ilkeston Road, had you
21 directed anybody to carry out a search there?
22 **A.** No.
23 **Q.** If we please turn over the page, we see PC Smedley and
24 PC Cooper. If we could zoom in there and highlight row
25 24, we can see that they, at 4.12, are on Ilkeston Road,

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1 and if we look at row ... yes, essentially they spend
 2 quite a bit of time -- well, during the earlier period
 3 they're south of Ilkeston Road, they eventually reach
 4 Ilkeston Road and ultimately, I don't think it shows
 5 much else, I think they turn their ignition off at 4.12
 6 at Ilkeston Road. So they're not carrying out a search
 7 from 4.12 onwards; is that right?
 8 **A.** I'm not too sure. I think these officers were on scene
 9 preservation.
 10 **Q.** Scene preservation?
 11 **A.** I believe so.
 12 **Q.** Page 4, we have the map which shows the whereabouts of
 13 of PC Whysall. We can see row 1, which is on the
 14 left-hand side, three boxes up. At 4.13, he was at,
 15 just by Ilkeston Road. We can see he's largely around
 16 the Ilkeston Road area, albeit some searching in the
 17 cathedral and the Park Tunnel area on the right-hand
 18 side of our screen; is that right?
 19 **A.** That's correct.
 20 **Q.** At page 5, PC Crabtree, slightly more difficult map to
 21 read, but essentially largely south of Ilkeston Road and
 22 the cathedral area. Perhaps we can zoom in on the
 23 right-hand box. So 4.18, for example, rows 34-40, those
 24 are all towards the city centre or in the city centre,
 25 The Park -- we see the words "The Park" below that.

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1 eastwards; do you agree with that?
 2 **A.** Yes.
 3 **Q.** Over the page, please, to page 10 we have PCs Yallop and
 4 Bower. There are, in fact, some parts where they are
 5 quite close to VC, if we look at row 75 in the top
 6 right-hand corner, at 4.25, they're heading towards
 7 Gregory Boulevard above the Forest Recreation Ground,
 8 and then row 82, a couple of boxes below that, we see
 9 4.26, pretty much a very similar location to where VC is
 10 a bit later on at 4.38. But they're travelling in the
 11 opposite direction to VC. So VC's the green dot that's
 12 moving right and these white dots are moving left.
 13 Do you see that?
 14 **A.** I do.
 15 **Q.** Then finally PC Kenna and PC Read, these are later
 16 times, and those are all around the cathedral area.
 17 In fact, there's one further map and that's page 12,
 18 PC Luxton and PC Hope. Those white dots focus on the
 19 Ilkeston Road area and the city centre, and don't go to
 20 that north -- that area north where VC is moving.
 21 So the focus, we've seen from this map -- these
 22 maps, are that there is quite a significant search being
 23 undertaken in relation to that Cathedral area east of
 24 the Ilkeston Road and, in comparison, somewhat less in
 25 respect of north of Ilkeston Road, particularly where we

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1 **A.** Yeah.
 2 **Q.** St Barnabas Cathedral and the Park Tunnel both
 3 highlighted there. Again, that search largely in that
 4 cathedral and park area, Park Tunnel area; is that
 5 right?
 6 **A.** Yes, albeit that's before officers were directed to
 7 return to search.
 8 **Q.** So we see some searches slightly later on, 4.22, just
 9 north of Ilkeston Road.
 10 Then if we go over the page, please, to page 7,
 11 PC Jamieson and PC Chapman, a wide-ranging search, but
 12 all south of where VC was travelling, if we can see
 13 those green circles; do you agree with that?
 14 **A.** Yes.
 15 **Q.** Page 8, PC Abid and PC Nunley, very much focused on the
 16 cathedral and the Park Tunnel area. We can see all
 17 those lines from row ten downwards, 4.12, 4.18, 4.22 --
 18 **A.** I believe these were the officers that were first
 19 dispatched to the cathedral incident --
 20 **Q.** Yes.
 21 **A.** -- and I wasn't satisfied with the level of the search.
 22 **Q.** Thank you. Over the page, please, to page 9. PC Spibey
 23 and PC Knight, we can see on the top left, row 1, 4.30,
 24 row 2, 4.31, that they're heading south towards
 25 Ilkeston Road, at a period where VC is heading

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1 see those green dots heading. Do you agree with that?
 2 **A.** I wouldn't necessarily say less, but there was some
 3 significant resource put back into the Cathedral search,
 4 yes.
 5 **Q.** What we're not aware of is any kind of separation of the
 6 map or the city into various zones where individual
 7 officers are being directed towards a particular zone.
 8 Is that something that the police do?
 9 **A.** So we can on occasion. What is more helpful in that
 10 sort of scenario is when we have a really defined area.
 11 So for instance, if someone were to discard a weapon
 12 in a park that is, I don't know, 100 metres by
 13 100 metres, to grid that area and systematically go
 14 through it would be the most effective way of locating
 15 that weapon.
 16 In this case, we've got somebody that's moving.
 17 We're not too sure where they're moving. The last
 18 positive sighting, or I think PC Marshall says he
 19 believes he went to the estate via Hopedale Close, was
 20 in that direction, and we did not have another sighting
 21 afterwards.
 22 **Q.** We heard from PC Reynolds this morning about him using
 23 his instinct. Is there any more formal process that the
 24 police are trained in, in respect of those large areas?
 25 So you've absolutely compared, for example, we see

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1 in the media, police in a field all lined up in a row,
 2 all going along. That's obviously not going to be
 3 achievable for this kind of area but are there any
 4 policies, procedures or training in relation to large
 5 areas?
 6 **A.** So the people best equipped to search for outstanding
 7 subjects in this type of incident are the dog handlers,
 8 of which there were three on duty that night and all
 9 three were deployed to this incident. So PC Crabtree,
 10 PC Marshall, PC Whysall, and PC Marshall is the one that
 11 passed the information that, having spoken to members of
 12 the public, he believed that VC had been seen heading
 13 into an estate perhaps via Hopedale Close, and he gets
 14 his dog out of the car. So again, for context, dog
 15 handlers will be in an estate vehicle with a cage in the
 16 dark designed for dogs. They'll have a general purpose
 17 dog in this case, sometimes a specialist dog.

18 The general purpose dog is the dog that would be
 19 used for scent tracking. So I think probably our best
 20 opportunity, or one of our best opportunities in this
 21 circumstance, of locating VC would have been that track,
 22 which PC Marshall has then attempted to do.

23 But even without the dogs, it's the dog officers,
 24 the drone officer, who are specifically trained around
 25 subject searches.

1 **A.** Yes.
 2 **Q.** Is there any system whereby you can map where officers
 3 have been so that you know that you don't need to return
 4 to a particular area and you can go to another area, or
 5 should be covering another area?
 6 **A.** Not really, but again, what I would say is that whilst
 7 you don't want to be over-duplicating, you can't just
 8 search a road and then not go back to it in case your
 9 subject has doubled back or was hiding.
 10 **Q.** I'm going to play a couple of talkgroup messages. Can
 11 we please go to NGPF0004742 followed by NGPF0004743.
 12 *(Audio played)*
 13 Now I believe those messages went on
 14 Talkgroup 1199 --
 15 **A.** Yes.
 16 **Q.** -- is that correct? Who is ensuring that that
 17 information, which it as it turns out, isn't very
 18 important because we've seen subsequently CCTV images of
 19 VC travelling down Hopedale Close. Who is ensuring that
 20 that is passed to Talkgroup 7?
 21 **A.** So the dispatcher that's on 1199 would type that
 22 information on to the Incident Log, would probably
 23 highlight it, and then there will be an expectation of
 24 the Talkgroup 7 dispatcher to notice that highlight.
 25 **Q.** Is there a difficulty, then, in those separate

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1 **Q.** Who do they report back to? Who is aware of exactly
 2 where they are searching and perhaps plotting that on
 3 some sort of map?
 4 **A.** It will be the dispatchers.
 5 **Q.** So your team?
 6 **A.** Yes.
 7 **Q.** And were they actively doing that, so far as you were
 8 aware?
 9 **A.** I'm not sure. We had quite good sort of similar to the
 10 maps we've been looking at now around locations, that's
 11 done by vehicle telematics. But we also track officers
 12 via their radios, whether that's their personal radios
 13 that are attached to their person, or the car sets. And
 14 that sits on a screen, I have three screens in front of
 15 me, as do the dispatchers, sits on the left-hand screen
 16 so you can see where resources are and where they're
 17 moving to.
 18 **Q.** So the kinds of maps that we've just seen, you have
 19 something similar to that in front of you in realtime
 20 where you can see where all --
 21 **A.** Yes.
 22 **Q.** -- of the vehicles are.
 23 **A.** Yes.
 24 **Q.** Is that the same -- can you see where the ARVs are
 25 compared to ordinary patrol cars?

1 talkgroups in respect of this kind of information?
 2 Because if you were an officer who was driving around
 3 searching, you may not see that written on any log.
 4 **A.** Generally, if you're driving around searching I don't
 5 think you'd be looking at a log. You're reliant upon
 6 what the operators are telling you. It depends.
 7 Sometimes if officers are double-crewed they may be
 8 looking at the log.
 9 **Q.** In respect of this Hopedale Close information, for
 10 example, I don't believe we have a message from
 11 Talkgroup 7 that suggests that the perpetrator may have
 12 travelled down Hopedale Close. Can you assist us with
 13 that?
 14 **A.** I'm not sure, I can't.
 15 **Q.** We're going to play three more audio talkgroups; it's
 16 NGPF0004748, followed by NGPF0004749, and NGPF0004751,
 17 please.
 18 *(Audio played)*
 19 Those were messages passed at 4.24, so they're after
 20 the reference to Hopedale Close.
 21 Were you aware at this stage that PC Speeden had
 22 been asking for an update?
 23 **A.** No.
 24 **Q.** Reviewing this now, might that have been an opportunity
 25 for somebody to have said to him "We've heard about

1 Hopedale Close, we now know it's a male all in black as
 2 well, and I'm going to deploy specific resources to
 3 specifically search north of Ilkeston Road"?
 4 **A.** I definitely think it was -- we, the dispatcher ought to
 5 have told PC Speeden that the last sighting was Hopedale
 6 Close because clearly he was under the understanding
 7 that it was still the original information which was
 8 heading towards the city centre.
 9 **Q.** Yes. By 4.29, we know that PC Brady-Johnson had viewed
 10 CCTV footage and we've heard the reference in that
 11 message, I think, to grey joggers underneath black
 12 trousers. So a further piece of information about what
 13 VC was wearing. I'm just going to play you another
 14 message from 4.32 pm, and that's NGPF0007311.

(Audio played)

16 That's a radio discussion between yourself and
 17 Inspector Peter Shaw; is that right?

18 **A.** Yes, I've radioed in to get a sort of, an update on
 19 his -- how things are from his perspective.
 20 **Q.** He refers to two armed officers at the scene. He says
 21 one more that is -- was that "on the way", or something
 22 along those lines?
 23 **A.** I think I said, "There's one" -- I think I used the term
 24 "untainted" which is probably a poor choice of words,
 25 but what I meant by that is there's no contamination

1 I hadn't --
 2 **Q.** Either he was long gone, in which case what's the point
 3 in carrying out further searches, or he may have been in
 4 the cathedral area because you were diverting resources
 5 to the cathedral area. Did you think he was long gone
 6 or did you think he was at the cathedral area?
 7 **A.** I thought that that comment indicated I thought he was
 8 away from the immediate vicinity of the scene. I didn't
 9 know whether he was at the cathedral area. One of my
 10 hypotheses was that that incident, when it was called
 11 in, was VC.

12 **Q.** I want to bring onto screen your witness statement,
 13 please, and paragraph 45.

14 The focus at paragraph 45, it's page 13, is on
 15 a slightly later period, but I just want to read it to
 16 you. It says:

17 "From checking the Incident Logs and listening to
 18 the radio transmissions my assessment is that, by 0500,
 19 there was an Inspector, a Detective Inspector, one
 20 Response sergeant and twelve officers at the scene.
 21 I believe that 4 officers attended the Queens Medical
 22 Centre and 13 officers were engaged in searching for the
 23 offender. The officers searching would have coordinated
 24 the search themselves, with the assistance of their
 25 dispatchers in the control room to have oversight of the

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1 issues, as in that was -- that would have been 4-8, who
 2 were further north in the county who were travelling
 3 down.

4 **Q.** Thank you. Also reference to "checking mapping",
 5 I think; was Peter Shaw asking you to check?

6 **A.** Yes, he wanted to make sure that the scene or the
 7 cordons that he'd put in place were appropriate.

8 **Q.** So that wasn't a reference to searching, for example?

9 **A.** No.

10 **Q.** The reference to "probably long gone", and that's really
 11 what I want to focus on with regard to this issue. It
 12 looks as though it might be suggested that by 4.32 you
 13 had pretty much given up on the prospect of a search.
 14 What do you say about that?

15 **A.** Well, that's not the case. What I'm indicating there is
 16 again, based on my policing experience, the subject is
 17 probably some distance away from where the incident
 18 happened.

19 **Q.** How does that sit with the fact that we had this other
 20 incident in the cathedral area that other officers were
 21 being diverted to, and the possibility that the two of
 22 them were linked? Isn't that quite different to the
 23 perpetrator potentially being long gone if you had
 24 linked those two incidents together, potentially?

25 **A.** I'm not too sure what the question is there.

18

1 search."

2 It's that that I want to focus on and that's really
 3 what you've said today, which is that it was the
 4 dispatchers in the Control Room were the ones who were
 5 coordinating the search. To what extent should that
 6 role have gone to the person with overall
 7 responsibility, the Force Incident Manager?

8 **A.** What I would like to say is there was a -- the response
 9 sergeant attended really, really quickly and was
 10 attending to one of the victims giving first aid which
 11 in itself is not usual. They would normally turn up
 12 after other PCs had, and likewise, the inspector was --
 13 arrived at the scene very, very quickly, which was
 14 helpful from a supervision point of view, but because
 15 the inspector was almost looking inwards towards the
 16 scene, that oversight wasn't there and I do now, with
 17 hindsight, wish that I'd almost spotted that there was
 18 a bit of a gap there, that I either asked the sergeant
 19 from another area to come across to fill that gap or one
 20 of the sergeants who decides, or indeed myself.

21 **Q.** Inspector Shaw has already given a witness statement to
 22 the Inquiry. I won't bring it up on to the screen but
 23 for the record it's WITN0411001, and he's said at
 24 paragraph 64 of that statement that he presumed "top
 25 desk", ie, yourselves, were coordinating the search, and

1 he said later, paragraph 72, that the incident was very
2 much led by the control room.

3 Do you think that something fell into the gaps
4 there, that Inspector Shaw thought that you were
5 coordinating the search; you thought that he was
6 coordinating the search, or some one linked to him was
7 coordinating the search?

8 **A.** So I wouldn't say coordinating, I would still say that
9 the dispatchers would coordinate, but that oversight
10 over coordination I think could have been better, and
11 I will ultimately take responsibility for that as the
12 senior officer on duty.

13 As I said, my expectation ordinarily would be that
14 that would be the task of the RPI, which is
15 Inspector Shaw's position. However, it is clear he was
16 very much consumed by matters at the scene.

17 **Q.** And in terms of recommendations for the future, how do
18 you think that issue can be avoided?

19 **A.** Just to have a bit more awareness around that there was
20 a gap that wasn't spotted. As I said, there's a number
21 of factors that have led to that.

22 **Q.** Thank you. That document can come down, please.

23 Sticking with the issue of a search, I just want to
24 explore some alternative resources in respect of
25 searching. Can we please go back to NGPF0006136, and

21

1 know. I think probably the recommendations from -- or
2 the opinions of a dog handler might be beneficial to
3 hear from.

4 **Q.** I want to move on, then, still sticking with alternative
5 resources. That document can come down. I want to ask
6 you about the council, the local council. The Inquiry
7 has obtained four witness statements from Colin
8 Wilderspin of Nottingham City Council. I won't bring
9 them on to the screen but the references are
10 WITN0224001, WITN0224018, WITN0224028, and WITN0224034.

11 He's explained that the City Council has a 24-hour,
12 7-day a week monitoring facility. They have a control
13 centre. Are you aware of that control centre?

14 **A.** I am.

15 **Q.** He says that they have access to the police Airwave
16 talkgroup and dedicated phone lines in respect of
17 understanding what the police are up to. Do you know
18 about that?

19 **A.** I do.

20 **Q.** Yes. He also says that Nottingham Police also have
21 a direct feed. Are you aware of that direct feed?

22 **A.** I am.

23 **Q.** Now, we've seen radio contact being received by the CCTV
24 control room at 4.38 asking for CCTV footage. I'll just
25 take you to that, it's WITN0224006.

23

1 page 11, please, and three-quarters of the way down the
2 page, 4:16:08 we see that the dog unit has arrived at
3 the scene.

4 Superintendent Allardice's evidence was that dog
5 handlers are the most well equipped and well trained
6 people to assist with the search. Who was responsible
7 for their coordination?

8 **A.** They're trained to do that, I would expect them to go
9 and do the search.

10 **Q.** But in terms of oversight of -- if there were multiple
11 dog handlers at the scene, who was providing them with
12 directions or oversight in respect of their areas of
13 coverage?

14 **A.** Well, I wouldn't expect in this case that they needed
15 it. We have PC Marshall who was at Hopedale with the
16 dog out; we had PC Whysall who went on a mobile area
17 search in his car around the Hopedale estate; and
18 I believe PC Crabtree was further south, was the -- is
19 what the telematics data indicated.

20 **Q.** In respect of something like firearms, for example, you
21 have quite a structured arrangement where you have
22 somebody sitting at the top providing oversight and
23 guidance. Is there something similar in relation to dog
24 units and, if not, should there be?

25 **A.** There isn't, and perhaps it might be useful, I don't

22

1 This is a report from Nottingham City Council, and
2 it has there the time 4.38, and if we scroll down,
3 please, we see there:

4 "police request to monitor Ilkeston road for a black
5 male in all black that had robbed a male and female on
6 Ilkeston road and stabbed them both ..."

7 Then it says two boxes down:

8 "monitored the area and played back the cameras on
9 Ilkeston road but could not find the offender. Informed
10 the police control room that the male was not seen,
11 a property by the assault had a camera that had captured
12 the whole incident and the male that had stabbed them
13 both. A scene was put in place around the area."

14 That's a formal request that was made by the police
15 for CCTV footage on Ilkeston Road. Were you aware at
16 the time of that request.

17 **A.** I wasn't aware of this specific request. Can I just
18 clarify what the timings --

19 **Q.** If we scroll upwards, we see that it begins at 4.38.

20 **A.** So I've never seen one of these reports before so
21 I don't really understand how they work, but CCTV was
22 certainly contacted before 4.38, so I'm not too sure why
23 this document has a 4.38.

24 **Q.** Can you assist us with that? I mean, this is a specific
25 request, or appears to be a specific request, for CCTV

24

1 of Ilkeston Road. VC had obviously left Ilkeston Road
2 by that time, and was far away. Was there anybody
3 monitoring in real time the CCTV from Nottingham City
4 Council during all of the incidents that we've spoken
5 about today?

6 **A.** Is it possible to bring up the Incident Log because
7 I think there's reference to it on the Incident Log.

8 **Q.** I can do. So NGPF0006136.

9 If we scroll over -- shall we just keep on scrolling
10 until ...?

11 **A.** Yes, please. If we can slow down, it's ... maybe on to
12 the next page. And the next page, please. And the next
13 page. The following page.

14 **Q.** It may be page 11, 4:14:54 that you're looking for. Is
15 it that reference there "CCTV" -- (*overspeaking*) --

16 **A.** Yes, so that indicates that there's been contact from
17 the council workers at the CCTV around they're unable to
18 see the scene, as it states, but also indicates
19 obviously that the request came in sooner than that.

20 **Q.** Reading Mr Wilderspin's witness statement, you get the
21 image in your head of, on a police control room where
22 there is a screen showing multiple cameras from around
23 the city, and the police have the ability to focus on
24 different areas themselves. Is that --

25 **A.** So that's not the case. So within our command and
25

1 black with a black bag.

2 So far as you're aware, was there any coordinated
3 effort to scour the local CCTV that the city -- the
4 council CCTV to try and establish where the perpetrator
5 may have been?

6 **A.** Sorry, that the council did it or the police did it?

7 **Q.** A coordinated approach by both council and police
8 working together?

9 **A.** So the council were doing it, as they'd been requested
10 to do, and the police would not have been able to
11 coordinate a CCTV-led search via the feeds that we get.

12 **Q.** So the onus in those circumstances is entirely on the
13 council to establish where the appropriate search might
14 take place? Is it that -- is your understanding that
15 they listened to your radiowaves --

16 **A.** Yes.

17 **Q.** -- and should be actively monitoring the city in
18 relation to what they can hear?

19 **A.** Yes.

20 **Q.** We know that there are different talkgroups. Do you
21 know which talkgroups they are able to listen to?

22 **A.** Well, they've got an airwave terminal, so it would be
23 any of the talkgroups that we use.

24 **Q.** Have they provided any direction on, evenings such as
25 this, as to which talkgroup they should be listening to?

27

1 control system that you've heard referred to as SAFE,
2 there is a tab for CCTV. We have a limited number of
3 feeds that can come into the control room, and they're
4 for all across the county. So for the city I think it's
5 four feeds that we've got. But you are only able to
6 watch things in realtime. You can't track back, you
7 can't zoom in, and you can't control the cameras. You
8 have to -- you can only view what the CCTV operator is
9 pointing the camera towards. That person is located in
10 the council building.

11 **Q.** So there was somebody at this time in the council
12 building who, on direction from the police, could have
13 zoomed in on particular areas and you would have been
14 able to see that?

15 **A.** Yes, and they've also said that they are searching for
16 the subject -- suspect.

17 **Q.** So your reading of that is that somebody in the council
18 was searching the city for the perpetrator?

19 **A.** Yes, they're also looking at the cameras, yes.

20 **Q.** Because we know at this time, not too long after, it
21 started to become light. I think sunrise was
22 approximately 4.42 on that day. Wayne Birkett was hit
23 at 5.23, so there's a considerable period there where
24 it's light. Not many people on the streets. You had
25 a fair description of the perpetrator all dressed in

26

1 **A.** I don't know.

2 **Q.** How do you think a local council would know where to
3 search, and which talkgroup they should be listening to
4 for particular incidents?

5 **A.** Well, I'm sure they would have been told. Again, I'll
6 make the assumption that rather than -- because we
7 haven't -- having reviewed all of the radio
8 transmissions, you can't hear the CCTV operators being
9 tasked by the radio. So my assumption is that, as
10 you've mentioned earlier, that they've used the phone
11 and I think they would have phoned up and said, "We're
12 searching for this person" and they would have said what
13 channel are you working on.

14 **Q.** Whose role would that have been within your room?

15 **A.** So I think that's a dispatcher, the pay code there
16 refers to a dispatcher.

17 **Q.** So would you expect their dispatcher to be in
18 coordination with the local council searching for the
19 perpetrator?

20 **A.** I would expect them to initiate that search and make
21 sure they had a description and knew the last sighting.

22 **Q.** In your view, is there anything missing there? Are
23 there any gaps there looking for recommendations insofar
24 as that coordination is concerned?

25 **A.** I mean, I suppose in an ideal world, and given how

28

1 technology is now, there ought to be a way that we could
2 take control of those cameras and perhaps we would be
3 better suited to be conducting that type of search.
4 I don't understand the technology behind it and whether
5 that is possible, but it would seem to me that that
6 could be feasible.

7 **Q.** By the sound of it, it's not, for example, somebody from
8 Nottingham City Council embedded in the police control
9 room?

10 **A.** That is also an option.

11 **Q.** But that doesn't happen, sorry?

12 **A.** No.

13 **Q.** Also, in terms of resources available, what about air
14 support? We haven't heard anything about air support.
15 Could you have called for a helicopter search or
16 something like that?

17 **A.** So the helicopter NPAS, National Police Air Service,
18 will not operate over Nottinghamshire between the hours
19 of one in the morning and one in the afternoon.

20 **Q.** Why is that?

21 **A.** I don't know. It was, it was something -- it never used
22 to be the case years ago, certainly when I was of
23 a lower rank, but since I've been in the Control Room,
24 there were a few occasions before this incident whereby
25 I've called up and asked for NPAS, and I was told they

29

1 ARVs contributed to any decisions in respect of the
2 extent of the search?

3 **A.** No. Oh, sorry, do you mean as in because they were
4 committed with the first aid?

5 **Q.** Whether it be because they were committed, whether it be
6 because there aren't enough of them. For whatever
7 reason, do you think that the number of available ARVs
8 contributed in some way towards your decisions regarding
9 searching for the perpetrator?

10 **A.** I wouldn't say my decisions. I would have liked more
11 officers. I would -- the more officers you can put into
12 it, the higher the chances are you're going to find
13 anybody and, you know, the ARV officers are really,
14 really highly skilled, they have great equipment,
15 they're usually more experienced officers. But actually
16 they are just police officers and they would be
17 searching as a response officer would be, so I would
18 have liked more officers.

19 **Q.** Moving to a third issue, communications issues. Do you
20 consider it was part of your job to set up a strategy in
21 respect of which communication channels were appropriate
22 in the evening?

23 **A.** I wouldn't -- so with regards to the Ilkeston Road
24 incident, I made the decision, and I think we heard it
25 yesterday where one of the operators has asked officers

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1 will not deploy unless it's a counterterrorism incident.

2 **Q.** It's a what, sorry?

3 **A.** Counterterrorism incident.

4 **Q.** That seems like quite a wide gap, doesn't it, because
5 a helicopter, for example, could have covered quite
6 a wide -- (*overspeaking*) --

7 **A.** I would agree. The helicopter is an invaluable resource
8 for us, in various scenarios.

9 **Q.** Particularly at that time of day when there aren't that
10 many people on the streets.

11 **A.** So the alternative, albeit it doesn't do things exactly
12 the same, is the drone. That's why I think so many
13 police forces are moving to having their own drone
14 officers. So we have, in Nottinghamshire, still, and
15 certainly on this night, one drone operator for the
16 whole county who was dispatched to this incident.

17 **Q.** Are you aware of the product of their operation for this
18 incident?

19 **A.** So I think they did an initial area search around the
20 incident location, and then were tasked to the
21 cathedral, the search there.

22 **Q.** So again, some resources diverted towards that cathedral
23 area?

24 **A.** Yes.

25 **Q.** In terms of ARVs, do you think the lack of available

30

1 to move to another channel because of technical
2 difficulties. My understanding of that is that that is
3 a -- there were no technical difficulties; it was that
4 we, on the top desk, were saying, because of the impact,
5 the number of resources on the Ilkeston Road incident,
6 we couldn't accommodate this patching because there was
7 still business as usual on the Talkgroup 6 area. So we
8 didn't have enough police resources in the Control Room
9 to reopen another channel. So what the decision I made
10 was, I'll take ultimate responsibility for it, was for
11 the officers that would ordinarily be on Talkgroup 6 to
12 move to Talkgroup 4, which was also patched with 5. So
13 we ultimately had three talkgroups on one, that on
14 Talkgroup 4, so that Ilkeston Road could remain on its
15 own.

16 There's a couple of reasons for that. One is that
17 it can be very relatively difficult, particularly if
18 you're driving, to change channels on your personal set
19 and therefore I thought it prudent that we asked the
20 Talkgroup 6 officers to move over to 4, rather than the
21 ones that were engaged in activity on the Ilkeston Road
22 murders.

23 **Q.** Inspector Shaw, at paragraph 78 of his witness
24 statement, has referred to channel hopping and
25 potentially missing important bits of information.

32

1 I think he also missed the declaration of Operation
2 Plato, for example.

3 **A.** Yes.

4 **Q.** Is that something that you would agree with?

5 **A.** Yes. So it's something that's now part of our revised
6 Plato plan. So Inspector Shaw would have been a very,
7 very busy individual that day. He will have a radio
8 with an earpiece, but he'll have people talking to him.
9 I think he had the DI with for a lot of the time that he
10 would have been speaking to (*sic*).

11 Actually, similarly to me, I have one headphone on,
12 but I can often be talking to other people or giving
13 direction. You can't always pick everything up because
14 you can't possibly listen to two or three things at the
15 same time.

16 So the new -- the revised plan talks around making
17 sure there's confirmation that that individual has heard
18 the declaration, and also assigning them a staff officer
19 so that there's two -- there's then two radios, to aid
20 communication.

21 **Q.** So for something like the declaration of Operation
22 Plato, is it now policy that that would be declared on
23 every channel or every relevant channel?

24 **A.** Yes.

25 **Q.** And --

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1 place there?

2 **A.** So SR is Scott Roebuck who was the manager on duty on
3 this night, and obviously attended the debrief.

4 So my understanding of this is that at this time, in
5 2023, on a Monday night, Talkgroup 7 and Talkgroup 6 are
6 supposed to be on the same channel, but there's two ways
7 of doing that and the preferred method is that all
8 Talkgroup 7 officers are asked to stop using Talkgroup 7
9 and turn to Talkgroup 6.

10 Patching is where the two channels are merged so
11 there's a way of -- you'll have to forgive my -- I'm not
12 that technical, but you could merge two channels by
13 highlighting them and I think that is what Scott is
14 alluding to, is that they were merged rather than the
15 officers told to move to Talkgroup 6.

16 **Q.** Is there an issue that can be resolved?

17 **A.** Yes, well, we need to stick to the policy, which is to
18 move them to Talkgroup 6.

19 **Q.** Thank you.

20 Chair, I've covered all of the issues that I've
21 intended to cover today so I think perhaps now is --

22 **THE CHAIR:** Yes, I think we'll take the break now so if we
23 come back at 3.10, I think that will give everybody
24 time. Thank you.

25 **(2.51 pm)**

1 **A.** But I think it was on that day, I just think
2 Inspector Shaw didn't hear it because he would have been
3 doing something else.

4 **Q.** Is there a way to avoid the problems that were
5 experienced by Inspector Shaw, in your view?

6 **A.** Yes, by doing some of the things that we're -- that the
7 newer plan now addresses.

8 **Q.** Can we please go back to NGPF0007689, page 3, we are
9 going to return to the firearms debrief because that
10 does address communications issues to some extent.
11 It's the bottom of this page. The question is posed
12 at the penultimate entry:
13 "Any comms issues?"
14 I think this is you saying:
15 "[The] Channel is very busy with early tasking to
16 separate channels.
17 "Was messy because of the patching that took place.
18 "I wanted the incident to have its own channel and
19 operator."
20 Then SR says:
21 "0300 TG7 turns on TG6 -- by accident they stayed on
22 channels and patched rather than split channels.
23 "Had to move onto another channel because of the
24 complexities of using".
25 Can you assist us with the discussion that took

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1 **(A short break)**

2 **(3.10 pm)**

3 **Questioned by MS CARTWRIGHT**

4 **MS CARTWRIGHT:** (*Mic off*) Good afternoon, Officer Mather.
5 My name is Sophie Cartwright and I represent the
6 survivors.
7 (*Mic on*) Can I just deal with some practical
8 matters first of all. You obviously reference that
9 there was only one Force Incident Manager in the Control
10 Room that night.
11 First of all, can you identify the name of that
12 individual, please?

13 **A.** It's myself, Chief Inspector --

14 **Q.** Sorry, I meant -- so the other manager. You said there
15 were two managers that should have been in --

16 **A.** Oh, control room managers.

17 **Q.** Yes.

18 **A.** Scott Roebuck.

19 **Q.** Is it the position that ordinarily there should have
20 been two on duty that night?

21 **A.** No, the minimum staffing levels are one FIM, that's
22 myself, one sergeant and one manager.

23 **Q.** Can you just help us then what practically they do,
24 what's their role in the Control Room, particularly in
25 the early hours of the morning?

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- 1 A. The manager?
- 2 Q. Yes.
- 3 A. Well, their area of expertise is more around the
4 technology and the call taking, so I've never been
5 trained in call taking, for example, yet there are
6 a number of call takers in the Control Room and they'll
7 have better knowledge around things like patching of
8 talkgroups, they supervise the call takers and the
9 sergeants supervise the dispatchers.
- 10 Q. Thank you. Now, obviously we know that you turned on
11 your body-worn footage that was on your desk after the
12 Plato Declaration, but can you help us as to why you
13 hadn't turned the body-worn footage on before, and in
14 particular bearing in mind the significance of the
15 attack at Ilkeston Road?
- 16 A. So there's couple of points there. So I didn't turn on
17 my body-worn video, it was Sergeant Straszewskyj that
18 turned on my body-worn video. As regards the Ilkeston
19 Road incident, it's not policy, the only policy we have
20 is that we activate body-worn video for a firearms
21 deployment.
- 22 Q. So even in a scenario, for example, would you agree that
23 what was taking place at Ilkeston Road on any view was
24 a critical incident?
- 25 A. I know it was later declared a critical incident, yes.

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- 1 Nottinghamshire, it's what our specialist resources use.
2 So on that night it was the three dog officers, three
3 ARV units, and the drone operator that would have
4 ordinarily been on 1199. So it's also used for pursuit.
5 So if we enter into a pursuit phase, officers are --
6 local officers are advised to move onto 1199 to
7 coordinate tactical resources, but also because
8 bordering forces can easily get onto 1199.
- 9 Q. The reason why I raise that, because we know that
10 Officer Reynolds, who we heard from this morning,
11 because of the issues he was having on Talkgroups 6 and
12 7 moved on to 119 (sic) and that then necessarily
13 increases traffic on that talkgroup which affects the
14 ability of people to talk to Control.
- 15 Now I've not seen anything in the various calls at
16 any point of a direction being given to officers about
17 ensuring that they stick to airway traffic and don't go
18 on certain channels. So at any point -- I know there's
19 a reference to moving people off 6 to 4, but had any
20 clear direction been given to officers to stay off the
21 interoperable, the 1199?
- 22 A. No.
- 23 Q. Now, you've already been asked a lot of questions about
24 the decision not to authorise a firearms authority, and
25 I want to go through the policy with you because it's

39

- 1 Q. So in a critical incident scenario, is it not
2 a requirement to put your body-worn footage on?
- 3 A. It's not a requirement. I wish I had done because
4 it would have captured a lot of things that were going
5 on in the Control Room.
- 6 Q. All right. Then, obviously you've been asked a lot of
7 questions about Airwave and obviously the issue when
8 there's a period of high demand in Airwave and also
9 Airwave clarity for communication. Is there a tactical
10 advisor for Airwave in Nottingham?
- 11 A. There are a number of Airwaves tac advisors, Scott
12 Roebuck being one of them.
- 13 Q. All right. So did Scott Roebuck that night provide
14 specialist advice about the airways and the use of the
15 channels?
- 16 A. He did, but it was me that dictated things like "I want
17 that incident managed on its own channel because of how
18 busy it is", and then I left him to sort out the
19 logistics behind how that would be achievable.
- 20 Q. But because -- perhaps can you just clarify, we heard
21 some evidence yesterday from Officer Allardice about
22 Talkgroup 1199 and what that should be used for. Could
23 I just have from you what the purpose of the 1199 group
24 is?
- 25 A. So it's the National Interop Channel for

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- 1 right, isn't it, that that mandates the involvement of
2 the strategic firearm commander, it requires then real
3 consideration by the Tactical Firearm Commander about
4 the working strategy, the tactical plan, it then needs
5 that to be clearly communicated to the operational
6 firearm commander, but also consideration for that
7 tactical plan for utilising the services and knowledge
8 and experience of the tactical advisors. So it's
9 something far more just than practically that those
10 officers can utilise and use their firearms; would you
11 agree?
- 12 A. There are several connotations to a -- declaring
13 a firearms incident. Yes, you would contact a firearms
14 tactical advisor in that case.
- 15 Q. In terms of it may seem obvious from the name, but
16 you've been asked lots of questions today about search
17 strategy, drones, dogs, review of CCTV, but essentially
18 the tactical advisor assists in coming up with an
19 appropriate tactical plan where it's all being
20 considered, those factors, and how they're going to be
21 deployed and utilised as part of the tactical plan;
22 would you agree?
- 23 A. Not entirely. I would say the firearms tactical advisor
24 would advise me on firearms tactics.
- 25 Q. But it's not just firearms, is it? They're tactical

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1 advisors in respect of the tactics that are available.
 2 Perhaps if I contextualise that question, because
 3 certainly what Officer Speeden has said in his statement
 4 is if he had been given a firearms authority, he would
 5 have had control of the search, it would have been run
 6 on a single channel, the firearms channel, he would have
 7 requested the other officer's teams to be patched into
 8 their talkgroup, and he would have asked for CCTV
 9 checks, drone assistance, and NPAS.

10 So we've got a concrete example of what Officer
 11 Speeden said would have happened if the firearms
 12 authority was granted, whether at 4.08, before he got to
 13 scene, at 4.11, when he'd seen what met him at
 14 Ilkeston Road, or at any points as the events of 13 June
 15 evolved.

16 Perhaps for completeness, it's right, isn't it, that
 17 there's a bespoke firearms channel for Nottingham
 18 firearms officers, which was the 1205 that you only told
 19 them to move on to after you had declared Operation
 20 Plato.

21 **A.** Yes, and the firearms authority.

22 **Q.** Yes. So perhaps to --

23 **A.** Sorry, I think you asked a couple of other questions.

24 So we've already talked about NPAS and that was -- we've
 25 discussed how they weren't deployed between the hours of

41

1 of drones is The Park area of Nottingham which is
 2 a fairly affluent area; would you agree? It's the gated
 3 aspect, I know there's a way to get in ungated, but much
 4 of the resources were focused on the affluent area of
 5 Nottingham; would you agree?

6 **A.** It is an affluent area, but it borders the city centre.

7 I don't think it was necessarily just The Park that was
 8 searched.

9 **Q.** But this goes back to -- and we'll look at the policy --
 10 the need for a working strategy, an appropriate threat
 11 and risk assessment, and a tactical plan that is
 12 allowing someone other than dispatchers in Control Room,
 13 who are remote, to properly put in place a strategic and
 14 tactical plan, and then deploy that. So perhaps rather
 15 than --

16 **THE CHAIR:** Perhaps he can answer these questions, because
 17 you're putting very compound matters to him, and he's
 18 tending just to answer the last one. It would help me
 19 more if you broke it down a bit so I can catch his
 20 evidence about each of the points you're putting.

21 **MS CARTWRIGHT:** All right, thank you.

22 Perhaps we will look at it through the policy,
 23 please. If we could display NGPF0010086. Thank you.
 24 If we could move internally in this document to page 33.
 25 Thank you.

43

1 1.00 am and 1.00 pm. We did deploy a drone already, we
 2 did already deploy the dog officers. So I'm not sure
 3 how the granting of the firearms authority would have
 4 made a difference to those aspects.

5 **Q.** Well, let's look at it this way: the firearms officers
 6 had not been told that one of the strands of
 7 intelligence was that VC had gone left into Hopedale
 8 Drive (*sic*). So had they then been deployed and had
 9 their own ability for a tactical plan, they could have
 10 considered that very significant information about VC
 11 going left rather than into the city.

12 **A.** It was passed on 1199, which was the channel that the
 13 firearms officers were on. That -- it's PC Marshall,
 14 the officer who is on 1199 as well, it was 1199 that we
 15 heard earlier where he's passed that they believe the
 16 suspect has gone into the estate on Hopedale Close.

17 **Q.** You mentioned the drones there, but let's be clear, the
 18 drones were placed nowhere near the left; the drones
 19 only went around The Park area; would you agree? So
 20 there was no drone put up anywhere to the left of
 21 Ilkeston Road.

22 **A.** Yeah, I don't believe that the drone lifted over that
 23 area.

24 **Q.** So can you assist us at all: I mean, the area where it
 25 seems sizeable resources for searching and utilisation

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1 So we've looked at it in another document, which was
 2 the Nottingham Policy, but essentially this is the
 3 criteria for deployment of AFOs, and we can see the test
 4 for that:

5 "Where an officer has reason to suppose that they
 6 may have to protect themselves or others from a person
 7 who is in possession or has immediate access to
 8 a potentially lethal weapon, or is otherwise so
 9 dangerous that the deployment of armed officers is
 10 considered to be appropriate, or as an operational
 11 contingency in a specific operation." (*As read*)

12 We can see that "reason to suppose" sets the
 13 knowledge required far lower than that which would
 14 actually justify the use of firearms.

15 Now, you've told us that you made the decision not
 16 to deploy but I think it's right that you accept that
 17 the criteria for deployment was met on what was greeting
 18 the officers at 4.04 in the morning on Ilkeston Road.

19 **A.** Yes.

20 **Q.** Right. As we look at that, can I ask, at any point did
 21 any of the footage from the scene get uploaded to SAFE,
 22 to NICE Investigate where you were able to actually view
 23 the full range of footage that was available that had
 24 captured this incident.

25 **A.** So I think some stills were uploaded to the Incident

44

1 Log. I'm not sure what was uploaded to NICE but
 2 certainly none of the footage, as in the video footage,
 3 was available for me to watch.

4 **Q.** Right, and can I ask: have you subsequently viewed the
 5 body-worn footage?

6 **A.** I viewed -- sorry, whose body-worn video?

7 **Q.** So any of the body-worn footage or any of the footage.

8 **A.** I've watched some of it.

9 **Q.** All right, and that's what I want to understand then, is
 10 whether, in the Control Room, realistically you were
 11 getting the full understanding of the truly exceptional
 12 nature of the attack that had been carried out at
 13 Ilkeston Road?

14 **A.** So I would say -- I've said it earlier on, it was
 15 exceptional, it was extreme. I don't think I got the
 16 full impact because I'm not there and I'm view --
 17 observing remotely.

18 **Q.** Right. So I'm not going to detail the nature of the
 19 extreme injuries sustained to both Barney and Grace, but
 20 this investigation was unique also because door cam
 21 footage had completely captured the attack; would you
 22 agree?

23 **A.** I think it has, yes. I have not viewed that door cam
 24 footage.

25 **Q.** Right. There is CCTV from a property that completely
 45

1 to have that, in order to make that decision.

2 **Q.** And the threat and risk assessment --

3 **A.** Yes.

4 **Q.** -- and the working strategy. Because you've been played
 5 the footage today, so at 4.30, you were effectively
 6 saying, "Well, he's long gone now, there's no prospect
 7 of finding him".

8 You were asked questions about that, I don't want to
 9 play it again and go over footage, but when the officers
 10 arrived at the scene, notwithstanding the brutality of
 11 the attack, Grace and Barney were still alive, and so
 12 the reality is that that offender was not very far away.
 13 So had there been an appropriate strategy put in place
 14 early on, there was -- we -- there was a far more
 15 realistic option, if firearms officers had been deployed
 16 on an authority, that they could have deployed a working
 17 strategy that made it more likely that VC would have
 18 been found.

19 **A.** But (*unclear*) mentioned they were still alive and my
 20 real priority was them and my firearms officers are
 21 exceptionally trained in first aid, exceptionally.

22 **Q.** But the East Midlands Ambulance Service were arriving,
 23 and they were there. You later on deal with issues of
 24 contamination. Now, would you agree it was said earlier
 25 by counsel for the Force that contamination is verboten,
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1 captured the attack, yes?

2 **A.** Yes, I believe so. Again, I haven't viewed that.

3 **Q.** From a different viewpoint there's also mobile phone
 4 footage that was captured of the attack from a different
 5 angle; would you agree?

6 **A.** Again, I haven't viewed that.

7 **Q.** But also there was a taxi again parked on the drive
 8 that, again, had fully captured all of the brutal attack
 9 that had taken place.

10 **A.** I'm not sure when all of that was made available, as in
 11 I don't know whether it was instantly available to
 12 officers on the scene or not.

13 **Q.** No. But again, would you agree, in terms of the
 14 assumptions you made -- and we'll come on to look at
 15 those -- to arrive at an appropriate threat and risk
 16 assessment, it was made known on the early calls that
 17 there was footage of the incident; would you agree?

18 **A.** Yes.

19 **Q.** That was imperative, because that would give real
 20 intelligence of facts as to what had happened to Grace
 21 and Barney.

22 **A.** Yes.

23 **Q.** Right. So it was essential that that was factored in to
 24 the decision for armed officers; would you agree?

25 **A.** Yeah, it was -- absolutely it would be -- I would like
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1 and so by utilising your specialist armed officers, in
 2 first aid, you were impacting about their deployability,
 3 in another way; would you agree?

4 **A.** Yes.

5 **Q.** It had a really significant impact in this incident,
 6 because later on, all three vehicles went back to
 7 headquarters about 5.10, 5.14, and 15 they were heading
 8 back up, would you agree? So it meant that officers
 9 were not being utilised nearer to the city where they
 10 would have been far more useful?

11 **A.** They didn't all make it back to base, but they were
 12 all either there or heading in that direction, yes.

13 **Q.** So we know as well practically that a number of the
 14 firearms officers at the scene were not being used for
 15 first aid; they were used to gain entry to a property.
 16 I really want to challenge you --

17 **THE CHAIR:** Can you give him a chance to answer?

18 **A.** So, I mean, I would like to talk about that point.
 19 So to gain entry to the property -- and again,
 20 I haven't viewed the body-worn footage -- there was
 21 a need to gain entry to that property because that's
 22 very nearby to where Grace was found and we were unsure
 23 whether there was anybody else injured within that
 24 property and the response officers couldn't get in due
 25 to the structure of the door. And it is firearms
 48

1 officers at the scene who have effected that entry using
2 a ripsaw, which only the firearms teams have access to.
3 **MS CARTWRIGHT:** But again, if officers' priority had been to
4 view the footage, that wouldn't have been necessary
5 because the footage showed what had happened, and showed
6 that there wasn't somebody in that property.

7 **A.** But that doesn't happen instantly, the viewing of
8 footage.

9 **Q.** Well, members of the public were offering that footage
10 at the scene.

11 Can we go back through the policy that was
12 displayed, please. So page 33 we looked at a moment
13 ago. Thank you. So you accept that the criteria was
14 met for deployment, but you chose not to utilise the
15 officers that way, rather choosing to utilise them for
16 first aid.

17 Can we then go over the page to page 34, please.
18 Thank you. We can then see the authority is deploy AFOs
19 and obviously deals with these various commander roles
20 that we've detailed and set out. I just want to go
21 through, because I won't have time to go through the
22 details of the roles of a strategic, a tactical and
23 a TA, but if we can just move through the policy,
24 please, to page 62.

25 The APP for firearms authorities and strategic plans
49

1 you've been asked questions about Officer Griffin, then,
2 there was no reason why you weren't contacting him
3 before 5 o'clock in the morning because it's very much
4 after 5 o'clock that you made the first call to him.
5 Was there any reason why you had not contacted him
6 before 5 o'clock?

7 **A.** No.

8 **Q.** We can see there the Tactical Firearms Commander which
9 you've already confirmed you were the TFC that night.
10 So in the event that an authority had been given,
11 a cadre TFC would have had to do the role of a TFC,
12 wouldn't they?

13 **A.** Yes.

14 **Q.** So necessarily that would have meant there was somebody
15 in the Control Room or nearby that could have been
16 tasked to be the TFC?

17 **A.** I'm also a cadre TFC --

18 **Q.** I appreciate you are, but you're also the FIM?

19 **A.** Yes.

20 **Q.** But in that scenario, the firearms authority being
21 granted, would you have double-hatted, so done both
22 roles, or would you have requested somebody else to be
23 the TFC?

24 **A.** I'm not too sure. I wouldn't have called the cadre,
25 because this is a spontaneous, so it would have been

51

1 is very detailed, would you agree, necessarily for
2 the -- how those roles are very unique for coming up
3 with a working strategy and a tactical plan?

4 **A.** They're clearly defined, yes.

5 **Q.** Right. So let's just move through and go to the next
6 page, then, please. We can see the need for the command
7 roles and functions. If we move next to page 64,
8 please.

9 We can see there the importance of the Strategic
10 Firearms Commander, and just pausing there for a moment,
11 you've confirmed that ACC Griffin, as he was at the
12 time, was the on call gold, but he was also the
13 Strategic Firearms Commander that night, wasn't he?

14 **A.** Yes.

15 **Q.** So when you made the decision to refuse Officer
16 Speeden's request for an authority, whether it's the
17 first request or a later one, why did you not consult
18 and speak to the Strategic Firearms Commander to seek
19 his view, experience and guidance, as the person that
20 necessarily has to be consulted in respect of firearms
21 authorities?

22 **A.** Because it -- I don't have -- it doesn't state that
23 I have to consult him for that. I consult him to
24 approve when I do make an authority.

25 **Q.** Then if we move forward, please. I just want to check,
50

1 a deployment for an initial tactical firearms commander.
2 As I stated previously, I had two other TFCs with me,
3 the two sergeants, so I suppose, in theory I could have
4 asked them to give an armed authority whilst I remained
5 in the FIM role --

6 **Q.** All right.

7 **A.** -- to split them.

8 **Q.** Then if we keep moving through, please, we can see
9 obviously then the role of the Operational Firearms
10 Commander. So they're essentially the officers that are
11 then on the ground, implement the tactical plan once
12 you've had the authority, the tactical plan with
13 consideration from a TA, but then the Operational
14 Firearms Commander would put it into place on the
15 ground?

16 **A.** Yes.

17 **Q.** Right. Then if we just move forward, I think it gives
18 us a summary, then, of the tactical adviser's role about
19 capabilities and so on and tactics. We can see there
20 the reference to the National Decision Model.

21 Now you've referenced this in the context of when
22 the Chair asked you about spinning or it may have been
23 Mr Blake. Can we briefly look at the NDM, because it's
24 right, isn't it, this should be constantly being spun to
25 reconsider the requirements of whether a deployment

1 authority should be been put in place; would you agree?
 2 **A.** Yes.
 3 **Q.** So if we could just display, please, HOMF0000051,
 4 please. Thank you. If we can move through to page 3,
 5 we can see there essentially what's required when you're
 6 coming up with a working strategy and making a threat
 7 assessment, and the process of gathering your
 8 information intelligence, assessing the threat and risk
 9 to develop a working strategy, to consider your powers
 10 in policy, then options and contingencies and to take
 11 action, but obviously revisiting it constantly as you
 12 learn more and you keep spinning the NDM; would you
 13 agree?
 14 **A.** Yes.
 15 **Q.** Then, if we keep moving through, please, it gives
 16 examples. I think -- thank you -- we go to page 6.
 17 So we can see that it gives a really clear guide of
 18 the sorts of things that should be being asked to arrive
 19 at a working strategy, and we can see the obvious ones
 20 there at the bullet points:
 21 "What is happening?
 22 "What do I know so far?
 23 "What do I not know?
 24 "What further information (or intelligence) do I ...
 25 need to know?"

1 the footage, as well as what was physically still around
 2 Barney and Grace, that this was a robbery?
 3 **A.** Well, not necessarily, because, again, I go on my
 4 policing experience, my knowledge of the area, knowledge
 5 of the demographic in that area, and actually, if
 6 someone -- ordinarily, with a robbery, particularly
 7 a robbery of students, people tend to hand over their
 8 property when asked by the robber. Well, if that
 9 weren't the case and that resulted in the extreme
 10 violence, then they may have run off. I couldn't say,
 11 but that was my primary hypothesis.
 12 **Q.** Would you agree, spinning the wheel with the NDM, the
 13 moment that footage was watched, that discounts
 14 completely that theory of a robbery? There's absolutely
 15 no evidence of a robbery on that footage.
 16 **A.** I haven't viewed that footage, so I don't know.
 17 **Q.** But again, it was footage available that very quickly,
 18 around at 4.30 in the morning, could have been viewed to
 19 inform the working strategy; would you agree?
 20 **A.** If it could have been viewed, yes, and it was passed to
 21 me, it could have. It could have informed the working
 22 strategy.
 23 **Q.** Similarly, that footage, alongside the checks that have
 24 been performed on the ID that Grace and Barney had
 25 showed that they were students?

55

1 Then the questions that feed into the working
 2 strategy:
 3 "Do I need to take action immediately?"
 4 And so on, including:
 5 "How serious would it be?" if action wasn't taken on
 6 risks.
 7 Now, you have given evidence that you had arrived at
 8 a working strategy or an assumption that this was
 9 a robbery.
 10 **A.** It was one of my hypotheses, yes, the main one.
 11 **Q.** The other being domestic abuse?
 12 **A.** Not necessarily abuse, but there might have been some
 13 sort of a domestic element.
 14 **Q.** Just so I'm clear, who are you considering that there
 15 may have been -- this incident may have been
 16 a domestic-type incident?
 17 **A.** Well, I didn't know, but again, based on my policing
 18 experience, and as we've already said, this was absolute
 19 extreme violence that was used, that quite often it's
 20 the case that that happens under domestic situations.
 21 **Q.** But in terms of your first working strategy, the
 22 robbery, would you agree that that could have easily
 23 been easily discounted very quickly because Grace was
 24 still wearing all of her expensive jewellery, and had
 25 her phone, as did Barney. And so there's no evidence on

54

1 **A.** Yes.
 2 **Q.** Checks could have been run showing that they were
 3 individuals of absolute good character.
 4 **A.** Yes.
 5 **Q.** Again, the footage being viewed would show that this was
 6 not a domestic type incident; would you agree with
 7 what --
 8 **A.** No, what I mean by that, not that it was on each -- they
 9 had attacked each other, but it was --
 10 **Q.** No, I appreciate that, but you're placing forward
 11 a hypothesis that somehow VC had some form of
 12 relationship with either Grace or Barney, and I'm
 13 suggesting to you that, again, any viewing of the
 14 footage would have completely discounted that domestic
 15 abuse theory.
 16 **A.** I haven't viewed the footage.
 17 **Q.** Right. So again, one of the things I'm going to briefly
 18 deal with with you is that where we do see evidence of
 19 your working strategies, they are poor, to say the
 20 least, and you've sought to defend the working strategy
 21 and threat assessment you put in the Incident Log where
 22 it has an assessment of low risk, and you've sought to
 23 suggest it was an *aide memoire* for you as if you were
 24 going to come back to revisit the matter. But that
 25 Incident Log is accessible to all the officers, either

56

1 on their phones or on their laptops, to inform the FIM's
 2 view of the seriousness of this incident; would you
 3 agree?
 4 **A.** Yes.
 5 **Q.** So therefore would you agree that it was either two
 6 theories: one, that was your genuine threat assessment,
 7 early doors, to as a low risk, and you're now seeking to
 8 suggest that you placed that in the Incident Log to
 9 justify that that wasn't your actual threat assessment
 10 at the time.
 11 **A.** I'm sorry, I'm not understanding the question.
 12 **Q.** All right. Well, let me do it then by reference to the
 13 document, please. NGPF00 --
 14 **THE CHAIR:** I think he just needs to understand the
 15 question, Ms Cartwright.
 16 **MS CARTWRIGHT:** I think it's going to be easier to show the
 17 document then. NGPF --
 18 **THE CHAIR:** What's being suggested to you by Ms Cartwright
 19 is that it was -- it was either your assessment that it
 20 was low risk rather than just copy in the boxes, or
 21 alternatively, it's misleading and it's been put in
 22 afterwards; is that correct, Ms Cartwright?
 23 **MS CARTWRIGHT:** Not afterwards.
 24 **THE CHAIR:** All right, at the time --
 25 **MS CARTWRIGHT:** Yes.

1 But I absolutely should have gone back and clarified the
 2 points because clearly, "low" is not appropriate for
 3 this situation.
 4 **Q.** If we could just expand the page, please, in terms of
 5 the working strategy. Thank you. Can you help me,
 6 then, with, we have "Locate and deal with subject ..."
 7 recover weapon, "Secure & Preserve evidence", and
 8 "Develop Intelligence".
 9 So on the "Develop Intelligence", who was developing
 10 the intelligence that night?
 11 **A.** So for developing intelligence and the information, it
 12 would have been coordinated by Inspector Shaw on the
 13 scene, some of those actions that we've talked about
 14 earlier around CCTV, house-to-house enquiries.
 15 **Q.** But the more broader access to intelligence systems held
 16 by the police, because there was an ability to search
 17 police systems --
 18 **A.** Sorry, I don't understand. I have a team of two. We
 19 call them RTIU, so realtime intelligence unit officers,
 20 who are trained to a much better level than I am at
 21 interrogating police systems for this sort of search, so
 22 NICHE that we've heard about previously, PNC, PND.
 23 **Q.** So did somebody from the realtime intelligence, were
 24 they in the control room or --
 25 **A.** Yes.

1 **THE CHAIR:** -- for some reason.
 2 **MS CARTWRIGHT:** I'm going to just deal briefly with it,
 3 NGPF0006316.
 4 **THE CHAIR:** Sorry, can you just answer that or do you want
 5 to look at the --
 6 **MS CARTWRIGHT:** I was going to do it by reference to the
 7 document to be fair --
 8 **THE CHAIR:** All right, have a look at the document first --
 9 **MS CARTWRIGHT:** Thank you.
 10 **THE CHAIR:** -- and then perhaps he can answer the point.

 21 the misleading threat assessment in the Incident Log?
 22 **A.** I'm not too sure who it's misleading and I should have
 23 gone back and read on this, I explained earlier, and
 24 it's not me defending it; it's giving an explanation as
 25 to why I've put this on, and it was to be expeditious.

1 **Q.** -- that night, and were they searching police systems
 2 using searches such as anyone with a marker of extreme
 3 violence, who was an IC3 male with any connections to
 4 Ilkeston Road?
 5 **A.** So I'm not an expert in those search parameters but
 6 I don't think you'd be able to search NICHE with those
 7 parameters.
 8 **Q.** What about Genie?
 9 **A.** We don't use Genie in Nottinghamshire.
 10 **Q.** All right. But do you know whether anyone actually even
 11 tried whether with what is known? Because putting it
 12 bluntly, Officer Mather, we're saying there was real
 13 connections with the description of VC, to search the
 14 system with an individual who had an extreme marker for
 15 violence, with connections to Ilkeston Road, would have
 16 flagged VC very early on 13 June.
 17 **A.** I don't think that sort of search can be conducted.
 18 I know the realtime intelligence unit, for example there
 19 was an entry somewhere on the log where they attempted
 20 to use the CCTV still to run the image thorough facial
 21 recognition and that had been unsuccessful due to the
 22 quality of the image not being good enough.
 23 **Q.** Do you know, just on that point, because all of the
 24 footage that was available, and again, there was
 25 officers that were viewing the footage in the house from

60

1 the door cam and recording it on their body-worn footage
2 at Ilkeston Road, it's of the clearest quality, and so
3 did anyone go back to get a more clear image to enable
4 that facial recognition for VC?

5 **A.** I don't know how -- I'm not sure how clear that imagery
6 was when the officers were viewing it at the time.

7 **Q.** Now can I take you next, please, into the policy for
8 Plato, which is NGPF0006117. Thank you. If we could
9 move to page -- if we just move through the policy,
10 please. Thank you. Then go to page 4. Thank you.

11 Now in terms of the range or the thought as to what
12 the attack on Grace and Barney could be, did you
13 consider, as part of the potential options that this
14 could have been a marauding incident? Because the
15 policy, it's right, isn't it, it's not just for
16 terrorists, it's wider than that; it's to cover
17 marauding incidents?

18 **A.** Correct.

19 **Q.** So can I ask you at any point that morning, did you
20 give thought that the Ilkeston Road attack would have
21 been better classified as a marauding incident?

22 **A.** I don't think it -- at the time, there wasn't any
23 information to suggest that it was marauding.

24 **Q.** Well, let's move on to the page 5, please. But
25 certainly later it became an Operation Plato, but you

61

1 are, like your robbery and your domestic abuse,
2 considerations also an MTA, the policies make absolutely
3 clear that your rationales and your revisiting matters
4 need to be recorded; would you agree?

5 **A.** I think that's more specific around once a firearms
6 authority is given, but I absolutely appreciate that it
7 would have been better for me to have rationalised some
8 of that on the Incident Log.

9 **Q.** Even if it's not on the Incident Log, I think general
10 guidance says you can even have a dictaphone and just
11 record your working strategies realtime as you go along,
12 even if you've not got time to record them in the
13 Incident Log; would you agree?

14 **A.** Yes.

15 **Q.** So, actually, with what you're telling us as to what
16 your considerations were regarding robbery, domestic
17 incident, potentially considering the MTA earlier,
18 you've actually not recorded that anywhere, have you,
19 Officer?

20 **A.** No.

21 **Q.** Now can I ask about the CCTV, because you've confirmed
22 to Mr Blake that searches were checked sooner for CCTV,
23 and you were taken to a reference I think at 4.07, part
24 of the plan was check CCTV.

25 Now you've said that there were screens in the

63

1 couldn't discount what the motivation of that attack was
2 on Grace and Barney and so what I'm suggesting is as
3 part of the potentials that it could have been, that it
4 should have been in your thought process that it may
5 have been a marauding incident with a terrorist
6 motivation, or if not a terrorist motivation, with
7 a motivation for some other reason. So why did you not
8 at any point consider an MTA earlier than after 5.30?

9 **A.** Because whilst it was a consideration, there was nothing
10 to suggest it was an MTA.

11 **Q.** If we can see in this policy, would you agree, we can
12 move to page 6, it requires considerations of individual
13 sort of low-level attacks but also with individuals who
14 could have a motivation other than terrorism for their
15 attack.

16 **A.** Yes.

17 **Q.** So you'd say it could have been considered but you
18 didn't, in respect of the Ilkeston Road attack.

19 **A.** I'm saying it was a consideration but there was no
20 information or intelligence to suggest that it was an
21 MTA.

22 **Q.** But again, you're saying that you did give thought that
23 this could have been an MTA for the Ilkeston Road attack
24 but again we don't see that recorded anywhere. So as
25 part of the NDM, looking at what your working theories

62

1 Control Room that have access to the CCTV from the
2 council, and I think you made clear that it depends upon
3 what they direct it to. But can I just take you to
4 a map that we've been provided as to the locations of
5 the CCTV, please, which is INQY0000006. Thank you.

6 This is the cameras, the local authority cameras,
7 that we can see the Boulevard. So you can see where
8 Forest Fields are, we've got the Boulevard Road that
9 runs alongside the Forest Recreation Ground that then
10 takes you towards Mapperley Park. Can you see there's
11 two blue circles?

12 **A.** Yes.

13 **Q.** Thank you. So again if there was a proper search
14 strategy considering areas and locations, we can see
15 that the two blue dots on that CCTV footage, we know
16 that VC passed through that area after 4.38 in the
17 morning, and in fact it's one of those cameras where
18 there's a still that captures VC, so before he goes
19 towards Seely Hirst House. Perhaps if I just show you
20 that now, please, which is NGPF0010192. Thank you. If
21 we could go just to page 41, please.

22 So the image on the top right-hand side, which was
23 taken of VC at 4.41, my understanding is that's captured
24 on one of those local authority CCTV cameras.

25 So I want to ask you, because we know at that time

64

1 in the morning there were actually very few people on
2 the road. We've been urged a number of times to avoid
3 counterfactuals but we know in this case, factually,
4 that VC stuck to main roads, was not running, and the
5 route he took, and it was not a densely populated at
6 that time of the morning --

7 **A.** I wouldn't agree. This is quite a major road -- but
8 I wouldn't agree the route was -- that he stuck to major
9 roads.

10 **Q.** Right. Well, I know he passed through to Brook Court
11 through Player Street, but again, I'm not going to deal
12 with that because that goes to the intelligence point
13 that you responded to.

14 But if there was a proper strategy, a search
15 strategy where there was real consideration to checking
16 each of the systems with clear directions given, either
17 to someone who was doing the CCTV checks or widening the
18 direction that was given to the local authority to look
19 wider than Ilkeston Road, there was a real opportunity
20 to identify VC; would you agree, Officer Mather?

21 **A.** I would not agree entirely. What I would say is, as
22 you've said earlier on, there weren't many people about,
23 certainly from these images, we can't see lots of
24 people. And they were given the description of the
25 offender, and I would expect that had they been

65

1 firearms units, and actually there were multiple other
2 police units looking for the subject. So I don't think
3 just giving that information to the firearms officers
4 would have been appropriate, because it should go to all
5 the officers that are searching.

6 **Q.** But again, one of the significantly upsetting lost
7 opportunities in this case -- particularly as the three
8 armed response vehicles went back to police
9 headquarters, Mr Blake obviously showed you the maps
10 that show how near each of those firearms officers were,
11 they weren't being deployed on any other duties, they
12 were going back to base, two of them, anyway, to replace
13 their medical equipment -- is that they passed almost
14 immediately the road that could have given an
15 opportunity to prevent the attack on Ian Coates if
16 they'd been deployed into that area; would you agree?

17 **A.** No, because they were in that area and they knew the
18 description of the offender.

19 **Q.** But at that time in the morning they were simply heading
20 back to base, which you have said you accepted there
21 shouldn't have been all three armed response vehicles
22 that went back to base. There should have been
23 a resource left in the city; would you agree?

24 **A.** Yes.

25 **Q.** In terms of that, again, why did you not command one of

67

1 monitoring, they ought -- that they may have identified
2 that this could be a person of interest. They're
3 clearly not going to be able to say that's definitely
4 him, but we could then direct officers towards him.

5 **Q.** But then again the log that Mr Blake displayed very much
6 saw that their tasking had been to look near
7 Ilkeston Road, but again, if there'd been a proper
8 working search strategy, which had given a briefing,
9 either to those in the Control Room or to the council,

13 **A.** It's an option definitely, yeah.

14 **Q.** The significance of that and the opportunity to have
15 identified VC around this time is significant because
16 it's before the attack on Mr Coates that took place at
17 5.14 in the morning, and again, I'm going to suggest to
18 you that again, had there been proper consideration and
19 full information given to the armed response officers
20 that gave them the direction of travel of left at
21 Hopedale Close, that could have caused the firearms
22 officers to perform searches near to where VC went, both
23 on Seely Hirst Road and then on to Mapperley Road and
24 Magdala Road; would you agree?

25 **A.** Again, not entirely. I would say that there are three

66

1 the firearms officers to stay in Nottingham city centre?

2 **A.** I didn't realise that they had left.

3 **Q.** But again, that was something essential for public
4 safety for you to know; would you agree?

5 **A.** Yes, I would agree that it's my responsibility along
6 with the OFC.

7 **Q.** Certainly with respect to Officers Yallop and Bower,
8 they had not been utilised for first aid or needing to
9 change their clothing, so they would have been the prime
10 candidates to be asked to go to the usual location, the
11 city centre; would you agree?

12 **A.** Yes.

13 **Q.** Perhaps, again, to further show you that that should
14 have taken place, could I ask to be displayed
15 NGPF0007968.

16 Thank you. This is the patrol strategy. Can we
17 move to page 5, please, of this policy, and I want us
18 just to be careful with this matter for obvious reasons
19 around some of the sensitivities in this document. But
20 we can see, in terms of handover arrangements, there
21 should ordinarily be an armed response vehicle in the
22 city; would you agree?

23 **A.** Yes.

24 **Q.** That this policy makes clear that even when there's
25 going to be handovers, that needs to be carefully

68

1 managed so the city is never left exposed. It's almost
2 that that officer waits until they know that the
3 other -- the next armed response vehicle is coming to
4 take over the location, the city centre; would you
5 agree?

6 **A.** That would be ideal, yes.

7 **Q.** You can see, Officer Mather, why it is a significant
8 issue for those that I represent, because the attacks on
9 them happened in the city, and they are clearly of the
10 view that if there had been that firearms resource in
11 the city centre before the attack on Wayne at 5.23, but
12 certainly before the attack on Sharon at 5:29:29, that
13 the armed response vehicle could have prevented the
14 attacks upon them?

15 Can I ask you, in terms of armed response vehicles,
16 they can do enforced stops, can't they?

17 **A.** All Nottinghamshire ARVs are TPAC trained, so they can
18 do -- if they're not at an armed authority, they could
19 do a reinforced stop or a multi-car box, but they need
20 more than one car to do that.

21 **Q.** But again, in terms of you dealt with some of the
22 weaponry that the officers have, do your officers also
23 carry tyre breaching rounds as well.

24 **A.** No.

25 **Q.** They don't. All right. But again, would you agree, an

1 as a further casualty of VC?

3 **Q.** No. Perhaps then if we can move to that footage,
4 please. Then can we then please play, first of all,

19 **A.** It -- I hadn't made the link then. My -- what I thought
20 would happen was an RTC, initially.

21 **Q.** Notwithstanding that members of the public had called in
22 to say that there'd been a deliberate driving at and
23 swerving at Wayne Birkett, a male?

24 **A.** I thought it was an RTC.

25 **Q.** So did you check the logs and the calls had been given

71

1 opportunity, rather we see there how the tactic was
2 ultimately deployed to stop VC just going alongside.
3 They are advanced drivers that can deploy tactics in
4 a way to essentially stop dangerous offenders; would you
5 agree?

6 **A.** Yes.

7 **THE CHAIR:** Are you going to be much longer, Ms Cartwright?

8 **MS CARTWRIGHT:** I do have footage that I can play and it is
9 from the Control Room, because one of the things I just
10 want to check with the officer, certainly if we look at
11 the force control footage, it doesn't, in fact, seem
12 that you have full situational awareness of the
13 incidents. You'll have watched the footage from the
14 Control Room, the four pieces we've been given; would
15 you agree.

16 **A.** Yes, that's the body-worn video that I've activated on
17 myself. Sorry, Sergeant Straszewskj did.

18 **Q.** Because certainly you've viewed that footage, and maybe
19 if I summarise it in this way and if I'm being unfair we
20 can address it in written submissions, that you don't
21 seem to appreciate, you seem to have missed the attack
22 on Wayne, albeit you're referencing Milton Street as
23 a location where two were injured. So would you agree
24 that, if you watch the totality of that footage, you
25 seem to have overlooked the incident with Wayne Birkett

1 at 5.23 and thereafter about how they described that
2 van's attack on --

3 **A.** I would have read the logs, yes.

4 **Q.** Right. So then, once that had happened, and again, that
5 driver, we know, then, was driving round the city
6 centre, past the police station twice performing
7 manoeuvres on one-way streets, who was monitoring the
8 CCTV in the city centre.

9 **A.** That would have been the council.

10 **Q.** Because would you agree that, if someone had been
11 monitoring that CCTV, that again, there was a real
12 opportunity, again, to have prevented the attack on

14 **A.** Perhaps that is an organisational consideration that
15 there ought to be someone looking at the CCTV all the
16 time.

17 **Q.** Again, would you agree that, had there been an armoured
18 response vehicle in the city centre, again, they could
19 have been deployed immediately after the 5.23 to help
20 locate the white van?

21 **A.** Yes, so they were deployed from where they were, but
22 they were on the A60.

23 **Q.** Again, in terms of the two theories, either left on
24 Hopedale Drive or heading towards the city centre, would
25 you agree that that was even more essential that you had

72

1 ensured that there was an armed response vehicle in the
 2 city centre?
 3 **A.** My assessment of where the ARVs were was that from the
 4 Ilkeston Road location, they could get into the city
 5 quick enough.
 6 **Q.** From Ilkeston?
 7 **A.** Ilkeston Road.
 8 **Q.** Yeah. So that's Ilkeston Road, but they've gone back to
 9 base which is a significant distance then away.

 21 **A.** I wouldn't necessarily agree but as potential, yes,
 22 absolutely.
 23 **Q.** But also the potential for those officers to ask
 24 realtime quickly for someone from the local authority to
 25 give them realtime intelligence from the city centre

 18 Cartwright, because -- do say if you do -- but what
 19 you're asking him is whether he realised that it was --
 20 he didn't seem to have any knowledge of the incident
 21 with Wayne; is that correct?
 22 **MS CARTWRIGHT:** There's quite a few passages that I was
 23 going to. I'm conscious of the time. I don't know if
 24 it would be appropriate then if I could maybe ask for
 25 those additional matters to be addressed in the

 21 didn't deal in detail with the involvement of
 22 Officer Reynolds in the city centre and what
 23 instructions, if any, you were given before the
 24 collision with Sharon?
 25 **A.** So I covered the points in my stage four, I was asked to

24 Q. Yes, and PC Speeden was asking for the authority, wasn't
25 he, because he was sat at Ilkeston Road twiddling his

 9 a lot of robberies?
 10 A. There are.

 14 Q. So is that why one of your working assumptions was
 15 robbery?
 16 A. Yes.
 17 Q. Also based on your experience of the area and of being

 20 Q. So far as domestic is concerned, this is no imputation
 21 on the victims at all --
 22 A. No.
 23 Q. -- but you knew that amongst the most violent killings
 24 in this country, sadly, very often domestics are in that
 25 category.

 2 Q. So you were thinking along the lines, provisionally,
 3 this could be, to put it crudely, a lover scorned
 4 situation.
 5 A. Perhaps.
 6 Q. But at this stage, did you have any contemplation of
 7 what we now know, which is this was a paranoid
 8 schizophrenic intent on killing multiple people?
 9 A. No, I did not.
 10 Q. Had you ever commanded or had involvement in any
 11 operation involving the apprehension of a paranoid
 12 schizophrenic?
 13 A. No.
 14 Q. Do you agree that your three core policing duties when
 15 this incident came to your attention was to save or
 16 protect life?
 17 A. Yes.
 18 Q. Secondly, to preserve and capture evidence?
 19 A. Yes.
 20 Q. And third, to apprehend the perpetrator?
 21 A. Yes.
 22 Q. As to that first of those three matters, saving life is
 23 self-evident, a priority, yes?
 24 A. Correct.
 25 Q. Indeed, that was part of the reason why you didn't grant

87

- 1 armed authority because you wished to promote the saving
 2 of life via your expert ARV officers.
 3 A. Part of the reason.
 4 Q. I accept it's not the only. If we turn, then, to the
 5 second of the three -- I'm going to say they're all
 6 important priorities -- capturing evidence. That
 7 includes, we can put it generically, Golden Hour type
 8 stuff, yes?
 9 A. Yes.
 10 Q. So quick examples: house to house, scene preservation,
 11 identification of witnesses, yes?
 12 A. Yes.
 13 Q. And of course, critically, the capturing of evidence
 14 merges with the third object of apprehension of the
 15 perpetrator because, if possible, you want to identify
 16 the suspect.
 17 A. Of course.
 18 Q. That's why your officers at the scene sought to, and in
 19 fact did, view available footage.
 20 A. Correct.
 21 Q. Because that's going to improve, one hopes, the
 22 description.
 23 A. Yes, and increase the opportunity to apprehend that
 24 offender.
 25 Q. In due course might enable you to upload a photograph

1 for facial recognition purposes.
 2 **A.** Correct.
 3 **Q.** Which did in fact happen --
 4 **A.** Yes.
 5 **Q.** -- albeit not of sufficient quality.
 6 **A.** Correct.
 7 **Q.** And not to be discounted, dismissed or overlooked in the
 8 scene preservation and evidential capture, is the
 9 avoidance, if at all possible, of cross contamination.
 10 **A.** Yes, it's always a consideration.
 11 **Q.** Because to take some simple examples, those at the
 12 scene, particularly rendering first aid, should be kept
 13 away from any arrest of any suspect.
 14 **A.** If possible, yeah.
 15 **Q.** Because otherwise they are going to very obviously
 16 transfer blood, DNA, and so forth.
 17 **A.** Yeah.
 18 **Q.** It also follows, doesn't it, that those at the scene
 19 can't do scene preservation elsewhere?
 20 **A.** Correct.
 21 **Q.** And can't handle exhibits beyond the scene.
 22 **A.** Yes.
 23 **Q.** That was a factor that you had to keep in mind.
 24 **A.** Yes.
 25 **Q.** We see, I'm taking it quickly, a number of occasions in

1 **A.** Yes, there are.
 2 **Q.** Not just houses and flats, but industrial buildings,
 3 disused industrial buildings, sheds, allotments, and so
 4 forth in the area --
 5 **A.** Yes.
 6 **Q.** -- parks and so forth. Was your working assumption that
 7 this person, since you didn't realise it was someone
 8 with severe psychosis, is very unlikely to repeat this
 9 kind of offence?
 10 **A.** Correct.
 11 **THE CHAIR:** That's speculative, isn't it?
 12 **MR BEGGS:** I'm asking what his working assumption was.
 13 **THE CHAIR:** All right.
 14 Did you have a working assumption about that,
 15 whether somebody was unlikely to repeat it?
 16 **A.** In my experience, people don't tend to go on to do
 17 things like that.
 18 **THE CHAIR:** That's if it's a normal robbery.
 19 **A.** Yes.
 20 **MR BEGGS:** Which we accept of course, but he didn't know
 21 that at the time.
 22 You did not have, in your contemplation, an offender
 23 who might not in fact really try to get away.
 24 **A.** I didn't think that was likely.
 25 **Q.** No, because we know that VC didn't make haste in the

 19 going to try to get as far as away from the scene as
 20 possible? That's one possibility?
 21 **A.** Yes.
 22 **Q.** Or to hide locally?
 23 **A.** Yes.
 24 **Q.** It's self-evident, but there are thousands of venues
 25 locally where somebody could hide.

1 fashion that you might have expected for a robber or
 2 a domestic.
 3 **A.** Correct.
 4 **Q.** He stayed in the area, albeit he moved, yes?
 5 **A.** Yes.
 6 **Q.** If we go, please, to the 65 log, we see at page 3 --
 7 I should give the number, I apologise, NGPF0006136_3.
 8 Is it a fair inference that from the 04:05:19 entry,
 9 about halfway down, that someone in the Control Room,

 12 **A.** Yes.
 13 **Q.** And that's within just over a minute of the log being
 14 set up?
 15 **A.** Yes.
 16 **Q.** If we look, please, a few pages further on at page 6,
 17 your sergeant, we know from the payroll number that is
 18 indeed Sergeant Gavin Berry at the top of page 6 has, in
 19 what may well be a pro forma-type document, laid down
 20 some key parameters.
 21 **A.** Yes.
 22 **Q.** And given the shortage of time, they all go to the three
 23 priorities to which I spoke a few moments ago, do they
 24 not?
 25 **A.** They do.

1 Q. Just pausing there, can we establish this: that although
2 dog handlers have specialist search training, and
3 although POLSA officers have expertise in trying to, for
4 example, secure a knife or a gun in a particular area.
5 A. Yes.
6 Q. There is in fact no standard police training for urgent

8 A. Dog officers have that training.

25 05.35 capture of VC, approximately 90 minutes, were any

1 A. Yes.
2 Q. -- that would have been better.
3 A. Yes.
4 Q. But on the night, on the morning, I should say, that was
5 left to dispatchers.
6 A. Yes.
7 Q. Who do have experience and skill, but under pressure may
8 not have done that.
9 A. Correct.
10 Q. And you accept that's a deficiency, when one looks at it
11 with a view to learning.
12 A. Yes.
13 Q. It was also at one point, I think, suggested that
14 because you've searched one area, for example the
15 Cathedral area, therefore you wouldn't search it again;

25 Q. But that merely, Officer, doesn't it, underscores the

 19 any armed officer who wasn't providing first aid from
 20 searching.
 21 **A.** Correct.
 22 **Q.** And they still had a side arm on their holster --
 23 **A.** Correct.
 24 **Q.** -- which can be deployed within seconds.
 25 **A.** Yes.

1 **Q.** That's the majority, that's their default position,
 2 isn't it?
 3 **A.** Yes.
 4 **Q.** For perfectly understandable reasons.
 5 **A.** Yes.
 6 **Q.** But your job, as person higher in the chain of command,
 7 is to take an overview?

 9 **Q.** May we turn briefly and quickly to the cathedral. It is
 10 being suggested to you that searching at the cathedral

 20 **A.** Yes.
 21 **Q.** This is a high-quality informant, if I can put it like
 22 that?
 23 **A.** Reliable.
 24 **Q.** Reliable, you would hope, yes?
 25 **A.** Yes.

1 **Q.** As this matter unfolded, is this fair: that Hallam and
 2 Graham, who had provided first aid to both Grace and
 3 Barney, would not have been ideally able to intervene at
 4 an arrest?
 5 **A.** Ideally.
 6 **Q.** And likewise, Goddard and Speeden, because the former
 7 had performed various aspects of first aid on Grace.
 8 **A.** That's right.
 9 **Q.** Indeed, that would also put Speeden out of the game
 10 because he is next to that officer, and therefore there
 11 is cross contamination between officers.
 12 **A.** Yes.
 13 **Q.** But that left Yallop and Bower, did it not?
 14 **A.** Yes.
 15 **Q.** As it transpired, they did in fact rapidly apprehend VC

 24 time, will ask for armed authority from TFC?
 25 **A.** Quite often.

1 **Q.** Was there any sensible basis upon which you could ignore
 2 that call?
 3 **A.** I don't believe so.
 4 **Q.** Because of proximity in both time and place?
 5 **A.** Yes.
 6 **Q.** Because, though no one has yet said it, sound can

 8 fair?

20 **A.** Yes.
21 **Q.** Just as the cathedral had to be?
22 **A.** Yes.
23 **THE CHAIR:** Are you going to be much longer, Mr Beggs?
24 **MR BEGGS:** I hope not, madam.
25 **THE CHAIR:** Carry on.

1 **Q.** So, as an obvious desirable improvement, if the police
2 could access the local authority's cameras, that would
3 massively extend your scope for coverage, wouldn't it?
4 **A.** Yes.
5 **Q.** Likewise, if they could read your log, they would be

8 **Q.** Page 17 of the same document, please.

22 image more broadly.

2 relationship between you as FIM and the dispatchers.
3 **A.** Yes.
4 **THE CHAIR:** You have nine there.

25 **THE CHAIR:** There's no strategy about splitting up expertise

 2 **A.** Yes, I should have oversight over those decisions.
 3 I absolutely accept that.
 4 **THE CHAIR:** So I think Mr Beggs has just gone through the
 5 difficulties of contamination. You've got three armed

 2 vehicles rather than getting the dogs out and seeing
 3 whether they can search immediately in the area?
 4 **A.** I think the usual practice would be to go to the last
 5 potential sighting, and be outside of the car and with
 6 the dog to see if they can pick up a track. I don't
 7 think they can just try and pick up a track without that
 8 information of where they were last sighted.
 9 **THE CHAIR:** All right. I think you said, when Mr Blake was
 10 asking you some questions, about your usual practice
 11 would be to start from the scene and work out?

 13 **THE CHAIR:** Was that communicated to the dispatchers before

 19 happened is that everyone was diverted or a lot of
 20 people were diverted away, who weren't dealing with the

 22 **A.** Yes, there were a number of resources out there.
 23 **THE CHAIR:** Quite a lot of resources.
 24 **A.** Yes.
 25 **THE CHAIR:** In fact, the drone went straight there, didn't

1 cathedral, some were from Beeston, which is another area
 2 outside of Nottingham, that came in, and the ARVs were

 22 Further on, given how extreme the violence was that was
 23 used, it then became less likely that it were a robbery,
 24 because that would be not usual.
 25 **THE CHAIR:** So that could have been clear at the beginning,

4 So the next thought was some sort of domestic

18 a capacity issue, sometimes, for instance, we could have

19 put people doing the cathedral on one channel and people

20 doing Ilkeston Road on another, that there was sometimes

21 logical reasons for having them on two separate

22 channels, but I understand there are absolutely some

23 cons to doing it as well.

24 **THE CHAIR:** So isn't it part of the control, as it were the

25 controlling mind within the control centre, to make sure

1 my expectation would be that the operator or dispatcher

2 on 1199 would type what PC Marshall has said and then

3 highlight it so that then the Talkgroup 7 operating who

4 is reading it can then see that there is an update and

5 then pass that to their officers.

6 **THE CHAIR:** Yes. Just going back to the cathedral, do you

7 think you were over-influenced by the fact that it was

8 an off-duty police officer who was reporting it?

9 **A.** I don't think so. I think it is a reliable informant.

10 I think the problem is I couldn't discount it, and
